

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GRAB MAYIM

Call her rad: An interview with Mayim Bialik

When it comes to recognizing and embracing promising talent, the gays have been at it longer than practically everyone else. Remember the Bette Midler/Barbara Hershey movie Beaches? Remember the opening sequence with the lead characters as children? That was a young Mayim Bialik in one of her earliest film roles, playing Midler's C.C. Bloom as a kid. Ask any of us and we'll tell you we knew she was going to be a star. Since then, Bialik has had her own hit network sitcom in the nineties as the titular Blossom and stole the show in every scene in which she appeared in the even more successful 21st century sitcom The Big Bang Theory as Amy Farrah Fowler. She also managed to find the time to earn a PhD in neuroscience from UCLA. In Call Me Kat, her first sitcom following the end of the longrunning Big Bang Theory, Bialik plays Kat, the single and sassy owner of a Louisville cat café. I had the pleasure of speaking with Bialik in January 2021, shortly after the show debuted on Fox.

Gregg Shapiro: Before signing on to do *Call Me Kat*, would you consider yourself a fan of Miranda Hart's British sitcom Miranda, on which it's based?

Mayim Bialik: Honestly, I hadn't seen it until Jim Parsons brought it to my attention towards the end of *Big Bang Theory*. So, I did not know about it until Jim said, "What do you think of this?" And I said, "I think it's delightful." He said, "No, I'm not asking your personal opinion; I'm asking for you to be part of it." [Laughs], that was really the first that I heard of it. That's how we got here [laughs].

GS: One of the first things the viewer sees in *Call Me Kat* is the breaking down of the fourth wall. Can you please say something about working in that mode?

MB: I think a lot of people don't understand that we are literally motivated by our desire to honor the original *Miranda* for all the good that it has brought us. I was on *Blossom* when



I was a teenager, and Blossom actually kept a video diary, so I'm used to talking at the camera [laughs], to be honest. When we decided to keep that piece of Miranda, it seemed to make a lot of sense that this character is a woman who is not necessarily lonely, but she is alone a lot. In that sense, breaking the fourth wall is really her having the audience be part of her life. It's the way that people who do spend a lot of time on their own often do have to be creative with picturing who's listening and who cares about them. In this case, the audience cares about her is how she sees it.

GS: Call Me Kat allows you to display other aspects of your talents including your skills as a physical comedian. You even got to do spittakes in an episode. MB: [Big laugh.]

GS: What do you like best about that kind of humor?

MB: Keep in mind, not everything I do is stuff that I think is the funniest [laughs]. When I'm told to do a spit-take, I do a spit-take. That's kind of how it works. I've always been a very physical person. I was a dancer from the time I was very young. I grew up watching Lucille Ball and Carol Burnett and Tracey Ullman, women who really all inhabited their bodies in a very specific and comedic way. For me, I think that Darlene Hunt, our showrunner and creator, just incorporated a lot of things about me. I am very physically flexible, so she's capitalized on that. I like to say that if my mom, when I was 11 and started acting, could have designed a show for me, it would have been Call Me Kat, because this show takes everything I can do and it puts it in there [laughs]. She can sing, she can dance, she's funny with her

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body, she can kick high [laughs]. That's what it feels like.

GS: I'm so glad you mentioned singing because you do get to sing on the show. Is it daunting or fun to sing with and in the presence of Cheyenne Jackson who plays Max?

MB: It's absolutely terrifying! I specifically requested that I not have to sing in front of him for extended periods of time because, first of all, he's absolutely incredible. He also is a person who, if you ask him to sing something 62 times, it's going to sound amazing every single time. With me, you get about four takes out of me, and then my

voice starts to suffer because I'm not a professional. It's incredibly lovely how welcoming he is and how much support he gives me, but it really is standing in the presence of greatness to work with him and, especially, to sing in front of him [laughs].

GS: Cat has a secret crush on Max.



Have you ever had a secret crush on someone, and if so, how did that turn out?

MB: [Laughs] Well, they're not usually secret. I usually post on social media about them [big laugh]. I don't know if I've had a secret crush. Like I said, I feel like nothing's secret anymore thanks to the Internet

GS: I'm also glad we started talking about Cheyenne, because your queer fans will no doubt be delighted that he, as well as Leslie Jordan, are a couple of your *Call Me Kat* costars. Is it as much fun to work with them as it appears?

MB: Oh, absolutely! What I say about

Leslie Jordan is, everything that you wish he's like is what he's like. That is no joke. Everything he says is a sound bite. We get to hear him be a little raunchier with his language because we get to see parts of him that other people don't. He's delightful, he's hilarious. Everything he says is an unbelievable story or joke. I did not know much about Cheyenne, to be honest, before getting to work with him. He's just one of those people...his presence and his heart are so stunning. He's goofy and playful. He's adorable! We have a great time. I wouldn't say that if it wasn't true. I would just say, "Oh, he's really nice to work with."

GS: Early in your acting career, you played the young version of Bette Midler's character C.C. Bloom in *Beaches*. Did you develop a sense of a gay following after that? MB: I was told that I did and I found that to be true. I was raised by two very liberal documentary filmmakers who lived in the Village and had gay friends when that was a scandalous thing to



do. I was raised with a very strong love and appreciation for the gay community. My parents had gay friends. I grew up seeing men as couples in our home; having dinner with us and celebrating holidays with us. I have gay family members, as many of us do. I'm a happy liberal and loving ally. For sure the Bette Midler connection is a very specific thing, which I love to be part of.

GS: Lainie Kazan played your mother in *Beaches*, Kathy Bates played your mother on *The Big Bang Theory* and now Swoozie Kurtz is playing your mother on *Call Me Kat*. When it comes to playing a mother yourself, do you think you'll look to the examples they set for inspiration?

MB: [Big laugh] oh my God, that's an amazing question! I'm probably most like Lainie Kazan. I don't think I can avoid that. Actually, there's a lot of my mom in the Swoozie Kurtz character. But my mom's really the Bronx Jewish version.

GS: Kat owns and operates a catthemed café. Do you have any of your own pets, say a cat or a dog? MB: I do. I have three cats. I had four and, unfortunately, I lost one of them



during COVID. It was definitely a rough year in the cat department. But I do have three fur babies, as we call them. And like Kat, I like to say, "I'm not a sad cat lady, I'm a rad cat lady." **GS: Finally, what are you most looking forward to about being a guest host on Jeopardy!? MB:** Oh, my gosh. When I think of it, it

feels like it's going to be like a dream. I got to go to Egypt many years ago. I remember standing in front of the sphinx and the pyramids. I felt like I had walked into a postcard; it's that iconic an image. I guess I'm comparing the Jeopardy! set to the sphinx and the pyramids, but in terms of I feel like it's going to feel like I've been placed into a postcard of Jeopardy! I can't imagine it won't feel that way. I'm beyond excited! It is one of the most iconic things I think I'm ever going to do in my in my career.

Rufus, In Retrospect A Grammy nominee this year, the trailblazing crooner reflects on his 'funny little boy' past and talks virtual pandemic concerts

It all started with Rufus Wainwright in his bathrobe. The crooner, at the forefront of virtual pandemic performances in March 2020, performed a song a day at his home piano in the Hollywood Hills during his "Quarantunes Robe Recital" series for fans on IGTV.

Nearly a year into the pandemic, Wainwright has found himself doing what, for him, once seemed impossible – embracing the very technology he had adamantly abhorred. But since concert halls are still temporarily shut down due to COVID, Wainwright has, like many artists, turned to virtual platforms and has even realized their virtues.

"A song a day" turned into 45-minute concerts (no robe, real clothes) for live-

streaming concerts platform Veeps, entitled *Rufus-Retro-Wainwright-Spective!* The series continues this year as Wainwright reaches back into his catalog to perform parts of his studio albums *Out of the Game, Take All My Loves: 9 Shakespeare Sonnets* and *Unfollow the Rules,* along with cover songs. Additionally, Wainwright performs a special program of soundtrack songs called *Rufus at the Movies* and two *Rarities* concerts.

Released in 2020, *Unfollow the Rules* is Wainwright's latest studio album, which earned him his second Grammy nomination for Best Traditional Pop Vocal Album. Winners will be announced March 14.

Chris Azzopardi: How would you describe where you are on the pandemic front now?

Rufus Wainwright: Well, I'm in L.A., arguably the worst place to be on Earth. Obviously we have a new administration, and that's a great thing. L.A. is actually a good example of just the need of a kind of national strategy. I think without the government behind you, you're gonna eventually fail (laughs) when you're dealing with pandemics. So sadly, we are the guinea pig in that experiment. I'm pretty sure we've learned that lesson.

CA: I talked to you last year, and at that point we didn't know what was going to happen with the pandemic.

So much has changed that you have had to sort of become more technologically advanced. You have a whole crew working with you.

RW: Yeah, one of the plus sides of this pandemic situation is that before COVID I really had a very negative view of the internet and social media. I tended to pooh-pooh it on a regular basis and thought it was kind of, you know, below me.

I think it's still a double-edged sword, obviously, in the sense that there's very frightening sides of it, especially when you look at the political landscape. But nonetheless, I now rely on it, and I have a lot to be thankful for in terms of what it's brought me. It's kept my career going.

I do have a strong sense that there will be a kind of Renaissance after this period. I don't know if it will match the Italian Renaissance necessarily, but there's going to be a real outburst of creative work because there's just a lot to process, obviously.

CA: Are you tapping into that right now?

RW: Oh yeah.

CA: How so?

RW: I've been writing a lot. Even though I've written two operas and worked on the Shakespeare sonnets project and made a lot of albums, everybody's always like, "Rufus, when are you going to write a musical? I mean, it's ridiculous." So I've actually had a chance in this pandemic period to really think of stories that interest me and really start to talk to writers and directors and producers about starting to lay the groundwork for some of the project.

CA: Stage or movie musical?

RW: Either. I think the main goal is just to find that story that speaks to me and others.

CA: What happened to the locks?

RW: I just ... what happened? Well, I'm of a certain age (laughs) where long hair just makes you ... it starts to make you look scary. When you're young – or not even too young, but let's say in your 30s and under – you can pull the Jesus card occasionally, but not when you're over 40. It starts to look more John the Baptist.

CA: A "Rufus-Retro-Wainwright-Spective!" is a mouthful. I actually have to slow down to say it. Can you say that three times in a row? Because I can't.

RW: Well, it's good to slow down. Rufus-



Retro-Wainwright-Spective, Rufus-Retro-Wainwright-Spective. I say it all the time, so I know it, but yeah, that being said, it's good to slow down.

CA: How did these retrospective concerts come about?

RW: I have to credit a lot of these ideas to my husband, Jörn (Weisbrodt), who's also my manager. Before COVID, he started filming me every morning when I would rehearse a little bit and would occasionally put things out on Instagram because that's what one was starting to do a lot of. Then when COVID (happened), he immediately had the idea of doing a song day, which we did for about 60 days – the Robe Recitals.

So that started then, and that really meant a lot to a lot of people, myself included. It was a wonderful opportunity for me to go through my catalog, and so forth, and sing a lot of songs I hadn't thought of in a long time.

But then tours were canceled, band members had to be furloughed, and I was like, "I gotta start charging for this." (Laughs.) We just said, "Well, let's



make it into a real retrospective of my studio albums with a more COVIDfriendly ensemble." So there's only three of us playing together. It's been wonderful. It's been really great.

I also have one or two celebrity guests who come. We're all tested and we're all wearing masks, except me. I'm not wearing a mask because I'm singing. We also raise money for a charity of their choosing. We've had Jamie Lee Curtis; we had Darren Criss, we had Joel McHale. It's a bit of a Hollywood hang.

CA: Are you getting used to not performing in front of a real audience? Is that still weird?

RW: I miss performing in front of an audience. I will say that before COVID, I was working too much. I was touring my ass off for years, and that first three or four months, even five months, of COVID was actually a real godsend. I needed to stop. I needed to slow down. I think even the world needed that, just to kind of get some perspective. So I learned to appreciate that, and feel very fortunate that I was able to do that and not lose my job and keep my house and everything. But that being said, I'm dying to go out now. I'm really itching to hit the road.

CA: You're slated to tour this summer in Europe. Do you still expect to?

RW: Your guess is as good as mine. If I had to put money on a date or a period, I would say August, probably. I could see August really happening. But that's all I can say. It doesn't mean that the rest of the summer won't happen, but I just feel like (there will) be more of a solid system together by August for touring, whether it'll be socially distant or have smaller capacities. We'll see.

CA: You'll also be doing a virtual *Rarities* program. What is that going to look like?

RW: That was a suggestion from one of the fans. It's kind of an interesting idea. I haven't gone over the list yet totally, so I can't really express too much of what's going to happen. But what's fun is: I think now I write songs for lots of purposes, whether it's trying to get on the radio, or for a musical, or for a movie, or what I'm experiencing myself personally. But I think there was a time when I was younger when I really went out on a lot of weird limbs, that kind of youthful sophomoric confidence that I think some of those songs (are) imbued with.


CA: What do you think are your "weird limbs"?

RW: There are probably a lot of songs I wrote back then where I had no sense of purpose. It was completely experimental and completely just getting lost in the material. Like, I hadn't really loved yet, I hadn't really experienced loss, I hadn't really been sick or seen death. So there's this sort of innocence that exists in some of them, so I'm excited to revisit that funny little boy.

CA: Now that you have lived through some of those life experiences, perhaps your perspective might've shifted in how you perform them or interpret them.

RW: It's funny because right before COVID, or a few months before, I had gone out for the 20th anniversary tour of my first two albums, the *Poses* tour, so I did *Rufus Wainwright* and *Poses* with a band and went all around the world for that. I was pleasantly surprised (laughs)





in terms of hitting that material again 20 years later by how – I don't know, for lack of a better word – profound my emotions were at that age, or at least how sincere and true they were. You know, I wasn't being melodramatic; I was really searching. Because I took myself very seriously when I was young. (Laughs.) Probably too much so. But within the music, it was warranted.

CA: Regarding *Unfollow the Rules*, I can't believe this is only your second Grammy nomination.

RW: I'm not totally surprised only because *I* don't know what I do. (Laughs.) I've never been able to define myself. So God forbid the Grammys can! But I think this one – I've admitted it before, and I kind of regret that a little bit, but the cat's outta the bag and, I mean, I wanna win this. (Laughs.) Just to get it over with. So, therefore, I probably won't. But we'll see.

CA: Does this nomination feel any different than the nomination you got for *Rufus Does Judy at Carnegie Hall*?

RW: Yeah, I think when the Judy Garland album was nominated over 10 years ago, I kind of knew in my bones that I didn't stand a chance mainly because at that time I was up against Natalie Cole and Natalie Cole was very sick. She had kidney transplants and stuff, so I was like, "There goes my Grammy." But I feel that with this one there's more of a sense of ... I think precisely what you said: I think a lot of people in the know are like, he probably deserves one at this point.

25-year-old model Reno Gold was raised most of his life in Reno, Nevada. Hence his stage name. Gold was added because he mistakenly thought Nevada was the gold state. He would later learn it's actually the silver state.

While gogo-ing and stripping at area clubs, he learned how guys were flocking to a new website called Onlyfans. He followed their lead and created his own page. It was slow to take off but as he focused on quality and consistency with content, he saw his earnings grow. The page really blew up when he started cross promoting on YouTube and marketing his personality just as much as he was his body.

Today he makes close to \$100,000 a month -- recently surpassing the one-milliondollar mark – and has over 6,000 online boyfriends from around the world. "It's a lot of work maintaining all of these relationships and keeping everyone satisfied," he laughs. "At first, money was the main motivator for my work, but now I want to go down in history as the best content creator in the second golden era of porn!"

We spoke with Reno Gold from his home in Miami.

Shane Gallagher: What is like running one of the most popular pages on OnlyFans? Reno Gold: The best part is being able to connect with fans all over the world. I message my fans daily so I'm never lonely. I also get to be creative and direct all my own scenes. The worst part would probably be that most people don't understand my work. I created a YouTube channel to fight the stigma surrounding sex work.

SG: How does being so public impact

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your dating life? RG: I'm not dating and not really looking to date, so, I'm not sure.

SG: When you are looking, what do you seek for in guy?

RG: I look for someone who's silly and doesn't take themselves too seriously. I

find it attractive when someone is well educated and driven. Physically, I like someone who's in shape and active.

SG: What is something fans would be surprised to know about you? RG: I think fans would be surprised to know how much they've actually



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changed my life with their support.

SG: Are you superstitious?

RG: I'm a big believer in the law of attraction and how what you put out in the universe, you receive back.

SG: Do you have a secret talent?

RG: I can suck my own d*ck but I guess that's not much of a secret anymore. I'm an artist! I do surrealism, mainly in charcoal.

SG: What would a film of your life be called, and who would star as you in it? RG: Gold Digger: The

RG: Gold Digger: The Musical, starring James Franco.

SG: What makes you smile? RG: Finishing a video project.

SG: What makes you angry? RG: People who think they are better than others.

SG: Who are your heroes? RG: My heroes would definitely be my family. I'm so close to both my parents and sisters.



Health Care Power of Attorney

The Illinois legislature periodically enacts legislation designed to update the Illinois Power of Attorney for Health Care Act. Recent changes concern who may act as agent or witness the form, as well as significant changes to the lengthy Notice section and the form itself that broadens its scope and attempts to make it more user-friendly. Gone are definitions of "incurable or irreversible condition."

"permanent unconsciousness," and "terminal condition" which relate in the previous form to points when life support may be withdrawn. The new form no longer calls for such triggerpoints.

There are changes to as witness requirements and who may witness health care agencies. The law expressly prohibits these enumerated "licensed professionals providing services to the principal" from serving as witnesses: attending physician; mental health service provider; advanced practice nurses; physician assistant; dentist; podiatric physician; optometrist; and relatives of any such professionals.

Health care facility operators (e.g., directors and executives) may not witness, but that prohibition does not apply to "non-owner chaplains or social workers, nurses, and other employees."

The statutory short form presumes that the principal is granting broad-based authority to his or her agent to make decisions in all types of health care scenarios. The choices for life-sustaining treatment have changed significantly and the form now asks the agent to choose between quantity of life and quality of life. There are also check-box options for invoking the start of the authority (upon execution of the form or upon the physician's determination).

The law rewrites the "Notice to the Individual Signing the Power of Attorney for Health Care," which appears at the beginning of the health care form, and continues for roughly five pages. It adds a number of sections in Q&A format, illustrating the breadth of the power and addressing

various circumstances that may arise:

"What are the Things I Want My Health Care Agent to Know?" warns of the importance of choosing a trustworthy agent, but recommends particular topics and considerations to independently address with the prospective agent. "What Kind of Decisions Can My Agent Make?" outlines numerous dilemmas that an agent may face and provides examples as to how the principal may limit or direct these decisions.

"Whom Should I Choose to be My Health Care Agent?" elaborates considerably upon the prior version's mere



recommendation that the agent be "trustworthy." For example, a person should choose an agent who "would not be too upset to carry out your wishes if you became very sick" and is "comfortable talking with and questioning physicians."

"What if My Agent is Not Available or is Not Willing to Make Decisions for Me?" explains the role of successor agents and their importance.


"What Will Happen if I Do Not Choose a Health Care Agent?" describes the surrogacy statute and the potential benefits of appointing an agent over relying on the default authority provided for by statute.

"What if I Change My Mind?" addresses how to destroy the documents or fill out a new form.

The Health Care Power Act supersedes all other Illinois laws that remain inconsistent with it. In particular, if an individual has signed a Living Will Declaration under the Illinois Living Will Act, the Declaration will remain inoperative as long as an agent remains available under the health care power of attorney to address life-sustaining or death-delaying procedures on behalf of the individual.

Under the Saving Clause, all powers of attorney for health care that were validly created prior will be grand fathered in under the statute. Nevertheless, I always encourage people to review plans periodically to ensure that they still adequately address needs.

"As you wish, Your Majesty," I responded. I asked Siri for a copy of the sermon on a thumb drive, and I hurried back to town. There, I called an urgent meeting of Cindy and Xandra (for Donut Time) plus Mike and Dave. It was not until later in the day –when school was over – that Dave was able to join us. We met in my room at the stable, where we could watch the recording. When Dave arrived I could see he already knew the news about the campers, but he remained silent until we had all had a chance to listen to the sermon.

Xandra quietly seethed in anger, but Cindy showed once again why she had selected as her personal motto the words, "Don't fuck with me, Bitch!"

Cindy laid down a marker. "If that oily, frog-faced, dickless blob of grease dares show his sorry ass in Donut Time, I'm gonna..." Xandra cut her off. "Cindy! Don't let him drag you down to his level. We'll

defend ourselves; we'll be ready for them if they try anything violent or illegal." There was a brief pause, and I interjected.

"You need to show Aly, Grandma Lily and the Outlaws this video. They need to know what's going on. Honestly, I think there's something else at work here, too."

Milwaukee Pride, Inc. - parent organization of PrideFest, Wisconsin's largest LGBTQ+ event - announced today that it is officially canceling the four-day event slated for June. The festival was set to take place at the Henry W. Maier Festival Grounds from Thursday, June 3-Sunday, June 6, 2021. This is the second year in a row PrideFest has been canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"After much consideration, we cannot move forward with planning a June 2021 festival without knowing how and when a vaccine will be distributed throughout our community equally" said *Wes Shaver*, Milwaukee Pride, Inc. President. "It is still unclear as to how (or if) public gatherings will happen in 2021 and we cannot risk the health and wellbeing of our community by putting the festival ahead of the people it serves. Now, more than ever, we need to amplify the work of our community partners and increase accessibility and awareness of the many services, resources, and programs available to support LGBTQ+ people."

Chicago LGBT Hall of Fame Calls for 2021 Nominees



The Chicago LGBT Hall of Fame, celebrating its 30th year, is seeking nominations for new inductees. The deadline for nominations is May 31, 2021. The nominations will be reviewed by a committee comprised of current Chicago LGBT Hall of Fame members, after which a slate of inductees will be voted in. Every year, PrideFest hosts a Health & Wellness area that's open to organizations to showcase their programs, services, people and resources that serve the community (as well as other underserved and represented groups). While the physical space is unavailable for 2021, Milwaukee Pride is launching a digital Health & Wellness space that allows quick access to anyone . This digital platform will allow participants a FREE listing, so no cost to the organization, to participate in the state-wide directory. Milwaukee Pride IS accepting donations towards the initiative, but, this is a FREE service and opportunity.

"When I first realized there may be rules, regulations, and guidelines for entry into a public space, I knew we would not be able to have a June festival," said Shaver. "There are serious

community in Chicago. From its founding in 1991 until 2016, the Gay & Lesbian Hall of Fame relied on financial and staff support from the City of Chicago. "We don't want people to think there will be no PRIDE this year," said *Luke Olson*, PrideFest Festival Producer and VP of Milwaukee Pride, Inc. "We simply want to ensure we're taking the right steps forward. We hope people trust that our intentions are for the safety of the community, and for efforts for a digital Health & Wellness will continually put access at the forefront of our community efforts year-round." *For more information visit http://*

FRANK IERO AND THE FUTURE VIOLENTS RELEASE EP HEAVEN IS A PLACE, THIS IS A PLACE



Serving as a companion piece to 2019's critically acclaimed full length, *Barriers*, the EP is split into two distinct movements.

Side A reveals the true meaning of "Violence", a song title lero has teased on bass drums in all his Future Violents music videos. Indeed, it's opening gambit of "You got so sick, I thought I'd die, you got so down, I couldn't get high" before the chorus refrain of "Your violence feels like kisses to me, your silence makes it harder to breathe, your distance feels like I'm not enough... I need your touch." see's lero at his most scathing and damaged. Never have these words felt more relevant as they do now. This ferocity and redemptive anger continues into "Sewerwolf" where in the chorus lero professes, "I come alive forged in fire, My love will break these chains built

from pain, they can't hold me down." In total contrast to side A, side B finds the band more delicate and thoughtful, complete with soaring soundscapes before the final crescendo of Record Ender. All while paying beautiful tribute to lero's journey with The Future Violents and it's members musical fortitude.

In 2016, lero and his guitar-playing brother in law, *Evan Nestor*, were involved in a brutal motor vehicle accident in Australia – one they barely survived. During the process of recovery, the REM song, *"Losing My Religion"* started making pivotal appearances in unusual places / weird circumstance and the mantra repeated itself as time went on.

When lero resumed touring, post accident in 2017, one of the members of the support band, *Kayleigh Goldsworthy*, struck a chord both literally and proverbially.

"The Future Violents was the perfect band at the perfect time for me. The creativity flowed through us like rapids and we didn't stop writing because we ran out of inspiration...it was just time to go to the studio. In fact I was still writing at the studio, but I allowed myself the luxury of 14 songs on the record leaving 3 to survive in the shadows. Lying in wait. I knew I wanted them to see the light, it was just a matter of how and when."

Elaborating on the origins of the EP, lero comments, "The title of the EP actually comes from the night before we started recording Barriers at Electrical Audio in Chicago. The band went out to eat and get drinks at a local Tiki bar called, Lost Lake. On the menu that night there was a drink called Heaven is a place/This is the place."shares lero on the meaning behind the EP title. "I love when the universe gives you gifts like that. You just have to be in tune to your surroundings. The name struck me as clever and I started to think about how changing one word in that title meant something way more profound to me. Heaven is a place, if you believe in that sort of thing...It is the reward at the end of a long hard journey of fighting the good fight and living your life to whatever standards you hold dear. But it's just a place. And so is this...This is a place, the earthly realm, miraculous on so many levels but also just a place. The difference is you and your perception.'

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
