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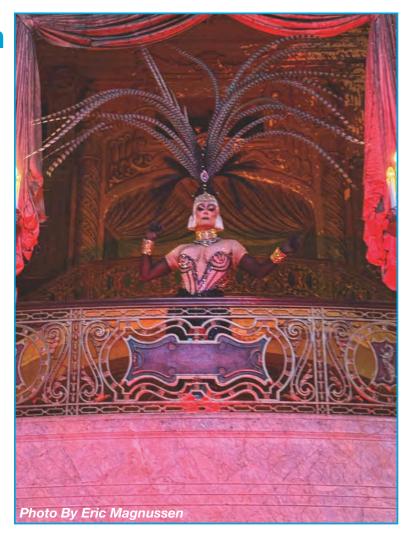

Interview with Circuit Mom aka Matthew Harvat

Is it possible for a building to have a soul? For a theater to be a muse? What if every precious brick, every carved cornice, and every handpainted decoration held the echoes of the craftsmen who lovingly held them? What if the building itself soaked in the laughter and joy of crowds, shouldering the weight of epic talents, spanning a myriad of musical genres, to become a grand golden inspirational spirit of music itself? Of course we're talking about the Uptown Theatre, a building so steeped in entertainment history that Chicago aches for her return and the throwing open of shuttered doors. The Uptown Theatre is the incarnation of Euterpe, the muse of lyrical expression, bejeweled and clothed in a Spanish Baroque Revival gown, and while her glory is dimmed and in need of revival and loving care, she awaits us. The Uptown theater still glimmers in the dark behind boarded up windows like an undiscovered Klimt painting calling out to be unleashed. She is a century old, but her burnished beauty is poised to uplift a new generation of artists and audiences.

The King of Swing himself: Chicago's own Benny Goodman, a pioneer in the racial integration of bands, blew the curtains off the Uptown Theatre with sweat, strings. and cymbals crashing. Duke Ellington's brass notes spilled like a honeved river down Broadway when jazz was king and ladies dressed to the nines shimmied in glittery clouds through the Uptown's gilt halls. Rick James and Prince brought leather and lace and everything electric. Powercords ripped through the night skies of Chicago's Northside. Tina Turner stomped those boards into oblivion. Springsteen brought his



tight jeans and his rough hewn rasp begging for glory days. Robert Palmer had a bad case of loving you and The Grateful Dead threw their arms around Chicago audiences in a dreamy haze.

But the Uptown Theatre wasn't just a home to Billboard chart toppers. This Golden Grande Dame of Chicago was also an inspiration to many up and coming local talents, and even a home to major queer events like the Hearts Party circuit event in 2000 to benefit people impacted by HIV and AIDS. In fact the Uptown neighborhood in the late nineties was a pivotal center of Chicago's queer circuit scene, drawing crowds of locals and attendees from around the world. And while the Uptown Theatre did

"formally" close her doors in 1981, she was home for one last glorious hurrah in the year of the millennium for a celebration of life in the face of fear and oppression. On a shivery Valentine's night, thousands of queer celebrants filed into the lobby of the Uptown to dance and love each other, their hearts filled with pride and music. And the last performer, on that last night, was our own local Grand Dame - Circuit Mom.

We caught up with Circuit Mom, aka Matthew Harvat, who is in fact a very real person, to chat about the legacy of the Uptown Theatre and how he and his team revisited the space for a special editorial for our current issue.

Tom Olah: We are living for these

photos, you're bringing all the Old Hollywood glam. You're giving yearning by candlelight for a gothic romance in your tiara of pheasant feathers. And the lobby of the Uptown Theatre is so stunning. What a backdrop!

Circuit Mom: [Laughs] I am! It's my 1920's silent screen diva meets Sunset Boulevard moment. And yes the lobby of the Uptown Theatre is truly iconic.

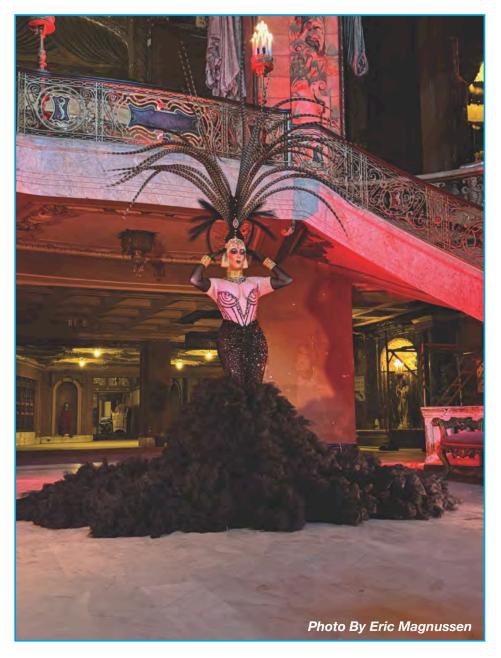
TO: You are certainly painted to perfection. That gown is overflowing with snatch. It's a tumultuous storm of glittery, voluminous, thunderous clouds of gayness.

CM: You noticed? (Laughs) That would be the brilliance of my costume designer, wigmaker, makeup guru. and all around artistic collaborator du jour: Joshuan Aponte. The whole CircuitMOM team is incredible and I just want to thank them for the outstanding work they did. Our photographer, Erik Magnussen, my production partner in crime Edwin Martinez, decor diva Tyler Miller, and the king of my social media chaos: Graham Hawley. Special shout out to Jerry Mickelson,

Andy Pierce, Colette Smithburg and John Booher for making this dream come true.

TO: This is a bit of a full circuit (see what I did there) moment for you. We ask you for a cover image and you surprise us with this Cedric Gibbons MGM-style extravaganza of drama. How did this come to pass? What is your history with the Uptown Theatre and what was it like to be the last performer in that space?

CM: It was one of the defining moments of my career and life. I



attended my first Hearts Party, which was also my first circuit party ever, in February of 1992 (also held in the lobby of the Uptown Theatre) and was blown away by the grandeur and historic significance of the space, plus the energy of the crowd and the music. Little did I know that evening would change my life and take me to where I am today. There was the beginning of a dream inside me that night, I could feel the soul of the theater in my heart. Four years later, Circuit Mom was born.

TO: Wait. Tell us about that. CM: I was at a major circuit festival weekend in Atlanta in 1996 and the venue ran out of bottled water for the guests, so they were just filling plastic pitchers of water and setting out cups for people to serve themselves. I thought it would be funny to randomly show up in the middle of the dance floor with a stack of cups and pitchers of water to my friends. As I made my way through the crowd, a guy stopped me and said "It's our circuit angel coming to save us?" But his friend corrected him and said, "No, it's our circuit mom!"

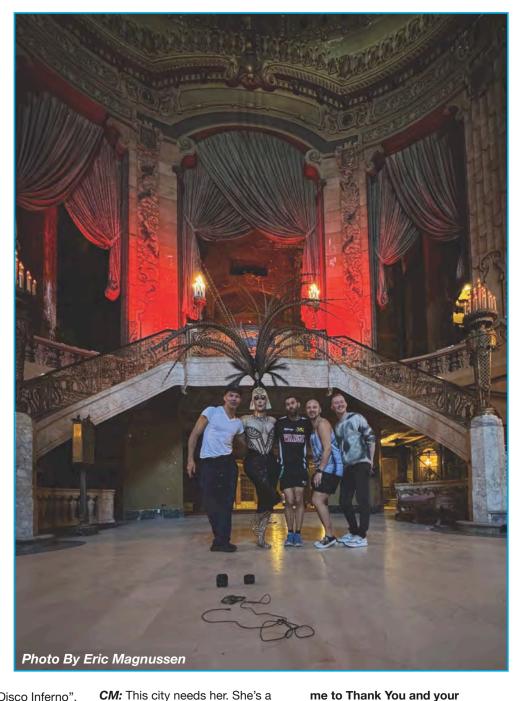
Two years later, I was performing as Circuit Mom for the

first time at Crobar for Glee Club. I made my own mix of Ultra Nate's "Found A Cure" on cassette and had two dancers! The legendary Teri Bristol was the DJ. TO: Two whole dancers! And now vou produce events on a massive scale, hundreds of artists and dancers. Crowds of thousands. You've come very far. CM: Yes, from very humble beginnings. But my successes now are really about the incredible people I get to work with and my absolute love for the people who come to my events. I treasure each and every person that walks through the door. And I know that I'm so lucky to do this.

My first major evenť as Circuit Mom was Mark Baker's "Gav Disney" Colosseum party in Orlando in 1999. And the performance at the Uptown Theatre was shortly after. I ran with a fire theme for the music using two newly released remixes of Funky Green Dog's "Fired Up" and Cyndi

Lauper's version of "Disco Inferno". DJ Pete Crow created our show mix that featured 44 performers, with choreography by Todd Kiech and the night DJ'd by the incomparable Abel Aguilera, and I felt like I was home. Like I was connected to everyone there and we were all experiencing the same love and joy for the music and the space.

TO: Well, kudos to you and to the Uptown Theatre. Do you think she's coming back someday?



CM: This city needs her. She's a jewel in Chicago's crown and a potential beacon for a whole new era of entertainment. The Uptown Theatre is a muse just waiting to inspire future artists the way her neighbors, the Riviera Theater and the Aragon Ballroom have been doing for decades.

"Plainclothes" make the men: an interview Tom Blyth and Russell Tovey

"Plainclothes" (Magnolia), the directorial debut by queer filmmaker and screenwriter Carmen Emmi, is not as simple as the title might suggest. There is also a double-meaning at play as neither of the main characters – Lucas (Tom Blyth) and Andrew (out actor Russell Tovey) – is dressed in their respective "uniforms" when they first meet.

Already "certified fresh" on rottentomatoes.com, "Plainclothes" features such stellar performances by Tovey and Blyth, that it's likely to be the movie that will not only make the actors bigger stars than they already are, but also earn them well-deserved Oscar nominations. Tom and Russell kindly made time for a Zoom interview shortly before the film was released in theaters.

Gregg Shapiro: Russell and Tom, I'd like to begin by asking each of you to say a few words about what attracted you to the roles of Andrew and Lucas, respectively, in "Plainclothes." Tom Blyth: Lucas, for me, is someone who's going through immense difficulty and is facing up to some self-truths. I'm always drawn to characters who are trying to understand themselves in a serious, deep way. Probably because I'm doing that as well. I come at this from a psychological standpoint, so I think I'm drawn to a character who is going through psychological turmoil. And the script is absolutely beautiful. That was my main draw.

Russell Tovey: I second that the script is beautiful. For me, dialogue connects me straight away to a character. When I started reading Andrew, I was like, "Oh, yeah, I want to say these lines." I wanted to do a film in Syracuse. I thought Syracuse sounded like a beautiful, wonderful paradise. Parts of it are like paradise, and other parts, not so much. But it was a great experience. It's new writing and a new director. It always feels so exciting when you get a script like this. These don't happen all the time. So, it was an easy yes. GS: I'm glad you mentioned that because "Plainclothes" is the feature-length directorial debut for Carmen Emmi, who also wrote the screenplay. What are the advantages of working with a first-time filmmaker for an actor?

RT: I don't know if it's an advantage, but you feel the excitement. You feel a responsibility, I guess, to be your best for them. You want them to have the best experience ever. In the way that Andrew wants Lucas to have the best experience ever in this film, with his first time with someone, with a gay man, with a man. We, as actors, want to make sure that Carmen wants to continue working after we finish his film, for sure. You've got someone who is so excited and so full of gratitude. He's experimental. That's what's so shocking about the way that Carmen made this film. I had no idea what was going on when we first started. When he pulled the camcorder out, when he was doing certain shots. I was like, "I don't understand this," but it was



so intoxicating working with him on his first film. What he does next and where his trajectory is going is so brilliant.

TB: There's a bravery in a first-time filmmaker, I've noticed, that is simultaneously bravery and anxiety. They know what they want to do, and they're working from instinct because they've not been told no too many times by producers, or financiers, or whatever it may be.

RT: They're not jaded yet.

TB: They've not gotten the outside critiques which filmmakers throughout their careers get. There's this bravery of, "I'm just gonna enact my vision." Then there's this anxiety because it's their first big film. That anxiety feels collaborative because they don't think they know it all, and they lean on everyone else as much as they lean on their own vision. So, it creates this incredible mix of boldness and collaboration, which you don't always get.

GS: "Plainclothes" is set in 1997, almost 30 years ago, at a time before Grindr and other hook-up apps, when there were limited options available to gay men for casual interactions. Do either of you find it shocking to think about how much things have changed and advanced in 30 years?

RT: Thirty years is basically Tom's whole life.

TB: [Laughs]

RT: The world just gets faster and faster, doesn't it? I mean, what can you do? It is shocking for so many other things, that it's terrifying at the speed of the way that everything's going. I miss CDs. I miss them. You can quote me on that. The way that queer people, or anybody, can find connections with people online now is fascinating and brilliant and terrifying and rewarding and depressing, and all of those feelings completely. But there's something romantic about the way that these guys meet that feels furtive and dangerous. That's the situation that so many people were in. There weren't safe spaces created for



people, so they were pushed to the margins, and they ended up in dangerous situations. This is a very dangerous situation, but through this place of adversity and danger, something beautiful grows. TB: Russell and I have both talked about this recently. I do think we have this feeling, even more so this year than last year when we were making this film, that it is more necessary than ever because it does feel like we're moving backwards at the moment, politically and socially. I don't think we even knew a year ago, when we were making it, how much a year later it would feel like the wheel of time is going backwards. I'm very proud to be able to champion this film, right now especially.

GS: Thank you for saying that, Tom. "Plainclothes" also reminded me of how police departments have changed in their attitudes towards gay men. From entrapping them in restrooms to, at least here in the States, actively recruiting them to join the force. TB: I don't know much about police policies, to be honest with you. I would be lying if I said I did. I did a lot of research on them in the '90s. but it's probably very different to now. Around the conversation of representation and policing, how can you expect people who are supposed to be bastions or representatives of a community, as a whole, without representation from that community? I don't understand the people who think that you could have a small minority of white, lowermiddle-class to working-class men, policing everybody else. They won't be able to always have the empathy needed to police a community. I think that's why we run into trouble in policing. I think the idea that there should be representation in policing is integral.

GS: The thrill and risk of sex in a public place, whether a mall men's room or a greenhouse, gives "Plainclothes" a distinctive eroticism. The scene in the greenhouse was especially touching. Can you both please comment on that?

RT: Well, it was hot. And we're playing that it's cold outside, so we're bundled up in layers. Not much sex goes on in the bathrooms because everyone seems to be caught, or it's very momentarily sexy and fraught, and then it ends. So, for our characters to have that time where we can be free - it's not a bed, it's not a house, it's not domestic - it is still somewhere that's furtive. But for us to have that moment where we can close the door and be free with each other is so beautiful. Someone said the other day that when they watched it, that when you go into the greenhouse all the flowers feel like "The "Wizard of Oz." It goes into Technicolor. Before that, everything's grey and muted, and that door opens and you've got all of this sort of Oz. This beautiful world where they exist and they're amongst flowers and foliage and botanicals, and it's historical. That's so true! I'm sure Carmen's considered that, because one of his

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favorite films is "The Wizard of Oz." That is such a beautiful way to turn the story, and that is the truth of that scene. These guys are finally in their utopia.

GS: "Plainclothes" is set in upstate New York which meant that you both had to master

not only an American accent, but also a regional one.

TB: I would never claim to have mastered anything because I'd be shooting myself in the foot. But we had a really great dialect coach called Sam Lilja. It's a small-budget film, so we didn't get a ton of time with Sam, but the time we did get was really valuable. I've been lucky enough to live in the States for the past nine years, so I often don't know what my actual voice is anymore, which I think is helpful. It makes me able to pretend to be other people. **RT:** I've worked and lived in the States for many

years. I spend a

just speaking in

the accent until

someone British

from home spots me, and they call me a freak. I will go into like diners or restaurants or stores and talk in an American accent so that it just becomes second nature. That felt important. I think the Syracuse accent... it's not typically what we know as the Bronx, New York, or Queens accent. It's more neutral, but there are twangs. A lot of the cast and crew, Carmen especially, were from Syracuse. So that noise you need is around you all the time. If it had been a British crew, it might have been a little harder to stay on in that sound. But I think we both were able to tune into

it because everyone around us was talking in it.

TB: I think Russell and I also work in a similar way, which is that we stay in it on set when we need to and then are able to jump out if we need to go back to zero and reset, as well. and have a funny moment. It's nice



when you work with someone who has a similar sensibility to you and isn't too constricted and has to stav in it all the time or never wants to stay in it. It was nice to be able to play off each other like that.

GS: The scenes throughout the movie with Lucas and his family are highly charged and reach their peak in the film's final moments, while the scene where Andrew's family appears at his place of work is also emotionally devastating. Can you say something about how you prepare

for those kinds of scenes?

RT: You just get in the zone. The crew and the cast were incredibly professional and respectful, and liked actors. Sometimes you work at jobs, and you feel like they don't like actors [laughs], which isn't helpful. Across the board, everybody wanted

this to be a beautiful

experience, and it was. When we needed that time, it was available to us. I think Carmen was very sure of that. Carmen did something amazing, which I've tried to take onto every job since, is that he plays music into scenes. We all know what that feels like, when you're on public transport or in the back of a car and a song comes on and you can sort of imagine this makebelieve, Hollywood ending of your life. Music is a kind of fast hack into emotions. and I think that that made a massive difference for me.

TB: That scene, in particular, was really intense. I remember that day being really intense. I remember leaving the scene feeling dissatisfied and feeling like I hadn't done it right. I think that's because that's how Lucas feels. Carmen said that to me. He could sense that I was beating myself up about how the scene had gone. He was like, "Why would you be feeling good about it when Lucas is feeling bad?" Lucas goes there to profess his love for a man for the first time, that he truly does love, and

he basically is told to grow up, that he's being with unrealistic, because Andrew has his own life and he's shown up there inappropriately to interrupt his life. He's put Andrew's life and his family in jeopardy. Andrew's protecting himself and his family, and so Lucas is incredibly angry at himself, and Andrew, and disappointed and confused. I think I felt confused and disappointed and sad, which is sometimes how it goes. You put yourself fully in the circumstances of the scene, even if that doesn't make you feel like you're doing it right.

Man in the Mirror

Justin Jedlica Stars in Reflections

Justin Jedlica, widely recognized as the "Human Ken Doll" for his pioneering work in body modification, is one of the bold personalities featured in Reflections, filmmaker Michael Hyman's daring new video series that turns the camera—and the mirror—on identity, beauty, and self-worth.

Shot on 16mm film and inspired by Andy Warhol's iconic 1960s Screen Tests, the sixteen shorts challenge participants representing a diverse cross-section of the LGBTQIA+ community to confront their own reflection in silence for four minutes. For Jedlica, a well-known advocate for plastic surgery who has built a life in Los Angeles as an artist, content creator, and real estate designer, the experience was a powerful act of self-love and a natural extension of his lifelong exploration of image, authenticity, and reinvention. He explains more.

Shane Gallagher: Where did you grow up?

Justin Jedlica: I grew up in upstate New York and then in Cary, North Carolina, in a working-class, creative household where money was often tight. For much of my life, I felt different, misunderstood, and even unaccepted.

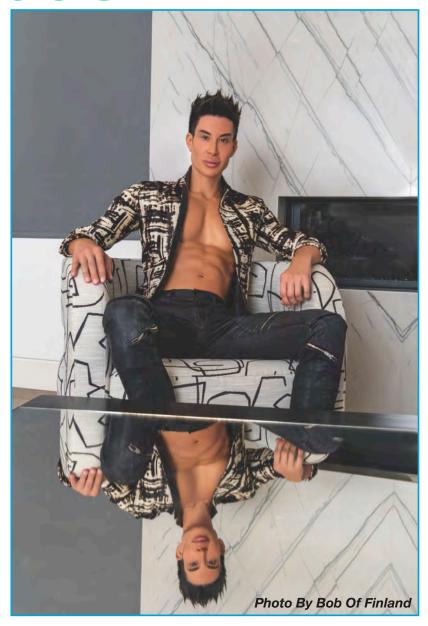
SG: What inspired you to move to Los Angeles?

JJ: L.A. represented possibility.

SG: Were you chasing superstar dreams?

JJ: I was chasing something more than fame. I wanted a place where transforming my body, building a personal brand, and expressing myself visually could become both art and business.

SG: What's a typical day in your life like today?



JJ: My days are a blend of content creation, cosmetic-art projects, brand management, consulting, and planning future transformations. I also have a passion for real estate and design. I love flipping properties and reimagining spaces. I've always had a thing for mirrors. To me, mirrors don't just reflect, they open a room.

SG: Is that fascination with mirrors what drew you to participate in Reflections?

JJ: The project resonated with me.

It took me years to recognize that my differences are what make me unique. Realizing that my sexual attraction, gender identity, and personal interest in modifying myself weren't negatives but strengths gave me confidence to own my truth. I viewed Reflections as a chance to stand in truth while also contributing to something that could help others embrace their own self-acceptance.

SG: How did you approach the idea of sitting silently with your own mirrored image for four

minutes?

JJ: For me, the challenge was that I'm typically not someone who does well with silence. Reflections required me to maintain it for four minutes: just me and my mirrored image. Approaching that was about letting go of distractions and being willing to see myself without interruption. It was both strange and surprisingly grounding to face that stillness.

SG: Did the silence feel freeing?

JJ: It was both freeing and uncomfortable. Freeing because without words there was nothing to hide behind, and uncomfortable because that forced me to confront myself directly.

SG: Andy Warhol's Screen Tests often revealed unexpected aspects of his subjects. Do you feel your Reflections film revealed something new about you?

JJ: Yes. It revealed how I've evolved

how I've evolved beyond the aesthetics. I've grown internally. I walked away with a clearer sense of how comfortable I've become in my own

skin, not just in terms of looks, but in self-worth. My worth isn't defined by surface-level judgments, but by staying true to myself despite outside pressures. The experience was a reminder that self-worth is as much internal as it is external.

SG: How do you think audiences will respond?

JJ: I know that people often approach me with preconceived ideas based on my appearance. Reflections will give them an opportunity to see another side: the



person behind the surface. I think some people will be surprised, and hopefully they'll come away recognizing the importance of difference and diversity within our community.

SG: Are you still a work in progress or would you say you're a completed work of art?

JJ: I see myself as an evolving work of art. I'm proud of what I've built physically, professionally, and through design and real estate but I will never think of myself as

"finished." There's always another canvas; another space to reinvent.

Q-Music: Looking over the overlooked

Rachael Yamagata and Keren Ann (Zeidel) have more in common than just being singer/songwriters at the back end of the alphabet. They are both gifted artists who put in time on major labels in the early 2000s and have continued to put out music independently.

If you lived in Chicago (and possibly elsewhere) during the late 1990s, you probably came across the psychedelic funk of Bumpus, a band that featured Rachael Yamagata as a member and cosongwriter. Her distinctively smoky vocals gave the band a particular sizzle. Yamagata released a solo EP in 2003, and followed it with the gorgeous, and severely underrated full-length album "Happenstance" in 2004. Four years later, the doubledisc "Elephants... Teeth Sinking Into

Heart" found Yamagata moving in a more experimental direction, and she released a few other indie records in the 2010s. "Starlit Alchemy" (Jullian) is Yamagata's first new studio album In nearly 10 years. Citing influences including Joni Mitchell (the intimacy of "Blue Jay"), Tom Waits (the lyrics in "Birds"), Rickie Lee Jones (listen to the piano on "Backwards"), and Hans Zimmer (the cinematic scope of

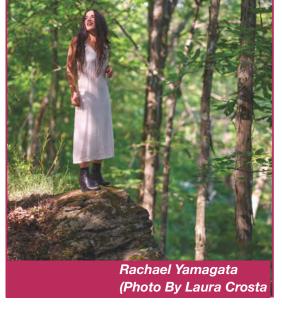

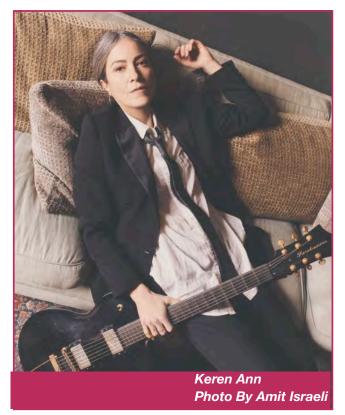

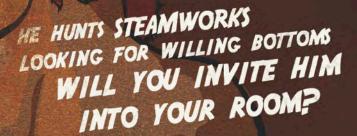

Keren Ann, a multilingual performer currently based in Paris (!), released three exceptional Englishlanguage albums between 2003 and 2007 that never reached the audience they deserved. She teamed up with Icelandic musician Barði Jóhannsson to become Lady & Bird for the duo's eponymous in 2006 album, featuring original songs and covers of The Velvet Underground's "Stephanie Says," as well as the "M*A*S*H" theme song "Suicide is Painless. Additionally, six of her songs were included in gay filmmaker Eytan Fox's extraordinary 2012 movie "Yossi," a sequel to Fox's "Yossi & Jagger."

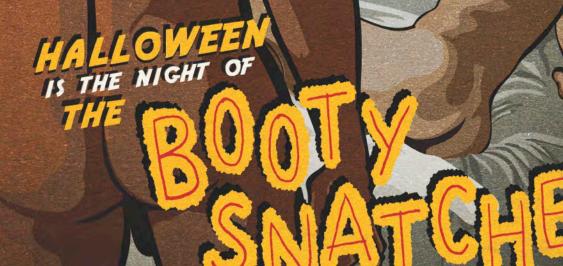
Her new album, "Paris Amour" (Bring Back Music), is performed almost entirely en français (with the exception of a few lines in English in "Le Musique A Fond"). The good news is that you don't have to speak the language to enjoy the listening experience. For example, it doesn't take a native speaker to hear the affection emanating from the modern pop of the title track. Cinematic numbers such as "Les Désirs Fatiqués Des Navires d'Argent" and "L'Expérience Étrange de L'Inégal," will no doubt conjure images of Catherine Deneuve and Jean-Paul Belmondo to many listeners. "Que La Vie Est Belle" and "L'Écho des Tirs" are also standouts.

Guardian For Your Minor Child

Q: I previously adopted two boys several years ago while I was single. I am now in a new relationship with my new girlfriend and planning on traveling out of the country on business. My new girlfriend has agreed to take care of the boys while I am gone, but I am worried that while I am out of the country, there will be no one authorized to handle legal matters to care for my seven and nineyear-old boys. And what would happen if my boys had a health issue and needed medical care? Who would authorize it if I were not around? I would like my girlfriend to have the authority to make these decisions for my sons while I am gone. What can I do?

A: First, You can use a Health Care Power of Attorney to authorize your girlfriend to make any and all decisions concerning the personal care, medical treatment, hospitalization and health care of each child who has not attained age 18. You can also give your girlfriend the same access to your child's medical records, including the right to disclose the contents to others.

Second, in Illinois, you may also appoint a short-term guardian to act on behalf of your minor child for a period not longer than 365 days. This procedure gives parents a mechanism to convey to another adult the necessary authority to care for minors during short periods of parental absence or illness. These arrangements could be useful for parents facing periods where one were out of the country, since a short-term guardian would have the authority to consent to medical treatment for the child.

First, a parent appoints a shortterm guardian in a dated document that identifies the appointing parent, the minor and the person appointed the short-term guardian. (A statutory

short-term guardianship form can be found at 755 ILCS 5/ 11-5.4(f).) The writing must he signed by, or at the direction of, the appointing parent in the presence of two credible witnesses who are an least 18 years old. Neither witness can be the short-term guardian.

Second, if there is another living parent, that parent must also sign the form. This nonappointing parental signature is not required if the whereabouts of the other parent are unknown, if the other parent is unwilling or unable to make and carry out day-to-day child care decisions. or if the child's parents were never



married and no court has issued an order establishing parentage.

Third, the person appointed as the short-term guardian must also sign the document, ensuring his acceptance of the duties. The shortterm guardian need not sign at the same time as the appointing parent. The appointment of the short-term guardian becomes effective immediately upon the date the written document is executed unless the document provides for a later specified effective date or event (e.g., upon the parent's admission to a hospital). The appointment remains effective for up to 365 days unless the written instrument provides for termination upon an earlier specified date such as the parent's release from the hospital.

Although a parent can execute more than one short-term guardianship appointment, only one written document may be in force at any given time. If a parent signs a document that provides for an appointment to become effective upon his or her admission to the hospital, the appointment is in force. Nevertheless, it will not be effective until admission to a hospital.

A short-term guardian appointment may be amended or revoked by the appointing parent any time and in any manner communicated to the short-term guardian.

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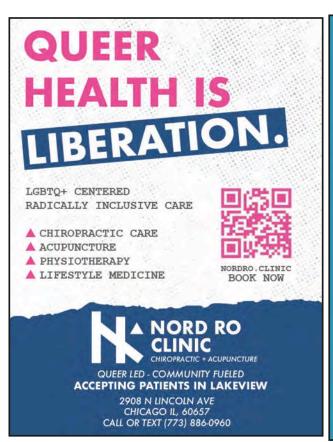

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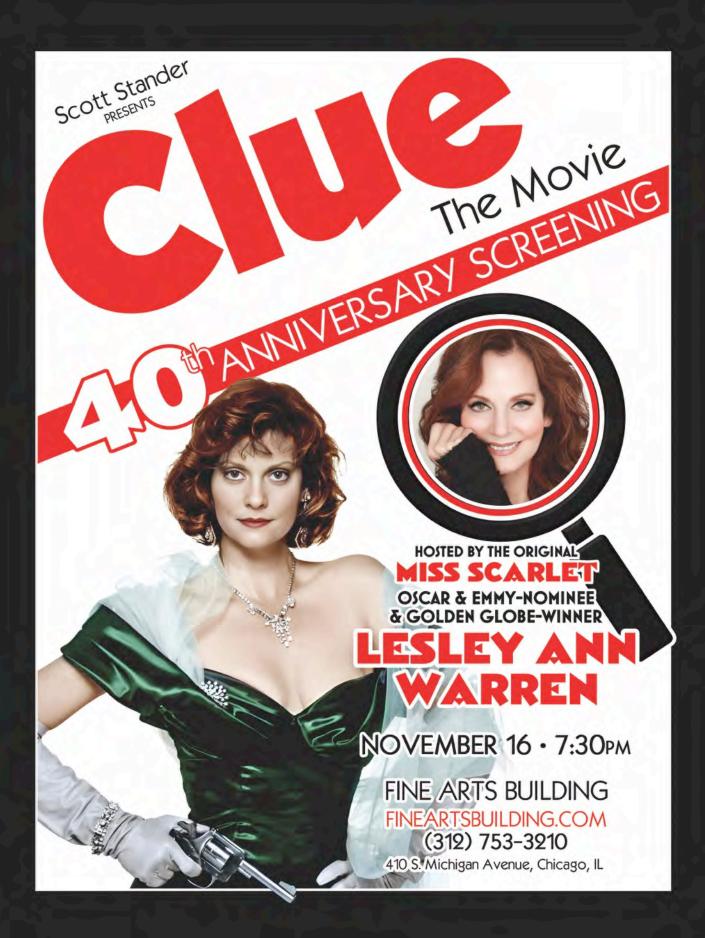
