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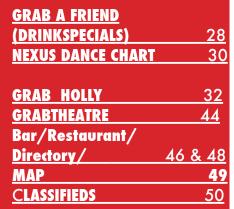

#### Lily Tomlin Remembers the Magic of Allee Willis

#### Acting legend looks back on her dear late friend as Willis' inaugural Night of Wonders launches

The "Classic Lily" tab on Lily Tomlin's official website — noted as "the world's only" — is, today, barely operational. It looks like it was created at the dawn of the internet and never updated.

The reason for this might be, simply, the same reason why, when we lose someone we love, it's impossible to let go of what they left behind. Updating it means erasing a special footprint on that site — that of Tomlin's friend Allee Willis, who years ago ("quite a while ago, I can't even recall," Tomlin says) made that webpage.

Willis, who sometimes went by the name Bubbles, created the page with "dignity and taste," as noted in the signature seen at the bottom of that page. Willis was a Broadway composer, a multimedia visual artist, a graphic artist, a songwriter and, says Tomlin, "an all around fantastical person." She famously wrote the "Friends" theme song and was the only woman inducted into the Songwriters Hall of Fame in 2018.

"She was so involved in video and did so many things and had mastered it," Tomlin told Pride Source. "And of course I was totally fumble floozy. Couldn't do anything."

Tomlin believes this was the beginning of a wonderful, enduring friendship as the two artists, both gay and from Detroit, bonded instantaneously. Though Tomlin couldn't pinpoint exactly what

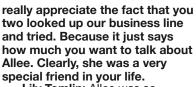
brought them together, "once you [were] exposed to her, she just became a fixture in your life."

Recently, Tomlin,

83, attended the L.A. launch event for the Willis Wonderland
Foundation, called Night of Wonders
— a fitting tribute to the magical mind of Willis, who died suddenly in 2019, at age 72, after suffering a cardiac arrest. The foundation supports the education and advancement of songwriters and multimedia artists, notably those in underserved communities.

Tomlin was eager to talk about the foundation, her friend and the event, which RuPaul also attended. So eager she and Willis' partner, Prudence Fenton, tried to contact Pride Source on their own, unprompted, one recent Saturday evening, without a publicist involved, but were met with a voicemail. Prudence left a message. That's just how important Willis was to Tomlin.

Chris Azzopardi: I'm sorry that you couldn't get through to us, but I

She just blew me away, really. She was a total original. And all the people around her were always like a part of her family and they were so devoted to her, and the foundation plans on so many ideas and practical extensions of who Allee was. And her house. I mean, her house is going to be the headquarters for the foundation. That magical, ideal '50s house that's filled with art. Have you been there?

CA: I haven't been there. Can you







walk me through it? LT: Well, it's just an incredible, typical '50s suburban house with '50s cars parked in the driveway. Old Chryslers and things. I have a '55 Dodge Royal Lancer myself. She's got seven bowling balls in the front yard. And then in the back she has a beach blanket around her pool. And then in the house itself, it's totally magical. She had an alter ego, Bubbles the artist. that she never admitted to being, but she managed Bubbles. And Bubbles created all this porcelain dinnerware and display pieces. And I

She testified before the Congress on behalf of the songwriters in fighting for their access, their right to their material, and not being ripped off by the media in certain ways. And her wardrobe alone was a visual statement. Her massive wardrobe alone. Her haircut. Everything about her, she was tireless. Just constantly had a big audio visual setup that she worked.

#### CA: The way you're describing her, and from what I know about you and your work, it just makes all the sense in the world that you two would be friends.

LT: I'm so grateful for her friendship. She was a terrific person. I can still see her up in the middle of the aisle at [historic Hollywood restaurant] Musso and Frank. She talked at the top of her voice no matter what she was talking about. She had something to say about everything and just telling it to you in really big ways.

#### CA: Do you remember a time when something made her that passionate?

LT: I remember that one of the last times I saw her at Musso's was, I'd



gone to the theater to see some production or something at the Pantages [Theatre] and she had a little party there at Musso's. She was standing up outside the booth and as soon as she saw me, "Oh, Lily!" and then blah, blah, blah. I can't even possibly recreate it. It was just... she was excited about everything. Excited and interested and bigger than life. And her death was sudden, just like that. It shocked all of us.

#### CA: Did living in Detroit have anything to do with your friendship?

LT:I think it really does. I think so many people, especially from our era, were from Detroit.

#### CA:But you didn't actually meet Allee here in Detroit?

LT:No. I didn't meet her in Detroit. Not that I'm aware. I was looking at her bio and her awards on the internet. And she came to L.A. in '69, which is the year I'd just gone to California to be on [the TV series] "Laugh-In."

#### CA:Did you two ever bond over Detroit?

LT:Oh yeah. If you're from Detroit, I mean, it's in your blood. You just don't turn away from it. It's imprinted. I thought it was the

greatest city in the world. It was gritty, it was hardcore, it was political. I mean, I lived in that kind of neighborhood. And then, a very short distance for me were the rich sections like Sherwood Forest and Palmer Park, Palmer Woods and then I was aware of Grosse Pointe. And my first character was a Grosse Pointe matron. I did it in a college show

#### CA:Wait, really?

LT: Yeah. It was just about the time that Grosse Pointe had found out that it had a merit system where it rejected sales of ownership to anybody of questionable origins. Which meant not Waspy. Kathy Ford became a good friend of mine, and she was Henry Ford's third wife. And I've had so many connections. When I was doing "9 to 5," she was stopped in the car with Henry when he said [his famous line], "Don't complain, don't explain." We were on the same page in Time Magazine when they had those old news items, and Kathy and I were both there. And I renewed my friendship with her around that time.

Aside from the website, what else did you work on with Allee professionally?

She would do things at the gay



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center [Los Angeles LGBT Center] and I would present her, or I would present Bubbles. And she would hang her China on the walls. One time she did a plate of me and my partner, Jane [Wagner]. Separate plates. And they were so outrageously funny. When I walked in and I saw those plates on the wall, I started laughing. I just was overcome with laughter.

#### CA:What did these plates look like?

LT:I have this big red, smiling mouth and stringy looking hair, but you knew it was me. And then Jane was really stoic, blonde, passive, soft smile.

You want me to send you a photograph of them? You'll get a kick out of them. I'm sorry. I'm forcing all this stuff on you.

CA:Oh, are you kidding me?
Nothing is being forced on me. I want to see those plates, Lily.
LT: I should

start taking them on the road with me! Anyway, I know I was older than Allee. I was five or six or seven years older than she was. But she went to Mumford High School, which was almost in my neighborhood. But I wound up going to Cass Tech because I was in the northern district, and Northern High School was a really tough high school. And so, a lot of kids went over to Cass Tech. And it was supposed to be where the smart kids were anyway. And I was happy to play that role and fell right into it. They weren't all that smart, believe me.

Oh my god. Wait. And so, the best part was... I grew up in a Black neighborhood. I couldn't stand the Beatles. I mean, not the Beatles, but whoever would be the big stars of... They were '64, I was already out of

high school. But like Pat Boone or some... don't say any denigrating stuff. Even Elvis. I didn't think Elvis was so hot because I liked all the Black artists and dancing. It was so much cooler.

#### CA:Before we wrap, I'd like to ask you about the Night of Wonders event. It sounded magical. And it also sounded very queer to have you and RuPaul there. What was that like?

LT:It was wonderful because everybody was so devoted to Allee. They're all freakish, anyway. And they have great fun and they love to dress up. And they're running back and forth on the stage and carrying



signs. It was filled with artistic joy.

#### CA:Lastly, Lily, what do you have coming up?

LT:Well, Jane Fonda and I, right after "Grace and Frankie," like a month later, we went into this movie with [director] Paul Weitz. I'd done a couple of movies with him before and I really like him. It's called "Moving On." It's a very small, intimate little movie. And I know they've sold it and they're negotiating the distribution, but that's all I know. And we had great fun doing that. And then about a month after that we did "80 for Brady" with Jane [Fonda] and I, and Sally Field and Rita Moreno. And Tom Brady.

CA: You have to know Lily, but that December 20, 2022

#### cast right there is a queer man's dream.

LT:It is, right? My god. Something appeals! But Tom Brady is... it was just none of us knew anything about football.

But it was great fun; we had fun with the director. We had fun doing the project. In fact, they're having a screening today and a few people are going. I'm not going. The first time I see it, I don't want to have to be with other people.

#### CA:Do you like to watch your movies by yourself first?

LT: Yeah, or with just people I know real closely. It's going to be at the agency and there'll probably be a lot

of agents there. I'm not as brazen and outgoing as I might appear.

CA:You and Jane have spent a lot of time on screen together over the last decade. What's that feeling like to know that you are so beloved on your own, but also so beloved together, especially by LGBTQ+fans?

LT:I'm so grateful that I have an audience in the gay community. And it doesn't compute to you that you're anything. I realize that people like "Grace and Frankie," or enough people liked it. And I know that over the years I've had hardcore

fans that I've really enjoyed being with and relating to, because I've kept the stories of my characters going all those years.

## What's In a Chosen Name? Everything, That's What Michaela Jaé Rodriguez on her historical Golden Globe win and the importance of chosen-name recognition for the trans community

In early 2022, Michaela Jaé
Rodriguez made history as the first
openly trans actor to win a Golden
Globe, an award she earned for her
role on "Pose." Nearly a year later
and she's yet to properly celebrate
that groundbreaking moment for
herself and the trans community, she
told me during our recent interview.

And it's not just because she's been busy bossing around Maya Rudolph in the Apple TV+ sitcom "Loot," which was recently renewed for a second season. Rodriguez assured me she'd pop open a bottle of bubbly soon, but not until she was done with her ambassador duties for Citibank, which recently expanded its transgender-friendly chosen name feature to debit customers, allowing eligible Citi cardholders to update their cards with their chosen first name without requiring a legal name change.

In our interview, Rodriguez chatted about her own chosen-name experiences, her upcoming foray into music, and why "Loot" was such a "glorious surprise."

CA: Why was it important for you to get involved with Citi's chosen-name campaign?
Michaela Jaé Rodriguez: It was most important to me [because of] the youth. I think about their level of confidence when they receive something that they've always wanted. And I also think about just trans individuals in general, regarding who they are and their

identity, how that's most important to them. Knowing that Citibank was willing to partner [with me] was not only, I feel, outstanding and kind of an honor, but to know that they're willing to make sure we feel protected in ourselves and our identity. Also,

they're not slow in the process because they make it happen at the drop of a dime. There's no long hauling to giving your information and giving all of this documentation that is quite embarrassing. You don't have to go through that process.

So thinking of all those things, and regarding the youth as well, and just trans people in general, that's why I partnered with them. It'll give them a peace of mind. And they can walk out and know that not only they have a card that they're going to be using, but a card that represents the name to their identity.

CA:Growing up, what was the thing for you that had your chosen name on it that meant the world to you?

MJR: I was 11 years old and I was in a music program, and I remember my dad taking me to go see "Spider-Man" with Tobey Maguire and Kirsten Dunst. And I remember them calling her MJ. And I was like, "Oh my god, those are my initials." I wanted to be called MJ



because she's really cool, and she's quite fab, and I love her red hair.

I remember receiving my first Equity card and them saying, "What's your stage name?" And I said, "Well, it's MJ Rodriguez. I've been called MJ all my life. That's my name." And they were like, "OK, perfect." And from then on it stuck. Then, obviously, growing older, becoming a grown woman, you're like, "OK, those little girl days are gone. People need to know who Michaela Antonia Jaé is. Who the creative artist is."

The significance of Michaela is people getting to understand who the person is outside of the actress MJ Rodriguez. Michaela Jaé is my artist name. I wanted people to see the differentiations. I didn't want them to stronghold me to just one character, but a multitude.

CA:What are some of the challenges you've run into with changing your name?

**MJR:** I mean, there's always a worry or a setback on the documentation



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and giving your dead name when you don't want to give your dead name. All of these lawyers that I feel aren't [necessary]. But yeah, I've gone through that, but it also didn't deter me. It didn't make me sad, it didn't break me down. It just kind of pushed me a little farther.

I won't say I was embarrassed, but I know a lot of my sisters who have also gone through this and have felt quite embarrassed about the process they have to go through with getting a name changed. And the youth won't have to go through this anymore. They won't have to worry about that when it comes to Citibank.

CA:Recently, we've seen a wave of anti-trans legislation, much of it focused on chosen names. What do you have to say to school administrators and politicians who've made it difficult for trans students to change their names and pronouns?

MJR:More than anything, I would say they need to probably open their minds and, even though they may not even receive a message like this, to open their minds and dig a little deeper into the actual human being that is there, beyond your expectations or your stigmas and ideas of who we are as people. I think what most importantly needs to be broken down is how we are as human beings. I would say just pay attention. If I were the person to give

them the energy of anger, that would defeat the purpose of love. But I would say the disappointment that I have, as well, is needed for every trans person and every person who is an ally.

#### CA:Regarding your Golden Globe — do you carry it everywhere you go?

MJR:[Laughs.] Believe it or not, and I always say this to everyone, but I'm a regular shmegular girl, but I still have it in my case. This may be TMI, but I don't know if I've actually yet really celebrated that moment of winning it. I know it's weird to say, but I probably need to do that.

#### CA:I'd say that celebration is overdue.

MJR: Yeah, it definitely is. It's a process. It was a lot that I had to process when I won that Golden Globe. I was so, so happy. But I also felt like I didn't deserve it. But that's due to, I guess, the shame, and what comes with transness in the industry, and how you feel you fit or how you belong. And when I got that, I was like, "Oh my god, does this mean I truly belong?" Maybe even worse, I was wondering, "Am I deserving of this?" And I had to really take the moment, and I'm still obviously in that space. Don't think for a second, though, that I'm not proud of myself for winning because it was a feat for so many girls who have not had space. It opened, hopefully, a good

amount of doors, but also what comes with that is my reality.

CA:I want to ask about your role on "Loot" as Sofia Salinas, which feels groundbreaking because it's not about being trans. I read that you decided that the character would be trans, but it wouldn't be a primary characteristic. Why was that important to you?

MJR:Being cast on this show, just a general role, was such an amazing moment in my life. I did not expect it. I did not believe I was even capable of getting that. Again, this was a totally different lane from what I am used to. I'm a drama girl, and being thrust into comedy in the most beautiful way was such a glorious surprise.

So being trans, I didn't want people to just subject her to transness. People know me as Michaela Jaé, as a trans woman in the world. So being in that role of a woman who could possibly be trans or cis, it really bridges the gap between what actually we all go through as women, aside from being marginalized as trans. I had a show ["Pose"] where it showed the true experience of what trans women go through and I wanted, now in this moment, to try something different, make people laugh, and also let them see the struggle of not only just trans women, but cis women in general, and women in general. How we grow, how we fight, how we strive. And Sofia — she is starchy

and real stiff, OK? That is just not Miss Michaela. I love the crap out of her. I love that she's this way. You need someone like her in your life. So I'm just like, "She helps me." When I read the script, I was like, "Damn. sis."

CA:There's a lot you could influence in the coming years. Have you thought about that and where you want your career to go from here?

**MJR**:I've continued to pursue my acting career, but I also am really excited for my music career to start fully next year. I promise it's something that... well, I think it will be good. I promise I'm not biased.

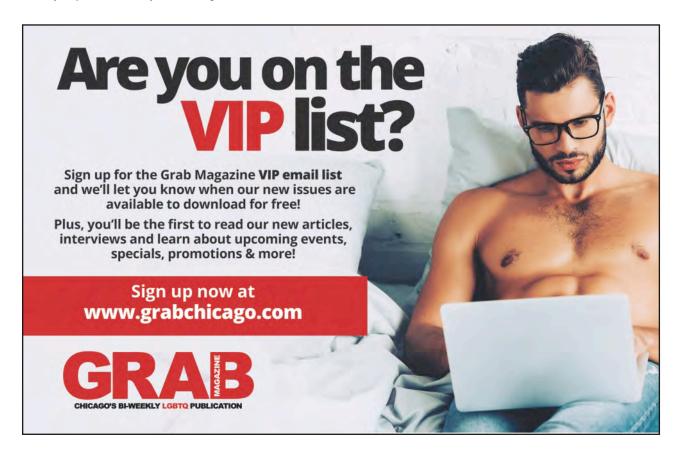
#### CA:You released the single "Something to Say" in 2021, so a full album?

MJR:Well, I don't think it's going to be a full album. I'm going to do an EP, just to give people a snippet and see if they like [it], and then start writing more. Because my fans are really important. I really like having my hand in being creative and having a say.

#### Never stop trying: An interview with gay singer/ songwriter Jim Andralis

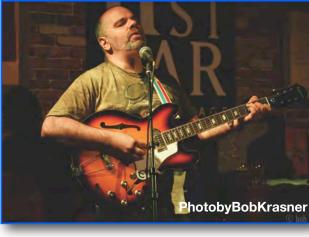

Sometimes, it takes awhile to be able to connect, one-to-one, with an artist. I've been listening to and writing about gay singer/ songwriter Jim Andralis for more than six years. From his debut album "Your Dying Wish Come True" to his just released new full-length "I Can't Stop Trying," Andralis' music touches me in a way that makes me want to share it with everyone. From his emotive vocals to his effortless gift for turn of phrase, I mention him to other pop music fans every chance I get. Finally, after all this time, I got the chance to interview Jim, and it was well worth the wait.

Gregg Shapiro: Jim, you're a
Pennsylvania native.
Pennsylvania's a big state – can
we narrow that down a bit?
Jim Andralis: I am from Bethlehem,
Pennsylvania, which is eastern
Pennsylvania. Pittsburgh is the
western steel town, Bethlehem is the
eastern steel town; about an hourand-a-half to two hours west of New
York City, and the same amount of
time north of Philadelphia. Lehigh
University is in Bethlehem. It's near
Allentown, which Billy Joel wrote the
song about.

#### GS: When did you relocate to New York and what was it that brought you there?

JA: I went to school at Muhlenberg College, which was about 20 minutes away from my house where I grew up. Part of the way into that, I needed to get out. I really felt that something needed to propel me out of the Lehigh Valley. I studied abroad in Rome, in Italy. I love it there so much. It felt like a place where I felt



at home in a way that I never knew that I could. I moved back to Rome for two years, and it was really tough for me to make any money there. I said, "Here's what I'm going to do. I'm gonna move to New York City for one year." We're talking 1993. "I'm going to find somebody who's Italian to bring me back with their company so I can become an Italian citizen." I iust planting roots in New York City and, I've got to be honest with you, Gregg, next year it will have been 30 years that I'm here, but I would say it was only ten years ago that I made the conscious decision to stay. It's weird. I was super ambivalent about it. I was like. "I love this about it. but I can't stand this about it!" I had to really fight through my own brain.

GS: In the early 2000s, you could be heard performing as a member of the band The Isotoners, as well as on records by the late LD Beghtol's LD & The New Criticism. In 2016, you released your solo debut album "Your Dying Wish Come True." How did you know it was the right time to put out a solo record?

JA: I don't know that it was, Gregg. When I became a part of The Isotoners, the idea of being in a band and writing adolescent songs about queerness and gay sex and all the shit that would make us laugh and making songs about it that were kind of super earnest, that was a way into songwriting for me. I was one of the songwriters in The Isotoners, and I was in LD's band at the same time. When I went into grad school to become a therapist in '04, soon after that I left The Isotoners, and immersed myself in

training to be a therapist. In 2010 or 2011, I was with my husband (my then boyfriend) Larry and our friend Amy Bezunartea. Larry had installed a piece of his artwork as part of a Visual AIDS exhibit in the East Village and we were there. I was talking with Amy, and we were saying that we weren't writing enough songs, we weren't doing it enough. We created a songwriters' group that would meet once a month to hold one another accountable. It began with me and Amy and Larry. All we had to do was write a song a month. We're not critiquing, we're not evaluating. It was just a way for us to all keep up our practice as songwriters. It'd been 12 years since we started that. I think by the time I started recording "Your Dying Wish Come True" in 2014 or 2015, I had so many songs. It was also a moment of really big losses. Loss after loss after loss. I could feel an album coming together. I went into it without any idea of how to do it; just by pulling people in that I love, that I wanted to do it with. That's how that record happened. "Maybe I'll make a record!" At that time, I was like, "I'll make a record. I'll be famous [laughs], and my life will be very different [laughs]." "You're Dying Wish Come True" was a time capsule of my life then.

GS: All four of your solo full-length albums, including the new one "I Can'tStopTrying" (jimandralismusic.com), were produced by musician Tom Beaujour. What makes Tom someone with whom you want to collaborate repeatedly?

**JA:** There are many answers to that question. The first one is, I love him.



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I love being around him. I think I'm a very musical person, but I don't read music. I don't have a language for what I want things to sound like. Tom comes in with a lot of ideas. He also really listens to what my ideas are. He's a wonderful coll-aborator. Every once in a while, he'll be like, "Hold on a second, I want to try something." And then he does, and it sounds beautiful in a way that I never thought a song of mine could sound. He's really skilled, but he's also super-gifted. He's an artist and he's also somebody, and I think this is hard for anybody, able to lend that to somebody else's vision in a way that complements and brings something out of it that should have been there.

the setlist a song with Larry very early. When I'm singing with him, my voice opens up. There's something about singing together that's like, "OK, I'm not alone. Larry's here, and we're making these sounds together." I feel like it's something we both treasure. That we can be each other's love, and also fan, and also collaborator. I usually pop up in Larry's shows. He always pops up in mine. Afterwards, it feels like, "OK, there's some things that are good about our life."

GS: As a dog-person myself, I couldn't help but notice the presence of dogs in your life. The video for your Bridget Everett duet "Hit The Ground Fuckin" featured

what it was. I got Nikko when I was in my late 20s. When I got Nikko, I hadn't been able to keep a plant alive. I was lonely and I had a hard time being by myself. I come from a family where we say "I love you" repeatedly before we hang up. We always say, "I love you." There's always a verbal aspect to love. Nikko was the first relationship that I had that transcended language. In some ways, I feel like she taught me how to love in a way that had to do with presence and not words. I finished a song the other day that is also about Nikko. It's been 10 years since she died, and she's come back into my brain in a way that's really complicated. I feel like Dory we're doing right. We are with her. We're

> completely permissive [laughs]. Some people would think we were terrible dog parents. But

with Nikko, I didn't know what the fuck I was doing. I'm haunted by the way I feel like I didn't come through for her. This last song that I wrote is sort of about this dog's nature which is to not hold a grudge. They don't care if you fuck up. They don't care if you walk around naked. They are yours. They are there for you.

GS: No judgment. JA: Yes! This song is like, "Why do I need a ghost of a dog to forgive me for these

things that she probably forgot about in two seconds?" It's my own brain fucking with me. I see dogs as an inspiration. My husband talks about how Dory will come out with whatever she's feeling. She's not self-conscious about it, usually. She'll be like, "Don't leave me! I missed you! I need you!" She's exactly who she is in the moment, and that's always changing. I think that's something we both aspire to.

GS: I really love the wordplay in your songs, which I think stands out on the songs "Soloflex," "New York City Spring," and "Dead Man's Porn." Which comes first in your songwriting process, the words or the music?

**JA:** Sometimes both, but usually the words. I'll be thinking of a phrase or an experience, an emotional experience. I think the way I get to big experiences is through little details. I try to trust that that will

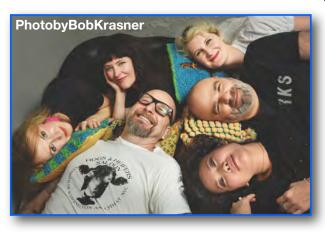
GS: Your multihyphenate husband Larry Krone, whose House of Larréon created the fashion capsule collection for Joe's Pub, has been a presence on all four of your solo albums. How does your life partnership coincide with your creative partnership?

JA: There was a place in the East Village called Starlight Lounge. Our friend

Julian Fleisher would host a Monday night music thing there. I played there a few times with my band, with LD's band, with our friend Kenny Melman.

#### GS: Kenny Melman of Kiki & Herb fame?

JA: Yes! Kenny did a solo show at Starlight Lounge and had special guests. I was one of them. I feel like that's the first time that Larry became aware of who I was with these overlaps that we had. Larry was doing his own show at Starlight Lounge and contacted me on Friendster to ask whether I would play accordion at his show. Larry knew LD and we had a whole bunch of people in common. LD was also instrumental in us meeting, now that I think about it. So, we began collaborating musically. I have a fraught relationship to my own voice. I used to get nervous, less so now. When I'm doing a show, I will put in



a stellar cast of pooches. The cover photo for "I Can't Stop Trying" is of your rescue dog Dory, and the wonderful song "Believe Me" is sung from her point of view. What do Dory and the other dogs in your life mean to you?

**JA:** It's hard for me to talk about this, but there are two songs on "Your Dying Wish Come True" about my first dog Nikko. One is called "For A Minute or Two." After she died, I was trying to think about what it felt like. There was this time when I let her off her leash and she just took off. It's about that moment where I couldn't see her or hear her running. I thought, "This could be it. This could be the last time I ever see her." Then she ran back to me. She was just having her own little adventure. After her death, it was like that feeling, but forever. The other one is called "It's Not Love," which is about the messiness of the end of her life. I always felt like she needed something from me but I didn't know



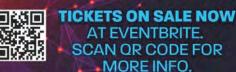
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translate to people. That I'm talking about a really specific thing.

#### GS: I think that definitely comes through.

JA: Thank you. In some ways, "Dead Man's Porn," on the most basic level, is about masturbating to the porn that belonged to a person who died of AIDS who bequeathed his porn collection to whoever the fuck wanted it. It's also about how fucked it was, for me personally, that much of my experience of the darkest moments of the AIDS crisis was me staying closeted because I was so scared. Sneaking these tiny little erotic moments on the backs of all these people who had died. It's something that I'd always experienced as super shameful, but it's my story. "I can't be gay! Look at what's happening." In the meantime, there were people fighting for themselves, and for me, even though I was...

#### GS:... you were afraid.

JA: Yes! It was this complicated thing that when I distill it, it's about my roommate and one of my very best friends Mark, was a volunteer for the Gay Men's Health Crisis. He was out there helping people, living his gay life. (He would) bring back porn that I would wait until he left to watch [laughs]. It was so crazy. I was like, "OK, I'll write about that." It's a way of taking the most tender, shameful thing, and just being, "This is a part of me, and maybe someone else out there had this experience." It's like a little morse code to whoever else is listening.

#### GS: One of the most surprising tracks on "I Can't Stop Trying" is your cover version of Neil Diamond's "Play Me," performed as a duet with your husband Larry. Why did you want to cover that tune?

**JA:** We've been covering that tune for years. I love Neil Diamond. I sort of brought Larry in to loving Neil Diamond. I don't know that that's 100 percent true [laughs]. I have this thing for Neil Diamond. I think he's really handsome. I think his songs are fucking weird. "Play Me" is a weird song, but it's so romantic. It's kind of sexy. We sang it at our wedding. We sing it when we're just sitting around. We have songs that we do together. It feels silly and

loving, but we just love the song. It's become a touchstone for us.

GS: Do you know if Neil Diamond has heard it, and if so. what does he think of the queer take on the song? JA: I can

guarantee you that he has not heard it [laughs]. I think that Dolly Parton listens to every cover of one of her songs before she signs off on it. I just went to some website and said, "I would like to license this song," and the robot gave me permission. This is probably my internalized homophobia, but I imagine that he'll hear it and be like, "NO! This was meant to be sung to a lady!"

GS: On the other hand, he's friends with Barbra Streisand, I'd imagine he's probably had some crossover with queer people. Jim, by day, you're in private practice as a trauma-focused psychotherapist. We are speaking a few days after yet another shooting in a gay bar - this one in Colorado Springs, where five are dead and there were multiple injuries. The prescient song "Almost Dead" sounds like it addresses the issue of anti-LGBTQ+ violence. Am I on the right track and, in your professional opinion, how do we heal from yet another deadly event aimed at our community?

**JA:** You are on the right track. I think that we heal within our community. We heal by surrounding ourselves with our own love and by fighting people who are killing us. Here's the thing that I'm learning more and more, the more I do both jobs. I think it's our own responsibility. I don't know about you, and I don't know what you're own experience is, growing up in the closet or growing up gueer, but I feel like part of the reason I have a commitment to doing my own work is that I've done plenty of harm within our own community. I have all kinds of shit



that I'm trying to deprogram myself from, I have been. We all have a responsibility, particularly those of us with more privilege, to do our own work so that we can be loving, supportive members of our own community for one another. I feel like I'm done trying to prove my own, or anybody else's, value or humanity to somebody who's too fucking lazy to see it. That song is rage! If you try to hurt me, I'm gonna hurt you back and I hope that I'm gonna hurt you a lot [laughs]. That's the thing about that song – when Trump got elected, I was like, "OK, I've got to get really strong. I've got to get so strong because I'm going to have to fight." I'm not a person who's like, "Oh my God, I'm feeling all this rage. I'm going to work out." It's more like that moment of, "OK, motherfucker!" I feel like that song is mostly fantasy. The revenge part is fantasy. I don't know how much of an impact my rage can make, but I'm going to feel it anyway. It's almost from the perspective of somebody who's already been attacked, imagining revenge.

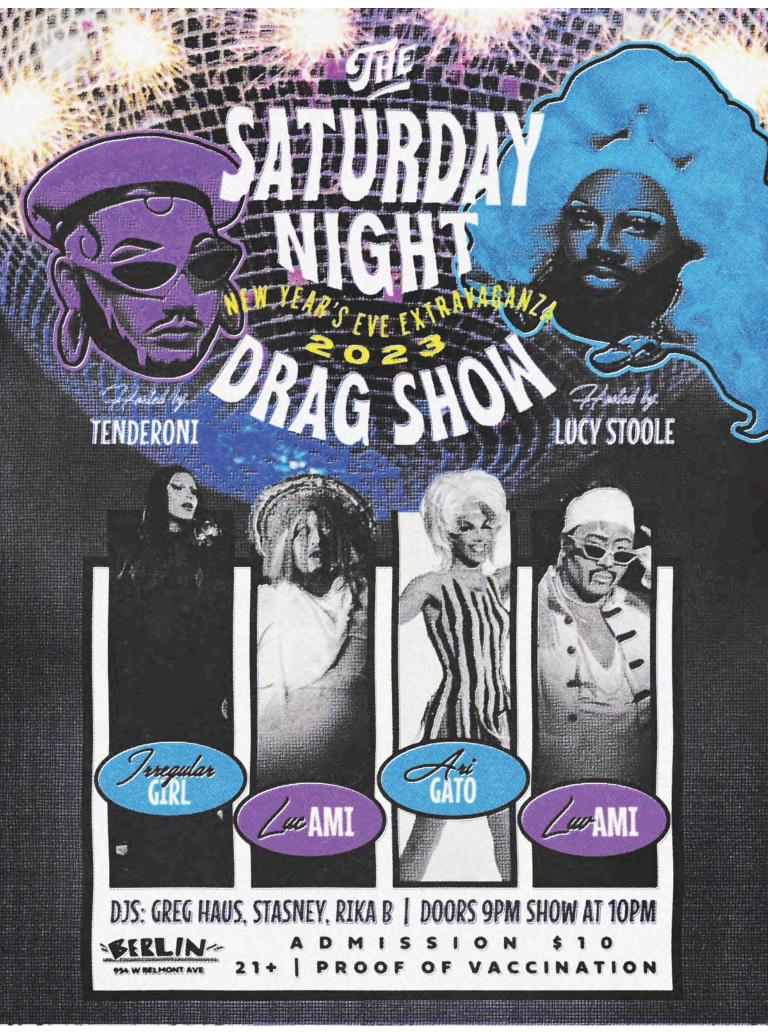
#### GS: The violence of the attack in the song is palatable.

**JA:**When I sang the song at our songwriter's group, and I finished, Bridget said she thought it would be really fun to sing "Kick you in the head/so you're almost dead" live [laughs]!

#### GS: It does feel like an empowerment anthem.

JA: Yeah! Great! That's so good.

GS: Especially at this time when we need to be empowered. JA: I like it! Thank you!

#### On the "Ball": An interview with **Tony Award-winner Christine Ebersole**

Christine Ebersole, the two-time Tony Award-winning actor and singer, has returned with a new album, the personal and moving "After The Ball" (Club 44). The basis for the 10-track album, featuring songs that span more than 80 years, is her acclaimed cabaret act of the same name. A familiar face from theater, television, and movies, Ebersole is a true multi-hyphenate. She was gracious enough to make time to answer a few questions about the new album before the Thanksgiving holiday.

Gregg Shapiro: Beginning with the 1891 Charles K. Harris song "After The Ball" and continuing through the early 1970s with Joni Mitchell's "Little Green" (1971) and Lieber & Stoller's "Ready to Begin Again" (1975), the songs on your new album cover a period of more than 80 years. Was that your intention as you were putting the music together or did it just happen organically?

Christine Ebersole: I just picked the songs for the narrative, for the story I wanted to tell. "After The Ball" is about what happens the music stops and the lights go down. The confetti's on the floor and the champagne is empty. What happens next?

GS: Four of the eight selections are medleys. As the performer, how do you know when two or even three songs belong together?

CE: Again, it's kind of what tells the story. With (the medley of) "Little Green" and "Wait Till You See Her" and "Inchworm," it all came out of the story I was telling (in my cabaret act) at The Carlisle (in New York) in

2016. It coincided with my being in Chicago during (the pre-Broadway run of) "War Paint."

#### GS: At The Goodman Theater.

CE: Yes, with (music director) Larry Yurman (co-producer of the "After The Ball" album). It was a complete collaboration. What happened was, I wanted to tell the story

because all my children are adopted, and Joni Mitchell's story of "Little Green" is about her personal experience of giving up her child for adoption. Her only child, when she was quite young.

#### GS: Her daughter Kilauren.

CE: Yes, her daughter who she actually reunited with 35 years later. "Wait Till You See Her" was what Larry brought to the table. It was a juxtaposition of the mother losing the child and then the adoptive mother getting the treasure. Within her loss was my treasure.

GS: Following her health scare from a few years ago, Joni Mitchell is experiencing a massive career resurgence and has begun performing again. Have you ever met Joni?

CE: I did! I met her at a hair salon. It was such a thrill for me because she's been such an idol of mine. She was getting a manicure or something, and I went over to her. I had recorded her (song) "The Circle



Game" on my very first album. I told her. I said, "I'm such a big fan!" I was just gooping over her. She was great! For some reason, she thought that I was really young or something. Like, "What are you, in high school or something?" Maybe it was my enthusiasm. She was very welcoming. She wasn't put out by me bothering her in a hair salon while she was getting a manicure.

GS: I love that you do a cover of the wonderful Lieber & Stoller tune "Ready to Begin Again," which was first recorded by Peggy Lee.

CE: Peggy Lee! Doesn't it feel like a Kurt Weil/Bertolt Brecht song?

GS: It does! Especially since Lieber & Stoller were known for writing '60s pop tunes.

CE: Yes, rock and roll.

GS: And "Ready to Begin Again" is such a poignant and slyly humorous song. Why did you want to record it?



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CE: It was telling the story. The inspiration for the whole album and the evening at the Carlyle, which was the genesis of that, was "Who am I? Where am I? Where am I going?" It's the identity of being a mother with children in the face of being in show business where I've missed out on a lot of the growing up, and now they're gone, I'm nearing my dotage. So, what do I do? What's my identity?

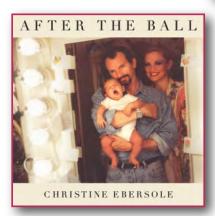
That's why that song spoke to me. It's like, well, you just put your teeth in and you put your wig on and you keep going!

GS: The album artwork for "After The Ball" has the feel of a family photo album, which made me wonder if any of the songs were sung to you when you were a child and if you, in return, sang them to your children?

**CE:** Yes, I did. But to get to tuck them in bed was a really rare thing. Because I was always on stage singing the 11:00 number wondering if they brushed their teeth. That was one of the basic tenets of mother-hood I didn't get very often.

GS: In 2021, you were in Paul Thomas Anderson's Oscarnominated movie "Licorice Pizza," playing L Doolittle, a character loosely based on Lucille Ball. When it comes to your work in comedy, how much influence did Lucy have on you?

CE: She was an icon for me. Her timing was impeccable. Comedy, to me, is music and rhythm. It's how you





emphasize a word. It's like playing an instrument. It's fascinating how it's so connected to music.

GS: Since 2019, you've been playing Dottie, the mother of Bob in the CBS sitcom "Bob Hearts Abishola." What do you enjoy most about that series?

**CE:** It's family. The people that are on that show it's really like a family. We genuinely enjoy one another and laugh all day. It's an unbelievably blessed experience to have. That doesn't always happen. There's not a bad apple in the bunch. It's a great, supportive, fun-

loving, funny family.

GS: In the "Morenike is Gay" episode of the show, Bob tells another character, regarding being able to tell if someone is gay, "You can't really tell that kind of thing by looking. Although my mom thinks she can."

CE: [Big laugh]

#### GS: How reliable is your personal gaydar?

CE: [Still laughing] I thought I was really good [laughs]. I always thought I was good at it.

#### Are "Crypto-Donuts" a Half-Baked Idea?

However, inasmuch as you face certain unavoidable 'supply chain' issues, you prefer to dole out those donuts not on Christmas morning, but over the six- to eightweek period thereafter. Does that sound right?" "My problem exactly." I replied.

"Very well," Sassy resumed.
"Then here is my solution, which you will perceive borrows from your recent human invention of 'crypto-currencies.' I am proposing the production – by you, Holly – of what I call 'crypto-donuts.' I found an old horse blanket and hung it in front of the crypto-wallet, and in the evening – when it was only me, the rescue horses and the unicorns in the stable – I planned to unlock the tack room and pull



aside the blanket to let the unicorns come in and feast their gaze upon their crypto-treasures!

Once I had finished, Sassy brought Queen Penelope around to hear our plans for "crypto-Christmas-donuts" kept safe in our "crypto-wallet."

Penelope heard our plans, then spoke. "Yes, very nice, Sassy. I like your idea. And you, Holly have done a good job preparing the little tokens and the pegboard. But now, you must take steps to educate your friends in the frolic as to the nature and purpose of your 'crypto-donuts.' If you want them to feel the innocent joy of receiving such gifts on Christmas morning, they must understand what they are receiving. I leave that job to the two of you."

#### Stylish Milan Worth a Visit

I attended the International LGBTQ+ Travel Association Conference held near Milan and thoroughly enjoyed my trip to this vibrant, stylish northern Italian city. Located just south of the Alps in the northern part of the country, it is the country's second largest (and wealthiest) area. The people are very stylish and there is lots to do.

You will find the Puerto Venezia neighborhood to be the designated gayborhood although Milan's LGBTQ venues are actually more scattered. The neighborhood features lots of cafes, restaurants and shopping (plus gay bars) within steps of each other and the metro is very convenient as is the Tram (streetcar). The Esselunga Supermarket features food to go where you can grab some fresh fruit and yogurt for breakfast.

I stayed at the Mercure Milano Centro Hotel, part of the Mercure brand by Accord Hotels. The service and rooms were great at this small hotel. It made for a perfect base to explore the city. It is located in the Piazza Oberdan in the Puerto Venezia district.

The subway station is literally in front of the hotel. Cute shops and restaurants abound. The room was comfortable after I insisted, they let me control the room temperature instead of the front desk. An Italian restaurant was next door was on one side and a coffee bar on the other. And just steps to the bars, the city park (Giardini Pubblici), and Buenos Aires street shopping district. However, skip paying for the hotel breakfast and enjoy one of the many nearby cafes for the morning double espresso and fresh baked rolls. (Like Spain, Italians don't drink a regular cup of coffee although the Café Americano comes close.)



#### WHAT TO DO

The wonderful natural history museum (Museo di Storia Nautale) and nearby huge city park (Giardini Pubblici "Indro Montaneli) are just steps from the Mercure Milano Hotel.

The Duomo cathedral and plaza are a must. Check out the nearby shopping at the Galleria Vittoria Emanuele II.

Don't miss the Sforzesco Castle. This huge fortress is complete with a moat and features works of Michelangelo and Leonardo da Vinci.

Wander along Navigli's canal district.

Visit the new City Life District and stroll along the contemporary art park. Lunch options abound. The new downtown skyscraper district is also worth a visit with stylish new buildings and a "tree house" apartment high-rise.

#### **NIGHTLIFE**

The city's gay life is centered around the Porta Venezia neighborhood, specifically down Via Lecco (Lecco Street). Check out LeccoMilano, the Red Cafe and MONO. They even have a LGBTQ-friendly gelato stand. The MONO Bar was great for an appertif. Appertivi is a pre-dinner semi-sweet alcoholic beverage. Try the Aperol Spritz which consists of aperol, spumante, soda, and fetta di Arancia. The Mono offered it with free chips for nine euros. This is a pre-dinner cocktail. Like in Spain, Italians eat late.



### WHERE TO EAT/WHAT TO

Do you like risotto, pasta, fresh breads, eggplant parmesan, pizza, smoked meats, or cheeses? How about wine? They all are Italian specialties. Great coffee is everywhere including the Coffee Joint next door to the Mercurio Hotel. Enjoy a cocktail on the rooftop bar of the Dome Milano (Via Giuseppe Mazzini).

### **GETTING THERE**

I took Easy Jet from Barcelona to Milan. It was cheap but modelled after the U.S. budget airlines (charge for everything including a carry-on bag, on board beverages, etc.). They made us stand in the jet way for a half-hour before letting us sit down and then they announced a delay due to a crew change. But I made it. And it is reportedly better than Ryan Air, another budget carrier as well as Vueling Airlines. I took American Airlines from Milan to JFK. The lengthy flight (7.5 hours) went over the Alps as well as the Maritimes of Canada and Boston Harbor. The meal service was good (pasta or meatballs) followed by ice cream and then a pizza snack before landing. The free wine and beer was a surprise. I am growing to like American Airlines.

From Malpensa airport, take the



Malpensa Express train (13 euros) to the Carbano metro stop and transfer to the M1 subway line to get to the hotel. The subway is known as the ATM and you can get an all day pass for seven euros.
