

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

The search for love: An interview with Raymond Luczak

Here's a funny, gay, "small world" story. In the 1990s, years before I actually met Raymond Luczak, we were both published in the long-running (1976-1995) gay culture magazine "Christopher Street." In fact, "Lincoln Avenue," the short story of mine published in the issue of "Christopher Street" which featured Luczak's "Notes of a Deaf Gay Poet" article on the cover, would go on to be the titular piece of my short fiction collection published by none other than Luczak's Squares and Rebels Press in 2014.

Minneapolis-based Luczak, a prolific author of 20 books, is not only the publisher at Squares and Rebels, as well as Handtype Press, he is also the editor of the literary journal "Mollyhouse." Additionally, he has edited numerous anthologies. The city of Minneapolis figures prominently in his new novel "Widower, 48, Seeks Husband" (Rattling Good Yarns Press, 2023), almost becoming a character in itself. LGBTQ+ history also plays a large role as the book spans 40 years, incorporating many significant community events. Raymond was kind enough to make time during his book tour to answer a few questions.

Gregg Shapiro: Not long before we spoke, you attended the Rainbow Book Fair in NYC. How was the experience for you?

Raymond Luczak: I enjoyed it a lot more than I thought I would. The last



time I'd done the Rainbow Book Fair, some years back, it was held uptown at the John Jay College, which I didn't like mainly because there was security and there was no straightforward way of entering the fair itself. This time around the fair was held at the LGBTQ+ Community Center. The vibe was much more welcoming and cozier due to its smaller footprint.

GS: What is your opinion of LGBTQ + lit fests and book fairs? What are your likes and dislikes?

RL: Aside from the Rainbow Book Fair, the only other LGBTQ+ book fair I've done was Outwrite in Washington, DC in 2019. Even though the turnout was smaller than the ones I've seen at RBF, I enjoyed that one very much. It felt very low-key, and many of the vendors had spare moments to "visit" with each other. However, my biggest gripe with LGBTQ+ book fairs/festivals is that accessibility doesn't seem to be a priority. I did email the coordinator of a certain queer book festival about

my information accessibility needs as a Deaf writer should I attend. His lackluster response made it very clear that he did not want to think about providing ASL interpreters; he didn't even ask how we might be able to work together to make that happen. As a result, I've never gone. Ableism is still alive and well within the LGBTQ+ literary community.

GS: You have established yourself over the years as a poet, fiction writer, editor, and publisher. Your new book "Widower, 48, Seeks Husband" is a novel. Do you have a preference for poetry or prose? RL: I like both genres for different reasons. Poetry is about distilling language itself. Prose is about expanding language itself. Both genres are capable of conveying intense moments of experience whether it be lyrical or narrative. I am fortunate in that I have more tools to work with whenever I write something.

GS: What excites you most, and least, about being a publisher?

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RL: I enjoy working with writers to develop and hone their work toward publication. publication. I also love discovering new voices I hadn't heard of before; that's how I came across Dan Callahan's That Was Something. I'm still very proud of being the first to publish Kris Ringman's books; they've been nominated twice for the Lambda Literary Award. I wish I could publish more books, but I've had to be extremely selective about what I publish.

GS: Geographic place is prominent in "Widower, 48, Seeks Husband," with Minneapolis street intersections, neighborhoods, and businesses named throughout. Would it be fair to say the novel is a love letter to Minneapolis? RL: I'm not sure if I'd use the phrase "love letter," but when I was writing the novel, I simply walked around my own neighborhood and used actual locations for scenes in my book. I was interested in creating a sense of place as well as giving it some context. It was fun walking my dog Rocky around the neighborhood (he really loved to help out with my field research) and imagining what it must've been like once upon a time when it was quite


a gay neighborhood.

GS: You populated "Widower, 48, Seeks Husband" with real people and events from gay history, including Anita Bryant pie-tosser Thom Higgins, early married gay couple James Michael McConnell and Richard John Baker, the Stonewall Riot, the AIDS crisis, in addition to Minnesota gay history. As a longtime Minneapolis resident, was it your intention to call attention to an area that may have been overlooked in the story of the LGBTQ+ community? **RL:** Social history has always interested me. How did people back then used to live, and how did they look at the world at the time? Part of the novel's impetus came from the fact that when we talk about the

national LGBTQ+ history of political

changes, the flyover country, as in the land between the coasts, often gets overlooked, as if nothing much happens there when reality has made it clear that it's anything but. I did a lot of historical research and conducted a number of interviews with old-timers about what Minneapolis was like in the late 1970s when the novel begins.

GS: You cover a variety of subjects that will be familiar to LGBTQ+readers, such as drag, aging, online hookups, bears, AIDS, and



body image, to name a few. Did you know that you'd be dealing with these subjects when you first began writing the book or did each topic reveal itself as you wrote? **RL:** I write my novels without any outline. It usually begins with me wondering about a new character. What's their story? What do they want? And it isn't usually too long before they make their own desires apparent. All those topics happened quite organically. I like discovering new things as I write along. It's always terrifying, wondering whether my novel in progress will be any good.

GS: Speaking of bears, the hirsute

character Howie comes to terms with his bear-ness in the book. Was it a conscious decision to write for a bear audience?

RL: No, not at all! I was thinking more about the older gay community who don't always get the attention and respect they deserve. Ageism is unfortunately rampant within the LGBTQ+ community, particularly when it comes to finding a new partner. I was also fascinated by the idea of featuring a so-called nobody trying to find a husband. I think that's

a much more emotionally interesting challenge to explore. Not only that; Howie would not be considered a typical beauty. I am very interested in dissecting social mores surrounding physical perfection. In that sense, the book was informed by my exposure to disability literature.

GS: Before he passes away in 2008, Timm tries to arrange a new man for Howie because Timm is worried about Howie being alone after all the years they spent together. Is this based on something that actually happened, or is it an invention for the sake of the novel?

RL: Oh, that was a total fabrication on my part! Timm did mean well, but you could say that I wanted to have a cringe-worthy moment here and there.

GS: If there was a movie version of "Widower, 48, Seeks Husband," who would you like to see playing Howie, Timm, Nick, Betsy, and Billy?

RL: When I first wrote the novel back in 2009, I thought how wonderful James Gandolfini would be as Howie. He always had that dark, almost forbidding, quality. But now? I'd go with Stephen Wallem even though he's not overly hirsute. A younger Leslie Jordan would've nailed Timm; we'd need a shortish actor with a bit of swish and a lot of sass. Depending on how long it'd take to secure financing for such a film adaptation, Russell Tovey could be old enough to play Nick by the time the shooting starts. I'd love to see Suzy Eddie Izzard play Betsy: she'd be so perfect in that part. Timothée Chalamet would be great as Billy. And yes, the film rights are still available.

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GRAB JAKE



Dancing Through the Heartbreak Jake Shears channeled joy on his second solo album, even if he wasn't always feeling it

Listening to his new album, you wouldn't know Jake Shears went through a pandemic breakup. After all, he doesn't process his personal hardships through his music, Shears admitted to me during our recent interview.

And so "Last Man Dancing," his second solo release after his 2018 self-titled album, is a "party album through and through," he says. This, then, is a Shears LP down to its deeply disco-heavy core, rooted in the glittery glam-pop sounds of the Scissor Sisters (which, by the way, haven't totally disbanded, though they are on a very long indefinite hiatus — Shears spoke on that in our interview, too).

The Scissor Sisters made Shears, the band's frontman, a gay icon almost 20 years ago when the quartet's self-titled 2004 debut embraced the kind of unabashed queerness we've now come to expect from LGBTQ+ artists.

Shears, whose look has gone from twink to daddy (is there a 44-

year-old gay man who can't relate?), tells me he watches up-and-coming queer artists with great admiration. But without Shears, it's hard to imagine what their careers might look like — could they be as freely expressive if he wasn't leading the way in feather-adorned leather pants or that bare-chested suspenders look he favored? Even for a generation of LGBTQ+ people who aren't musicians (including yours truly), Shears made celebrating ourselves easier by always outwardly celebrating himself.

The publicity notes for the new album call it a "reminder to keep moving through whatever life throws at you." So while he may not have created a breakup album or one that speaks directly to this current climate of Republican-charged antiqueer expression, Shears' message of defiance through joy, dance and self-celebration profoundly resonates. It's an exultant Pride proclamation to get us through the night.

Chris Azzopardi: When we last spoke in 2018, I felt like you were just getting settled into New Orleans. You had just maybe moved, is that right? Jake Shears: Yeah, I'd been there

for a little while and I had my apartment. I bought my house after. I have a house there now; you're like, what are you doing in London now?

CA: That was my follow-up question, actually.

J.S.: New Orleans is always my wind-down spot, you know what I mean? It was always a place for me to go be creative and feel free. And I love it so much. I can't be there year 'round. I started getting a little twitchy. So I wanted to come to London because I knew I could just get all my work done here; I could get loads of stuff done. It's been super busy this last year, so it's been good. It's just kept me on my toes.

CA: With "Last Man Dancing," I always appreciate when you have





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a new album out because so much of my experience is rooted in your music.

JS: Thank you. I get excited about it too.

CA: And this is cool because it's an all out party. I was like, where are the Jake ballads? And it kept playing and I'm like, OK, I guess I'm just supposed to dance the whole time.

JS: Yeah, they don't come. It was an idea that I had when I had half of the songs written for this and the album was taking shape, and then I was like, "What if it just doesn't stop?" And there's a halfway point to the record, so I put it in two parts — but what if it just keeps going and literally the second half doesn't stop; there's no stops between the tracks. It's definitely a party record with a lot of different influences going on.

CA: I imagine you created it during the thick of Covid.

J.S.: Some of it. There's a few songs before, some during and some after. So not wholly. "I Used To Be In Love" and "Devil Came Down the Dance Floor" [featuring Amber Martin] were made totally remotely. Me and [producer Michael] Cheever made them a world apart and made a really cool ballet of studio monitors, iPads, iPhones, headphones, earbuds, all on top of each other to mute. If you've got your monitors going and you've got your mics going, and it's echoing and reverbing... it was just a load of muting; we'd have to get each other's attention on the screen and wave "turn things off." Yeah, it was complicated.

CA: I read that a lot of the vibe of the album was influenced by your parties, specifically ones you've had in New Orleans, which made me feel like I had missed out on a lot of good Jake Shears parties. **J.S.:** Oh god, they're still going to go on and on. My house there is very special and it's very central. It's a couple blocks out of the [French] Quarter. It's really nice. It's not fancy, but it's super cozy and vibe-y and there's loads of books and there's record players everywhere and great art and, yeah, there's a place to dance.



CA: Collaboration has been a significant aspect of your career. What do you value most about collaborative experiences and how do they influence your creative process?

J.S.: I don't make anything by myself. I get seeds of ideas. I'll do some writing. I'll get concepts, but the joy of making music is the joy of hanging out with somebody else that you like and doing something with them. Cheever, Boys Noize, Vaughn Oliver and Ryland Blackinton — we all are just great friends. We just love working together. So there's fun happening while we're making music and geeking out on stuff. It's a great hang and it's super fun. You build something together and there's payoffs. Cheever and I wrote "Diamonds Don't Burn." I was literally doing vocals in his 3-yearold's nursery when she was at school.

CA: What was going on in your life when you wrote these songs?

J.S.:It's kind of all over the place. There was nothing too personal, although my boyfriend and I broke up in the summer of 2020. I was just absolutely devastated, and it took me two years to get over it. I've never been so heartbroken, but I had no desire to put that into the music. I wanted to put the good times into it and the joy and the fun that I was having, especially when stuff started opening back up, when New Orleans sort of came alive again and we could all get together. That was what I wanted to infuse into it, the fun that I was having as well. But yeah, that was a super rough moment. A breakup in the middle of lockdown is just not fun.

CA: So many artists write best when they're heartbroken, and so the fact that you didn't take advantage of that musically and went in the opposite direction is really interesting — maybe making a dance album was, for you, the catharsis?

J.S: It is, and also, I'm just the opposite. If I'm having a bad day and if I'm not feeling good and if I'm feeling depressed, I don't want to write, I don't make myself write, I don't feel like working on creative stuff. I really only like to work creatively if I'm feeling good, if I'm



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feeling healthy, if my brain feels good. I'm not one of those people that makes lemons into lemonade, necessarily.

CA: Even now, you're still addressing themes of selfacceptance, love and empowerment. How do you think your work from Scissor Sisters and beyond has contributed to the broader conversation surrounding LGBTQ+ rights and representation?

J.S: It was a funny, old world in 2003, and it is in 2023. I do think that we are in a better spot in so many ways. It's such a big conversation. I feel like it was such a different world then: we didn't have social media and we weren't communicating the same way that we are now. I would never want to go through what I did then, now. Just having that spotlight, everybody can so easily just get amplified unwillingly in one moment, and I liked that world better.

I hope that I opened up some doors and pathways as I feel like people did for me who came before me, and it's nice to see queerness

being celebrated in mainstream culture and risks still being taken. I also find some of it to be... I'm really going to have a really hard time getting to my point. I think there's been a lot of inauthentic allyship. Look at the Dodgers right now.

CA: Do you see that same kind of

inauthentic allyship in music? **J.S:** Not necessarily. No. I see a wide breadth of artists being listened to and adored and these artists taking risks. Just seeing_Anohni_put out a record or announce an album was really exciting. But then there's the new kids I've become friends with, like Jake Wesley Rogers, who I love so much. It's just been really amazing watching him blossom. It's also really interesting because he has a completely different experience in what he is doing. I mean, he's on TikTok all day long. It's so strange. To me, I just think it's weird. I think it's unnatural, and I don't ever really want to do that. But if the kids want to do it, then have at

So listen, I can feel like an

absolute grumpy old man, but I also don't feel like an old man yet. So I don't know. I'm going to be 45 this year, which is just crazy. I don't know how I'm going to feel at 45. I'm so proud of everything I've done, and so I feel so lucky and fortunate with my career and I've been able to do all this stuff and then at the same time I'm like, "Am I going to have a family? Who's going to look after me when I start losing my marbles?"

CA: Do you have any nieces or nephews who dote on you? JS: Kelly Ripa and Mark Consuelos

are two of my best friends. I pull their kids aside all the time and I tell Lola, I'm just like, "You are going fucking to take care of me. I know you are going to take care of me."

CA: I plan on living on a "Golden Girls"-style compound with all of my queer friends, and we will just all take care of each other. We're going to help each other keep our marbles.

J.S: It's what's happened in New Orleans. All my best friends have moved down there. When I'm down





there now, it's just loads of family around. Although the other day I held a baby and burst into tears, so I'm just like, "What?"

CA: So maybe you were meant to be a real daddy.

J.S: I don't know, though. I just feel like it's a new phase of life. I definitely want to just keep working. Now, another musician friend of mine who's putting out a record next month, we had about an hour on FaceTime last week, and he's going to be 50, and he was just like, "We can't do this forever." It's like, "We got to do it now," and I agree.

CA: Next year is the 20th anniversary of Scissor Sisters'

debut album. I know you get this question all the time about a reunion, and based on what I've read, you're very open to it. So if you're very open to it, why hasn't it happened yet?

J.S: I don't know. I think I want everybody to be down and ready and stoked if that was ever to happen. I definitely don't want to be twisting anybody's arm. Not that that's happening, but yeah, it would be nice. I think it would be really fun, and I think it would be great. So yeah, you never know. Stranger things have happened.

CA: I think people want you to be the ringleader here and get the

troop together, but I guess everyone has to be in on that too. J.S: Everyone's got their own lives and stuff, you know what I mean? All I can do is just keep moving forward and doing what I love to do, and I'm so happy about just getting to put this album out. I feel like this record's got some Scissor spirit to it in a lot of ways. It's all one. I look at it as one body of work.

Important Facts About DOVATO

This is only a brief summary of important information about DOVATO and does not replace talking to your healthcare provider about your condition and treatment.

What is the most important information I should know about DOVATO?

If you have both human immunodeficiency virus-1 (HIV-1) infection and Hepatitis B virus (HBV) infection, DOVATO can cause serious side effects, including:

- Resistant HBV. Your healthcare provider will test you for HBV infection before you start treatment with DOVATO. If you have HIV-1 and hepatitis B, the HBV can change (mutate) during your treatment with DOVATO and become harder to treat (resistant). It is not known if DOVATO is safe and effective in people who have HIV-1 and HBV infection
- Worsening of HBV infection. If you have HBV infection and take DOVATO, your HBV may get worse (flare-up) if you stop taking DOVATO.
 A "flare-up" is when your HBV infection suddenly returns in a worse way than before.
 - Do not run out of DOVATO. Refill your prescription or talk to your healthcare provider before your DOVATO is all gone.

- Do not stop DOVATO without first talking to your healthcare provider.
- If you stop taking DOVATO, your healthcare provider will need to check your health often and do blood tests regularly for several months to check your liver function and monitor your HBV infection. It may be necessary to give you a medicine to treat hepatitis B. Tell your healthcare provider about any new or unusual symptoms you may have after you stop taking DOVATO.

What is DOVATO?

DOVATO is a prescription medicine that is used without other HIV-1 medicines to treat human immunodeficiency virus-1 (HIV-1) infection in adults: who have not received HIV-1 medicines in the past, or to replace their current HIV-1 medicines when their healthcare provider determines that they meet certain requirements. HIV-1 is the virus that causes Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS). It is not known if DOVATO is safe and effective in children.

Important Facts About DOVATO (cont'd)

Who should not take DOVATO?

Do not take DOVATO if you:

- have ever had an allergic reaction to a medicine that contains dolutegravir or lamivudine.
- take dofetilide. Taking DOVATO and dofetilide can cause side effects that may be serious or life-threatening.

What should I tell my healthcare provider before using DOVATO?

Tell your healthcare provider about all of your medical conditions, including if you:

- have or have had liver problems, including hepatitis B or C infection.
- have kidney problems.
- are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. One of the medicines in DOVATO (dolutegravir) may harm your unborn baby.
 - Your healthcare provider may prescribe a different medicine than DOVATO if you are planning to become pregnant or if pregnancy is confirmed during the first 12 weeks of pregnancy.
 - If you can become pregnant, your healthcare provider may perform a
 pregnancy test before you start treatment with DOVATO.
 - If you can become pregnant, you and your healthcare provider should talk about the use of effective birth control (contraception) during treatment with DOVATO.
 - Tell your healthcare provider right away if you are planning to become pregnant, you become pregnant, or think you may be pregnant during treatment with DOVATO.
- are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed. Do not breastfeed if you take DOVATO.
 - You should not breastfeed if you have HIV-1 because of the risk of passing HIV-1 to your baby.
 - DOVATO passes to your baby in your breast milk.
 - Talk with your healthcare provider about the best way to feed your baby.

Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements.

Some medicines interact with DOVATO. Keep a list of your medicines and show it to your healthcare provider and pharmacist when you get a new medicine.

- You can ask your healthcare provider or pharmacist for a list of medicines that interact with DOVATO.
- Do not start taking a new medicine without telling your healthcare provider. Your healthcare provider can tell you if it is safe to take DOVATO with other medicines.

What are possible side effects of DOVATO?

DOVATO can cause serious side effects, including:

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What are possible side effects of DOVATO? (cont'd)

- Allergic reactions. Call your healthcare provider right away if you
 develop a rash with DOVATO. Stop taking DOVATO and get medical
 help right away if you develop a rash with any of the following
 signs or symptoms: fever; generally ill feeling; tiredness; muscle or joint aches;
 blisters or sores in mouth; blisters or peeling of the skin; redness or swelling
 of the eyes; swelling of the mouth, face, lips, or tongue; problems breathing.
- Liver problems. People with a history of hepatitis B or C virus may have an increased risk of developing new or worsening changes in certain liver tests during treatment with DOVATO. Liver problems, including liver failure, have also happened in people without a history of liver disease or other risk factors. Your healthcare provider may do blood tests to check your liver. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you get any of the following signs or symptoms of liver problems: your skin or the white part of your eyes turns yellow (jaundice); dark or "tea-colored" urine; light-colored stools (bowel movements); nausea or vomiting; loss of appetite; and/or pain, aching, or tenderness on the right side of your stomach area.
- Too much lactic acid in your blood (lactic acidosis). Too much lactic acid is a serious medical emergency that can lead to death. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you get any of the following symptoms that could be signs of lactic acidosis: feel very weak or tired; unusual (not normal) muscle pain; trouble breathing; stomach pain with nausea and vomiting; feel cold, especially in your arms and legs; feel dizzy or lightheaded; and/or a fast or irregular heartbeat.
- Lactic acidosis can also lead to severe liver problems, which can lead to death. Your liver may become large (hepatomegaly) and you may develop fat in your liver (steatosis). Tell your healthcare provider right away if you get any of the signs or symptoms of liver problems which are listed above under "Liver problems."
- You may be more likely to get lactic acidosis or severe liver problems if you are female or very overweight (obese).
- Changes in your immune system (Immune Reconstitution Syndrome) can happen when you start taking HIV-1 medicines. Your immune system may get stronger and begin to fight infections that have been hidden in your body for a long time. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you start having new symptoms after you start taking DOVATO.
- The most common side effects of DOVATO include: headache; nausea; diarrhea; trouble sleeping; tiredness; and anxiety.

These are not all the possible side effects of DOVATO. Call your doctor for medical advice about side effects.

Who is he? What are you into...musically? Intrigue me. **DJ Mohammad:** I'm Mohammad Fahidi, and my DJ name is just my first name. I felt it was unique enough, so why do I change it, right? I've been DJing for about eight years now, since 2015, Originally from San Francisco - and that's where it all started; it's where I learned how to DJ and got my music inspirations. I live in Atlanta now, but San Francisco will always be home. I started just DJing at a bar and it's grown into something amazing... and now I'm getting to do Pride in the Park in Chicago, which is extremely exciting for me.

Chez: Express to me your style of music; what are you known for? DJ Mohammad: I think opening your mind to different styles and sounds

is a good thing, and my music will bring you there. I'm a big fan of using dark elements throughout my music along with some strong, aggressive rhythm and powerful vocals. I enjoy a darker tone to the music something sexy.

Chez: [Gay gasp]

DJ Mohammad: But don't worry...
since Pride in the Park is mostly a
fun, daytime Pride celebration my set
will be a great high-energy, good
vibes disco party with some other
great sounds people can sing along
to and embrace their Pride. In many

ways, I can be very versatile.

Chez: I love this interview already. Also, tell me about what types of events you're typically booked for. *DJ Mohammad:* I get booked for all different types of events. I'll do afterhour events, pool parties, and primetime events like Pride in the Park. Versatility is key and I truly love that. It's all about the music and good vibes.

Chez:As we both laughed and about the music industry and how he manages to keep sane with all of the clubs, parties, and traveling so much... the infamous Gaga quote was in my head: "No sleep, bus, club, another club, another club, plane, next place, no sleep, no fear nobody believed in me." It's very clear you're passionate about your art. Creatively speaking, what gets you off? What are you into?

DJ Mohammad: What gets me gets me going and, you know, it's turned into something pretty incredible, is knowing that started DJing at a bar and now I'm doing gigs like Pride in the Park. I love underground parties and festivals, and just something in me loves the underground kind of style parties where the DJ actually isn't really the focal point. It's more of the music and just the vibe and all that. Besides music, I'm very into traveling to different cities and discovering new things and places and also enjoy video games a lot.

Chez: We love that you're coming to Pride in the Park! How familiar were you with it?

DJ Mohammad: I've actually seen so many videos and posts about it and of course the amazing lineups. And through Circuit Mom, I'm happy to be returning to Chicago again and debuting at Pride in the Park. I'm very excited as well because I've never gotten to experience Pride in Chicago before because it's at the same time as San Francisco Pride in New York Pride.

Chez: For you, what role does music play in queer culture? **DJ Mohammad:** That's a good question. Music is one of the most important things we probably have, it's who we are. I also believe that it depends on the person and their tastes, and what they need from the music at that moment, music is life and saves them too. In our community, some really love the dance vocal remixes and something to sing along to, and I think that's important because it shines a light on us. It shows how we can be free and how we accept who we are.

Chez: Have you ever seen or felt that your music gives them a sense of hope or a sense of it being a safer space for them by just hearing your music?

Follow me on this. Of course, you'll get people that like circuit music and others that definitely don't, but I'm not meaning musical tastes, I'm referring to that very moment and the people who're there experiencing vour sounds and living in the moment - or going through it - that vou've seen the effect it has on them in some way. DJ

Mohammad: Hmm, I'm not sure how to answer that. I suppose I do have a platform and the opportunity to help people if they come talk to me. I'm always approachable and love talking to people.

Chez: There is no right or wrong answer, but think of it like this; I regularly use comedy to mask my own pain but I also recognize its power in helping someone simply to laugh once that day. For me, it's a simple, effective way to help people, regardless if I directly or indirectly feel something isn't right. So many people in our community have dark thoughts and feel alone or afraid, so I use comedy as a way to pay it forward.Listening to good music and DJs, I know people can in a way associate the DJ talking and helping them without saving a word. If the DJ is vibing with the crowd and recognizing their music's impact, it can be very healing. It could make that person feel happy and safe.

DJ Mohammad: Yeah, wow, actually, that's a great way to put it. Thank you. I haven't heard it put that way before and I like it. I'm openly gay and I like to show my Pride and



go to Pride events and can go as my real self.

Hearing you say it like that makes me think how many people come out to events scared, but don't say that of course. I hope that the people who aren't out yet – scared to be out or dealing with other things in life – may come to listen to the music and take from it whatever they need and feel free at some point. That's a


were never able to fulfill, one of them being music.

Chez: Do you have any musical influences that you pull from? Are there any artists you're just obsessed with right now? Miss Toto: So yeah, I wrote "Fangs" around Halloween last year. I do a Halloween series where I do different iconic looks and this year was all black vampires, which inspired me to write Fangs.

Chez: Are you excited to see any of the musical acts or drag performers?



Miss Toto: As far as the drag goes, all of those because the entertainers are my friends. I love seeing my friends have a platform like this because just to me, I think it really is the biggest stage in Chicago for drag. I'm trying to think of other stages, but that's really it. Excited to see Zedd, who I saw at Bonnaroo. I know a bunch of other gays lost their minds when they saw Zara Larsson.

Chez: Do you think the secret ingredient is to what you do? Just feeling like the crowd and the vibe, overall. Miss Toto: I think the overall ingredient is trusting yourself. Don't think too much. There's a lot of just being an artist in general, not specifically, even a queer artist is just a lot of self-doubt. When you're putting your art out there, use to always ask myself if people are going to like what I'm doing. But then you have to remember, like, not everything is for everybody. So not everyone's going to love every damn DJ or drag performer.

As long as there are a few people in the crowd that will you're at least going to make them have a good time and have a memorable experience.

Chez: Well, tell me any closing remarks, What do you want to say to the girlie pops? What do you want to say to people that have been coming for the first time. *Miss Toto:* I will say If you already have your ticket, I cannot wait to see you there. But if you do not have your ticket, you need to get on it now because it's not anything that you want to miss. You're not going to regret it. I promise you. It's going to be major.

A Reminder of Why We Must **Protect Trans People**

We should fight for the rights of transgender people because it is the right thing to do and because trans rights, like Black rights, queer rights and HIV rights are human rights point blank, period.

I recently spelled that out to a former friend and fellow same-genderloving man who asked why I kept getting "distracted" by supporting transgender folks. This person felt that I should stay in my lane and focus on HIV instead. He insisted erroneously - that our trans siblings "don't have it as bad as we did back in the day," and were therefore less deserving of support.

It was almost as if he had transformed into a conservative commentator and forgotten about the existence of intersectionality - the overlay of existing discriminations that oppress various groups - and that we are all in this together.

Bigotry by any other name is still bigotry

After reminding him that he was mirroring the same coded language that xenophobic bigots have long used to deny aid to immigrants, I told him that I'd been hit with similar rhetoric from people who should've been standing in community with me: queer folks who have told me that people living with HIV "mess it up for gay people," heterosexual artists who have claimed that my homosexuality was a perversion or that the only reason I was successful was because I am Black, and supposedly liberal but actually racist — white gay men who've insisted that Black people "don't have it as bad as [gay people] do and need to sit down.

Not that the fight for collective liberation needs to be a case of the oppression Olympics, but it is obtuse to ignore the reality that if neo-Nazis show up, they are going to target Black folks first. Reductive comparisons aside, I speak of racism because the foundation for oppressing others in this country is rooted in anti-Blackness equating the richness of one's skin with "dark evil," all while connecting the notion of "pale superiority" with purity — and that this same ideology has been seized by homophobes to associate queerness and especially transgender existence with negativity. Hence the rush by right-wing extremists, such as the so-called Proud Boys, to target drag performers, who they equate with trans people.

What it all comes down to, I told my no-longer friend, is that there will always be a reason to hate people who are different - especially when it helps one to divide and conquer. Or as the activist and artist Qween Jean recently put it, "How are we fighting for Black liberation while denying it for our gueer and trans siblings? The assignment was to dismantle the master's house - not move into the guest house."

But moving into "master's guest house" - by becoming white supremacist adjacent and allowing proxy wars to turn us against each other - seems to be the name of the game for some people. And what's it all about? Ultimately, the collective eradication of anyone who exists outside of white Christian patriarchy's

Arguing for freedom of thought while promoting genocide

Following our fractious discussion, I told my former friend that our relationship was over, at which point, he suggested that I was the actual bigot because I was judging him for holding a different opinion. I responded, "Harriet Tubman would have left you," and walked away. Snappy retort and calm exterior aside, I felt sadly about this breakup. I got over it by reminding myself that while I respect one's right to disagree with



me, I refuse to share my time with anyone who argues for the invalidation of another person's right to exist - or who peddles antiliberation talking points.

The most recent rush of antiliberation (and decidedly anti-queer) hate seems to have broken past years of anti-trans bathroom and sports legislation and found a new standard bearer in the governor of Florida's socalled "Don't Say Gay" law - which forces educators to out children who might be gueer to their parents. The genesis for that law can be tracked to the Helms Amendment, which was introduced in 1987 by then-Republican Sen. Jesse Helms. That "no promo homo" law prohibited any funds provided by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention from supporting HIV prevention materials and advocacy that might "promote or encourage, directly or indirectly, homosexual sexual activities." This included mentioning anal sex.

Though Helms could be called the modern day progenitor of recent anti-LGBTQ+ legislation, its original blueprint was laid by a group of people who fled religious persecution in England, only to oppress others in this country — all while enshrining the rights of white Christian male landowners to eliminate Indigenous people, enslave and medically experiment on kidnapped Africans, and oppress their descendants. Presently, there is a move to erase this history because it might make white





kids feel badly — all while ignoring how global majority children might feel or the fact that such history could inspire white youth to feel positively by aligning themselves with collective freedom.

Dragging us back in time

These efforts to legislate global majority and queer people out of existence are part of a multi-pronged attack to deny historically marginalized people access to sexual health or basic care, are the literal manifestation of "Silence=Death," and have disastrous implications for all people — because what affects one will eventually affect all.

Though there has been some racial and sexual progress over the last two decades, with this year's introduction of over 400 anti-LGBTQ bills, it seems that conservative activists have returned to saying the quiet part out loud. To wit, the conservative commentator who — during the Conservative Political Action Conference, held earlier this month — stated, "transgenderism must be eradicated from public life entirely."

This brings us back to Helms who, during his arguments against

funding HIV prevention, stated, "Some senators believe the AIDS epidemic is so bad that we should disseminate whatever materials anyone wants to produce regardless of content. But I still flinch when I hear the word condom on television... We've got to call a spade a spade and a perverted human being a perverted human being, not in anger but in realism... I just want the American taxpayer's dollars to be spent in a moral way."

By 1993, Helms' morals had contributed to HIV becoming the leading cause of death among people aged 25-44 years in the U.S. Though he was considered extreme in his day, he still held the ear of Pres. Ronald Reagan and was able to push forward his amendment with a vote of 94-2. As Lori Behrman — then-spokesperson of Gay Men's Health Crisis (GMHC) — foresaw, "This kind of amendment only sets a precedent that will come to haunt everyone at a later date."

That date is now. And if we aren't all in this together — if we don't support transgender people who currently bear the brunt of these attacks, even as they fight for our collective right to thrive — we will be taken down piece by piece until there is no one is left.

The host with the most: An interview with John Waters

You know that old Scott McKenzie song? The one that goes, "If you're going to San Francisco...?" If you head east from San Francisco, across the Bay Bridge, then you'll arrive in Oakland where, on July 1 & 2, "filth elder" John Waters will be emceeing the 2023 edition of the hip, queer, punk music festival Mosswood Meltdown. This year's line-up is one deserving of Waters' inimitable hosting and includes groundbreaking acts such as Le Tigre, Gravy Train!!!!, ESG, Bratmobile, JJ Fad, and Quintron & Ms. Pussycat, among others. John Waters was gracious enough to make time to answer a few questions in advance of Mosswood Meltdown.

Gregg Shapiro: In early July, you will once again be hosting the Mosswood Meltdown music festival in Oakland, California. How did you become involved with the festival?

John Waters: I was asked to do it through my two music promoters who also promote the "John Waters Christmas" (show) and a lot of my different shows. Punks have always been my people. I always felt at home in the punk world. So, I said yes. Mark and Amy, who run the thing, liked it. It worked the first time and then it's just become part of a tradition. I do it every year. I introduce all the acts. I'm writing the intros right now. I get a great education! I'm probably the oldest punk there. They treat me with great respect, even the youngest ones. It's just a perfect place for a filth elder to end up. I love it because they're all angry and funny and in a good mood. They love each other and they just hate everybody else in the world. It's kind of funny because they're good people. It's a crazy couple of days, but it's a peaceful one, even with all the slam dancing

and all the music is about craziness. There's a certain irony. They are good people; the punks.

GS: The 2023 line-up is awesome and features Le Tigre, ESG, Gravy Train!!!!, and Bratmobile, to name a few. JW: It's almost all women. There are a few men that we're allowing in our liberalism to play [laughs].



GS: Are there bands that you are particularly looking forward to hearing?

JW: Well, I'd love to see the ones like Gravy Train!!!! because they haven't performed in a long time. I get a great education in punk rock every year. My youth spies come through. But punk's there, anywhere from 12 years old to 80. That's what's so amazing. Punk really has never died and it never feels dated.

GS: Have you ever been invited onstage to perform with any bands, and if so, which ones? JW: [Laughs] I would not be out there pogoing. I strictly come on and they like to hear me do their introductions. Iggy (Pop) and I have never stage-dived together. Even though he was really great; we're the same age. He's more

adventuresome than I am, especially about being nude.

GS: If you were going to form a band in 2023, with you as the front-person, what musicians would you want to enlist to perform with you?

JW: Oh, God! Well, first of all, if I could sing, I would have exploited that a long time ago. I guess I would have a G.G. Allin cover band.

GS: He was sort of Iggy-ish; the stuff that he used to do on stage. *JW*: G.G. Allin used to throw turds (at the audience). He would be the opposite gay thing because he was known for having a tiny penis. It would be for reverse size-queens.

GS: That would be a great name for a band, too. The Reverse Size-Queens.

JW: It would be! John Waters and the Reverse Size-Queens.

GS: In preparing for this interview. I was thinking about the role of music in your movies, beginning with the "Polyester" theme song sung by Tab Hunter and Debbie Harry, and then the vintage tunes on the 1988 "Hairspray" soundtrack. Can you please say something about the role of music in vour life?

JW: In "Desperate Living," I had a classical score. In "Cecil B. Demented," we had noise punk bands playing. Stiv Bators (of the bands Dead Boys and Lords of the New Church), was in "Polyester." Debbie Harry was also in "Hairspray," and she started in the punk movement. I've always had punk attitude. "Pink Flamingos" was a punk rock movie before there was such a thing as punk rock.

GS: The compilations "A John Waters Christmas" (2004) and "A **Date With John** Waters" (2007) featured a diverse selection of artists including Tiny Tim, The Chipmunks, Ike & Tina Turner, Edith Massey, and John Prine with Iris DeMent. Could you foresee putting together another such compilation, perhaps one for Pride?

JW: A Gay Pride one? I guess. [Laughs] There was a hipster gay pride parade once in London, called the Gay Shame Parade. It was really funny. I must admit that gay music is kind of terrible [laughs]. Yes, I would like to do a gay one. "Jet Boy Jet Girl" would have to be on there. That was my favorite.

GS: Yes, Elton Motello!

JW: But I've already used that one on "A Date With John Waters." Now there are so many gay songs. I definitely could do a really good gay pride album! I'll have to think about that one. Maybe that will come in the future.

GS: Two of your movies, "Hairspray" and "Cry Baby" have been adapted into Broadway musicals. Is there another one of



your movies that you think would make a good musical?

JW: I always said "Pink Flamingos" would make a good opera. It was optioned once to be an opera, but it never happened. I think "Pink Flamingos" as an opera would work best of all the other ones. GS: In late May 2023, Leslie Van Houten, about whom you wrote in your 2010 book "Role Models," had her grant of parole reinstated by a state appeals court panel. What does that mean to you? JW: I'm going to let the appeals court speak for them-selves on that. I believe the most important thing to read is the amazing L.A. Times editorial that came out this week

saying that they agreed she should be free.

GS: Finally, John, we're speaking during the first few days of Pride Month 2023. As you know, I live in Fort Lauderdale, which is kind of ground zero. Do you have any thoughts about the current state of Pride celebrations, especially since we are under attack more than ever? JW: It only makes you stronger! Remember Anita Bryant? She made the gay movement so strong. Didn't she come from Florida? I want to have "Don't Say Straight" in Florida. Where you can't do line dancing. I think it's a little late to attack drag queens. It's a little late to attack gay anything because it's so accepted now. They're 30 years too late.

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

Dangers of Selling Your House With No

Money Down

Q: My husband and I are selling our Lake Shore Drive condominium so we can retire in Florida – no more Chicago winters. We have owned the condo for over 15 years and have the mortgage almost paid off. Our condo has been for sale for more than a year but we can't seem to find a buyer.

We did receive an offer from a real estate investor who lives in our building who agreed to pay our full asking price but wanted us to finance 100 percent of the purchase price. The offer is tempting because we could get our price and receive monthly payments which we would use for our retirement, but we would get no money at closing. Is there any risk to us? Could this jeopardize our retirement?

A: On the other side of every "no money down" transaction is the

seller who accepts a piece of paper for his or her property instead of cash. Typically, these sellers are older and own their property free and clear. Even though the seller may be getting his or her asking price the question is should the seller take this kind of financing? The answer is no.

There are many creative strategies to help buyers finance the purchase of real estate. One strategy includes the borrowing of some of the purchase price from the seller. A seller financing part of the purchase price is a legitimate method to make real estate purchases affordable to buyers and can benefit both parties in a sale.

With the "no money down" method of real estate financing, instead of the seller receiving the bulk of the sales price at the closing and financing 10 to 20 percent of the price, the seller finances the entire purchase price for a buyer who needs no money to close.

Some no money down plans involve a buyer who will take title to the property, refinance it himself,

give the seller a little of the money and use the balance of the money for something else. If he defaults on the loan, the bank will foreclose and the seller would have to pay off the bank to be able to take back the property.

My advice to the couple in the question is that they should not sell their home to someone who does not have any money. Their buyer could be a big risk because he may lack the income and savings to buy the building on conventional terms. The buyer could have bad credit, too many loans or have gone bankrupt.




I suspect that the real problem in the question is a too high an asking price for the property. If the price were lowered a conventional buyer could be found. Although getting a full price offer may sound attractive it's really a price cut in disguise. Whenever a seller agrees to give up property for a promise of future payments at less than the going rate, the value of the deal is reduced. The couple would be better off cutting the price and taking cash or selling their condo with different seller financing methods that offer real protection to the seller instead of only risk.

If the seller's mortgage were paid off, an acceptable alternative would be to sell the condo on a land contract, receiving a 10 or 20 percent downpayment while financing the balance over 20 to 30 years with a five year balloon (a balloon means that all the remaining payments come due after five years and the buyers would then have to obtain new financing from a bank).

But be warned, save that downpayment and be prepared to use it to get the property back if the buyer ever defaults.

PARADE INFORMATION

DATE: Sunday, June 25th

TIME: 12 Noon

STARTS at: Broadway &

Montrose.

LINE UP: North Broadway (both the east and the west curb lanes, from Montrose to Wilson); West Montrose (both the north and south curb lanes from Broadway to Clark); Sunnyside Ave from Broadway to North Sheridan Road and North Sheridan Road, between Montrose and Wilson.

ROUTE: Step off from the Broadway/Montrose corner, proceeding south on Broadway; then south on Halsted; then east on Belmont; then south on Broadway; then east on Diversey to Cannon Drive

CONTENT & DESCRIPTION:

The parade will feature 150 registered entries, including floats, decorated vehicles, performance groups, a marching band and walking contingents.

The entries represent community organizations, businesses, governmental officials and individual community members. Crowd estimates each year are in the hundreds of thousands. So the plans are to line the parade route with barricades on both sides of the street from beginning to the end of the parade route. Spectators will be required to remain behind the barricades. (Only parade registrants traveling down the middle of the street, police officers, other city officials, security staff, parade marshals and credentialed media reps will be allowed in the street). In recent years, the City of Chicago has required that several large city parades, including the Pride Parade, line their parade routes with barricades at our own expense. Police officers and parade marshals will be stationed at various points on the street in front of the barricades along the parade route. Police officers will also be in the area surrounding the parade. In addition, PRIDEChicago (parade coordinators) are providing a security team to supplement the police

presence along and surrounding the parade route (please note any of this information is subject to change on the day of the Parade without notice).

\$1000 Fine FOR PUBLIC ALCOHOL CONSUMPTION:

The parade will have more security and a tighter rein on public alcohol consumption. In addition to the large number of police officers who staff the event, PRIDEChicago (parade coordinators) are providing a security team to supplement the police presence. Penalties include, but are not limited to, \$1000+ tickets being issued and/or the immediate disposal of open containers of alcohol into trash receptacles. Public urination is also grounds to receive a ticket.

PARADE DAY HEALTH/ SAFETY:

Bring plenty of bottled water, sunscreen and a hat or other head covering, and dress lightly because parade day is usually hot and sunny.

STREET CLOSURES: (on parade day, Sunday, June 26)

ASSEMBLY AREA: Tentative time: 10:30 a.m.

PARADE ROUTE: Rolling closing times. Cross streets will close as the parade travels south down the route. closing times. Cross streets will close as the parade travels south down the route. After stepping off at 12:00 PM, the parade will take approximately two and one-half hours to finish crossing the Broadway & Montrose corner. After this time, the floats will still be winding their way to the end of the parade route at Diversey & Sheridan. This year there will NOT be a Buffer Zone on Halsted Street after the parade ends. Police will work to re-open the streets to vehicular traffic as soon as cleaning crews are finished and the streets will not remain open to foot traffic.



PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION: From

the Red Line: Wilson, Sheridan, Addison or Belmont all provide access via a short walk to the parade route.

PLEASE NOTE: The Belmont station (and the surrounding area) tends to become the most crowded, so you are encouraged to consider watching the parade from the other parts of the route, including areas toward the start of the route-such as Broadway. south of Montrose-which are served by both the nearby Wilson and Sheridan stations on the Red Line. In addition, a number of lakefront bus routes including the 146 and 151 provide convenient access from the north, the Gold Coast/North Michigan Avenue and downtown to areas east of the parade route.

Extra service will be provided on the "L' on parade day to accommodate the large numbers of people who attend the parade. Due to the increase of local traffic and a number of bus reroutes, potential parade spectators are advised to make use of the L or the various bus routes.

NEEDS AND SPECIAL NEEDS:

Physically Challenged Area/Wheel chair Accessible Area/Seniors -

for people who need or want more space: the sidewalks of West Diversey Parkway (near 600 W. Diversey). Traditionally this area of the parade route has fewer spectators than other sections of the parade route. Spectators in these areas generally arrive there early on parade morning to secure their viewing spots. Included there are restrooms for the physically challenged.

1. \$1000 FINE FOR PUBLIC ALCOHOL CONSUMPTION:

The parade will have more security and a tighter rein on public alcohol consumption. In addition to the large number of police officers who staff the event, PRIDEChicago (parade coordinators) are providing a security team to supplement the police presence. Penalties include, but are not limited to \$1000+ tickets being issued and/or the immediate disposal of open containers of alcoholic beverages into trash receptacles. (Public urination is also grounds to receive a ticket).

2. STARTING TIME: The parade starts at 12 Noon. So, arrive early to find a good spot.

3. PUBLIC

TRANSPORTATION: Parking in the area is limited, so walk, take public transportation (or if you must drive, then car pool). For CTA/PACE/Metra transit information, call 1-312-836-7000; Web

Site: www.transitchicago.com or 1-312-322-6900, Web Site: www.metrarail.com; Potential spectators are advised to consider making use of RED line el stations including Sheridan Road, Wilson Avenue or Addison Street (The Belmont stop becomes extremely over crowded on parade day).

4. BARRICADES: The parade route will be lined with iron barricades. Spectators will be required to stand behind the barricades, not in the street. Besides the parade registrants traveling down the middle of the street, only police officers, other city officials, security staff, parade marshals and credentialed members of the media will be allowed in the street.

5. PEDESTRIAN CROSS-**OVER STREETS:** The 9 corners where pedestrians may cross from one side of the parade route to the other side include: Montrose Ave. at Broadway; Irving Park Rd. at Broadway: Grace St. at Halsted St.: Addison St. at Halsted St.: Roscoe St. at Halsted St.: Wellington Ave. at Broadway; Aldine St. at Halsted St. Cornelia Ave at Halsted St; Barry Ave at Broadway.

There will be police officers assigned to assist pedestrians in crossing at these locations. For updates:

6. CROWDS: Since the number of spectators have increased dramatically in recent years on Halsted Street, spectators are being advised to try other sections of the parade route to view the parade (for example, 4000 to 4300 N. Broadway). In addition, spectators must watch the parade on the actual parade route, not in the assembly area. (The assembly area is for parade participants only).

7. SAMPLING: City ordinance prevents parade participants from tossing items to spectators. Likewise, spectators should not toss items back to parade participants. Spectators are not allowed to walk into the street to get items. Spectators must wait until parade participants come to the sidelines to hand out items. Parade participants are not allowed to hand out items to spectators who are standing on sidewalks in the assembly area. Spectators who want sample items must view the parade from the parade route, not the assembly area. For safety, no high powered water rifles are allowed.

8. TRASH: Keep the neighborhood clean by using trash barrels provided along the route.

9. NEEDS & SPECIAL

NEEDS: Physically challenged/ wheelchair accessible and senior area is provided. See parade website for details. Portable restrooms are placed along parade route.

10. POLICE PERSONNEL ARE ON HAND (as well as parade marshals): In addition, PRIDEChicago (parade coordinators) are providing security officers to assist. But spectators can be a big help by obeying the above rules and city ordinances in relation to alcohol consumption and other issues.
