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

Monarch's hot butterfly: An interview with Kevin Cahoon

Fox's new musical nighttime soap opera "Monarch" is to country music as the network's "Empire" was to hip-hop. Complete with over-the-top exaggerated characters, familial intrigue, infidelity, and tragedy. Oh, and a few queer characters, too. Among those characters is hair and makeup artist Earl, played by out actor and singer Kevin Cahoon. In addition to occasionally being the much-needed source of comic relief, Earl also plays the irreplaceable best friend of country music queen Dottie Roman, played by none other than Oscar-winner Susan Sarandon. Fortunately for us, Kevin was kind enough to make time in his schedule to answer a few questions.

Gregg Shapiro: Kevin, I first became aware of you as a performer via your music and your band Ghetto Cowboy. Your debut album "Doll" won an OutMusic Award in 2006. When you look back at that time, how do you feel about it?
Kevin Cahoon: That's one of the proudest achievements I've ever had in

my life; winning an OutMusic Award for "Doll." It really is! It's on every bio, every résumé. I was so proud to have received it because, in a way, I was coming from the theater, and to do this as my first foray into music, creating rock and roll and pop songs; it just felt like the warmest embrace. I was so honored to receive that. That whole period of my life, with Ghetto Cowboy, and playing all of those incredible venues, like Don Hill and CBGS's. To have been a part of that and to have been a part of the queer music scene at that time felt special. The LGBTQIA community is still moving forward, trying to gain equality across the board. But at that time this was (during) "don't ask, don't tell." This was before marriage equality.

GS: The early 2000s.

KC: Yes, it was even before "RuPaul's Drag Race." The culture had no understanding about this music and these people that really were making this music. So, it really felt like the outsiders were crashing their way

through the door. I even felt that way naming the band Ghetto Cowboy. I thought, "People who are disenfranchised and pushed to the outskirts of society are forced to live in a ghetto." Whether it's a Jewish ghetto or a Spanish Ghetto or African American, or even rural people in Appalachia or in rural parts of this country, they are pushed, pushed, pushed to the boundaries. By naming the band that I thought, "Oh, this is what it is. We're gonna come in. We're gonna be cowboys in this and we are going to stake our claim from the outside." It was an incredible moment, and it was so exciting, and it was one of the greatest times of my life.

GS: Have you had the time to work on any new original music?

KC: I haven't, and I want to. I think about it all the time. It's coming, I promise. I have an idea for the long-awaited second album [laughs].

GS: As you mentioned, at the same time you were making this music,



you were doing a lot of theater and have continued to focus on your acting career. Would you say you're a singer who acts or an actor who sings?

KC: I would say that I'm an actor who sings. Even with the rock and roll, it was coming from a place of character, and a place of story. I felt like I was playing a character when I was fronting my band.

GS: You're currently in the new Texas-set Fox series "Monarch" in which you play Earl Clark. What was it about the character of Earl that appealed to you as an actor?

KC: First of all, it's a network series with Susan Sarandon and Trace Adkins. That was a giant appeal! As an actor, I was connected to the world because I grew up in Texas, I grew up in the rodeo and I have a real soft spot for it, if there's a pair of cowboy boots and a cowboy hat, I'm gonna grab them and put them on. I love the whole aesthetic. I love the world. I love the outsider going out into the plains and staking a claim for himself. That's the world of "Monarch." This show biz, countrywestern family. It is the juiciest of fun soap operas you could ever imagine.

GS: It's very much in the mold of a classic nighttime soap opera.

KC: It is! In the greatest way. Who doesn't love that? We all loved "Desperate Housewives," "Nashville," "Dallas," and "Dynasty." The character (I play) was inspired by a real person named Earl Cox. He is the premier hairstylist to every country star you can ever imagine. So, the ("Monarch") creator, Melissa London Hilfers, saw his place in their world and thought. "Let's create a character that is inspired by him." So, it's loosely inspired, but she ran with it. I (Earl) have worked for the family for decades. I have been the best friend of Dottie Roman, played by Susan Sarandon. The series evolves when you get to episodes six, seven, and eight, more is revealed as to what Earl knows, and how long he's been around. He lives on the ranch (The Brambles) with the family. We shot on this incredible 140-acre ranch right outside of Atlanta. It was a dream. The job was a dream. I'm praying that I continue to have more of that dream [laughs]. We'll see what happens when it gets to season two.

Gregg Shapiro: I'm so glad you said



what you did about Earl and Dottie. There is a palpable exchange of affectionate feelings between them. Would you agree that without their gay hair and makeup people, most country divas would end up looking like Marjorie Taylor Greene?

Kevin Cahoon: Gay people are the motor in the pickup truck of the country music industry. I say that Earl Clark showed up to The Brambles with a suitcase full of rhinestones and a dream. His dream was to be in show business. To be close to an iconic diva of country music, which is Dottie Roman, played by Susan and he enjoys being that close to the first lady, and he enjoys his place as the major domo gatekeeper. He will do anything he has to do to retain that position. I think he loves getting dressed up. In the show, they have a fantastic rockabilly hairstyle for me and great, sparkly clothes. I told the wardrobe and hair team that he enjoys getting made-up just as much as he enjoys making Dottie up. That should be part of his essence. That he loves to be seen and he loves to show off and I think they accomplished that with their incredible wardrobe and

GS: Is there any possibility of Earl having a love interest?

KC: There is. If a season two happens, I think that that is in the pipeline.

GS: The queer energy in "Monarch" is powerful with you and singer/songwriter Beth Ditto, who plays Dottie's and Albie's (Trace Adkins) daughter Gigi, representing for us. What is it like



working with Beth?

KC: We fell in love immediately. I'm from Texas. Beth is from Arkansas. We fell in love over Zoom. That's how much I love her. She said to me over the Zoom, "Oh, I can tell I'm gonna fall in love with you." And I said, "Well, I've been in love with you for years because I know who you are. I'm afraid you're stuck with me for the rest of your life." We have a daily text exchange, Beth and I, which I cherish, and it happens late at night, usually, because we're both night owls. This text exchange can be about how much we both love Ritz crackers [laughs]. It can go deep, or it can go surface. But I love her and I cherish her, and I'm so lucky that I'll have her in my life for the rest of my life.

GS: Could there someday be a creative collaboration between Kevin and Beth?

KC: Yes! Come on. I would just die and go to heaven. That would be a dream. Maybe we can come up with a song for the show.

GS: Fantastic. Will "Monarch"'s audience ever have a chance to hear you sing?

KC: Well, I hope that's another thing in season two. Let's get a boyfriend and let's get a song.

GS: "Monarch" is set in Texas. As a Houston native, how do you feel about the way Texas is depicted in "Monarch," as well as in other shows set in the state?

KC: Texas is such an interesting place. Because you have these hotbeds of liberal progressiveness.

GS: Austin.

KC: Austin, Houston, Dallas. Then, on the outskirts, it's pretty red. But I do have to say that within those red pockets, LGBTQIA people are there. They are part of the fabric. They are accepted, they are beloved. They are part of the world. But when a midterm election is coming up, they drag up all the stuff again to push these buttons to get people voting for them. I do feel like we are making strides today. I hope the protection of marriage equality passes in Washington. I think that would be huge. But we have to keep up the fight and we've just got to keep moving forward. There's no choice.

GS: In terms of your personal musical taste, where does country music fall when it comes to your playlist?

KC: It's high on my playlist. I listen to a lot of country music. Brandy Clark is one of my favorites.

GS: I love Brandy Clark. She's a great, queer singer-songwriter.

KC: Yes, she is, She's

spectacular! And Shane McAnally is also. I know Brandy and Shane very well because we're working on a Broadway musical together that they have written. I am an actor in it. And Robert Horn, who's an incredible writer who wrote for the television show "Designing Women," and won a Tony Award for writing "Tootsie" on Broadway; the three of them have written this incredible show. Over the years of working on this show, I've gotten to know Brandy and Shane very well. When I was about 20 years old, I was really into country music. I wore Wranglers and Ropers to acting school at NYU. That's how Texas I was! Brandy and Shane are responsible for this rebirth of love that I have for country music. Especially the music that they create. And Kacy Musgraves, of course.

GS: Right! Because Kacy has covered a lot of Brandy's songs. KC: Yes, they've all worked together. She is a great champion of the LGBTQIA community. I love country music! My friends had a surprise birthday party for me at Dollywood.



That's How much I love country music [laughs].

GS: When does the show open?

KC: I will say it's not announced yet, but I will tell you this. It could be on Broadway in the spring of 2023. We're actually going to the Pioneer Theater in Salt Lake City. It will run from October 28th to November 12th. The show is called "Shucked." It's directed by Jack O'Brien, theater legend, Tony Award winner who did "Hairspray." It's an exciting, completely original American musical comedy. It's not a jukebox musical. It's not based on any source material from before. I'm really excited about it.

Stewart Taylor Gets the Last Word With New Song About His Real-Life Toxic Relationship





We stayed in a hostel and I'll never forget how right next to our building was a record shop with a massive billboard of Britney Spears promoting her In the Zone album. For so long, Britney and the city of Chicago were one in the same for me!"

These days, Stewart Taylor is making his own hit records. We spoke with him from his home in Los Angeles as he was promoting "Maybe We Shouldn't Talk", his catchy true-to-life pop tune about his true-life struggles in a toxic relationship.

Mike Bahr:In your new song, you open up about your rocky relationship with your ex.
Stewart Taylor: My ex and I fought

over anything and everything: our careers. what his friends thought of me, about trauma, jealousy, other men... He always told me I was too much and too loud, and I rebelled against that because I hate being told what to do or





how to act. The person I'm with should celebrate who I am, not try and make me smaller.

MB: Did you try to work things out in the relationship?

ST: I personally did everything that I could do to try and make that relationship work. I loved that man so much, and I still do. We had great date nights and fun getaway trips to Palm Springs and Las Vegas, but trouble always seemed to find us where ever we

went.

MB: Who was to blame?

ST: We both are to blame. At the end of the day, we were two men with a lot of trauma and his temper and our demons really got the best of us.

MB:Take us back to the beginning. Where did you meet?

ST:We met at a charity event in Hollywood. We simply caught eyes in a crowd, started dancing, and within a minute or two we were making out and leaving together.

MB: Was it love at first sight?

ST: Not exactly. We got in a fight the night we met. How's that for a major red flag?

MB: What did your friends think of



the relationship?

ST: My friends really liked him. He's a hilarious, attractive, likable guy. However, it became apparent very quickly that we weren't exactly great for each other.

MB: When did you know it was time to call it quits?

ST: When he got really drunk and humiliated me in front of a large group of people. He said some pretty terrible things to me.

MB: Did you finally end all communication with him?

ST: I moved out of the apartment. I'd see him around West Hollywood every now and then and I'd say hello. But then he moved to Nashville and I haven't seen him since. During the pandemic, he called me and went on a drunk rant about me and I hung up and immediately started writing "Maybe We

Shouldn't Talk".

MB: Has he heard the song?

ST: He has and he loves it! I've been writing songs about him for some time, so he's gotten used to it. My first cut as a songwriter was a song I wrote about him called "Lie I Tell Myself". A Romanian pop star named Antonia released it in 2020.

MB: He can't be upset that Jake Dean Taylor plays him in the music video!

ST: Not at all. He gets a kick out of someone else playing him in a video and Jake Dean Taylor is gorgeous.

MB: t's a beautiful video!

ST: Thank you! I developed the story from beginning to end. One of the first things I wrote in my notebook was that we had to start off in a desert with our backs to each other and end in a tug of

war. It's magical to see my ideas come to life from paper to screen.

MB: Was that the same python from Britney's "I'm A Slave 4 U" VMA performance?

ST: Funny you should ask that! In between takes on set with the python, the snake handler told me that his father supplied Britney with her python for the VMA performance. It wasn't the same snake but maybe a descendant!

MB: What have you learned about relationships?


ST: I have learned relationships are complex. You can love someone and also realize that they are not the right person for you. It's a delicate unraveling.



Pride Journey: Madison, Wisconsin

A few years ago, I remember reading that Madison, Wisconsin was voted one of the top LGBTQ-friendly destinations in the country. Since I have a propensity to travel to underthe-radar destinations, I decided I wanted to see for myself what made Madison so special and inclusive.


Madison is the capitol of Wisconsin, a swing state in the political world, so it was no surprise that I was greeted with open arms upon arrival. The first thing I noticed was how clean and walkable the city was. It is fairly simple to walk to most attractions if you are staying in the heart of downtown. If the attraction is a bit far, you can rent a bike from the citywide BCycle bike share program.

Start your tour of Madison at the Chazen Museum Of Art located on the University of Wisconsin campus. The free museum houses a collection of over 24,000 works ranging from a painting by Andy Warhol to artifacts from ancient Greece, Western Europe, and Moghul India,

Continue your cultural tour of *Madison at Art + Lit Laboratory*, a community-driven contemporary arts center in the Capitol East District which houses an art gallery and performance space in addition to a library, artist studios, and a dedicated education studio. The facility welcomes over 200 events annually ranging from lectures to contemporary dance classes.

Before heading out for dinner, check in to the AC Hotel Madison Downtown, a beautiful property located a block away from the Capitol Building which officers beautiful 360-degree views of the city from its rooftop patio. The modern AC Lounge is located just off the reception area and features a towering LED sculpture that serves as the centerpiece of the space. Located on the top floor is Eno Vino, the hotel's signature restaurant which features an extensive wine menu consisting of over 200 bottles.

The rooms at AC Hotel Madison are



quite spacious and blend in with the property's minimalist vibe. I had a wonderful view of the Capitol building from my room which was even more breathtaking during sunset.

For dinner, take a short Uber-ride to *Mint Mark*, a produce-forward restaurant operated by James Beard Award nominated Executive Chef Sean Pharr. The relaxed space is welcoming but sophisticated and offers a variety of tapas ranging from a delicious Cauliflower dish consisting of herbs, raisins and crispy sarvecchio to Sorpresine made with ricotta, butternut squash, fermented plum and pecans. If

you like pasta, I'd recommend the Carbonara. It was my favorite item on the menu.

I happened to be in town during GLEAM, an evening light exhibition which takes place at the *Olbrich Botanical Gardens* and features large scale light installations created by local, regional, and international designers. This is a fun activity to go to with a group of friends or just stroll throw on your own. Get there early to beat the crowds.

If you still have energy, head to Woof's, one of the city's LGBTQ bars, located just a short walk from the hotel.



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
The space is owned by the same people who own *D'Vino*, a neighboring Italian restaurant. Woof's offers one of the best happy hours in the city with halfprice drinks from 4-7pm.

Every Wednesday and Saturday, the city welcomes the Dane County Farmers' Market on the Square. Over 150 vendors participate each week, and the market is the largest produceronly farmers' market in the country. All of the items for sale at the market are produced by the vendors themselves. Even

though I didn't purchase anything, it was a great way to start the day. If you have time, book a tour of the Capitol building, an architectural wonder worth visiting which contains the only granite dome in the United States. The building houses both chambers of the Wisconsin legislature along with the Wisconsin Supreme Court and the Office of the Governor. After your tour, grab a bowl of ramen at Morris Ramen, owned by State Representative Francesca Hong.

Next up was a tour of the *Henry Vilas Zoo*, one of only a few admission-free, community-supported zoos in the country. The zoo just welcomed a baby orangutan, and I had the chance to see it along with its mother in the primate habitat. If you have time, take one of the behind-the-scenes tours offered at the zoo. I decided to jump on the African Adventure Behind the Scenes Tour where I got to meet and feed the zoo's beautiful, reticulated giraffe Eddie. You really don't appreciate how tall these animals are until you are standing a few feet away.

Also, part of the tour was a visit with their white rhino named Harmon. Unfortunately, Harmon was basking in the sun during my visit and didn't want any of the treats we brought for him. After a few minutes of trying to seduce



Harmon with food, we decided to let him relax and soak up the rays.

Next, head to Monona Terrace Community and Convention Center, a Frank Lloyd Wright designed building located on the shore of Lake Monona. Wright designed the building decades before it was built. He fought with the city multiple times to try to get them to agree to build the facility and sadly he didn't get to see his wonder come to fruition. The Monona Terrace finally won city-wide approval after Wright's death and now serves as a tribute to his contribution to Madison.

Touring around Madison will surely make you hungry, so try out Heritage Tavern. The farm-to-table restaurant is operated by chef/owner Dan Fox, a James Beard Award-winner. It was one of my top 10 dining experiences ever. I began my meal with a new addition to the menu, a sweet corn chowder served with popcorn of course. I was in awe of how delicious this soup was and felt bad not finishing the bowl as I had to save room for some other selections including the chef's upscale take on deviled eggs. I can't even explain what was on them, all I can say it you must try these. You won't be disappointed. For my entrée I ordered the Bouillabaisse served with an assortment of fish, fingerling potatoes and roasted fennel bathing in a saffron

tomato broth with garlic sabayon.

I really wanted to walk off my food coma, but I had tickets to the Madison Ballet's production of "Next Steps", a program built entirely of world premieres, and featuring the work of Artistic Director Ja' Malik and Richard Walters. The ballet is committed to celebrating female-identifying choreographers and showcases San Francisco-based Marika Brussel.

After the ballet, head to one of the city's other LGBTQ-establishments including *Shamrock Bar & Grille* or *Sotto Nightclub* for a nightcap.

Before heading home, grab breakfast at Short Stack Eatery, an LGBTQ-owned restaurant located close to campus which offers a selection of favorites including of course, pancakes. I decided to try the sweet potato pancakes which were served with fresh strawberries. The oversized portion could have fed two people and was so delicious. And even though I didn't have one, I heard they also make a killer Bloody Mary.

One other thing that stood out during my trip to Madison was how friendly the people are. Everyone greets you with a smile. There is nothing like Midwest hospitality.



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

"Heart" to heart: An interview with Nora O'Connor

Nora O'Connor just might be the hardest working woman in music. For years, the Evanston-based singer/ songwriter has earned a reputation as a go-to backing vocalist and musician. She's toured and recorded regularly with Neko Case, Mavis Staples, The Decemberists, Andrew Bird, Kelly Hogan, and many others. With Hogan, O'Connor is also a member of the Chicago-based band The Flat Five. Additionally, O'Connor has also made time to release three solo albums, with the latest being the just released "My Heart" (Pravda Records). Well worth the wait (her previous solo effort was released in 2004), "My Heart" is a delight from start to finish. Nora was gracious enough to make time for an interview during the autumn of 2022. [Nora O'Connor plays an album release show on October 22 at SPACE in Evanston.]

Gregg Shapiro: There are 18 years

between your previous solo album "Til The Dawn" and your new album "My Heart." Were the songs on the new record written over the course of those years, or were they written in one burst more recently, specifically for this record? Nora O'Connor: They're new. They're all new. It's funny, when people say, "Why has it taken you 18 years?" It's not like I haven't been doing anything [laughs]. Winter of 2019, I wrote a couple songs. I was just coming off a tour with The Decemberists, and The Flat Five had just made a couple records. It seemed like I had the time and the openness and the space to dig up and see what was happening, and the willingness to give it a go. Then COVID happened, which completely wiped out my calendar, like everybody else's. I started doing these outside backyard shows, late summer of 2020. It was just 20 people. We all still have our masks on, but we're outside and we're spread out, and we're only going to do this for two hours. Back then, there was nothing going on. There was no eating out, there was no visiting, there was nothing. This was it, this was our little thing, and it was magical. It was wonderful, in a way, all things

considered. Because we were doing something and it was like, "Oh my God, I'm having a show!" People were like, "Oh my God, I'm actually at a show," even though there were just 20 of us in a friend's backyard. It just hit me, I want more new original music in this solo setting, when I'm playing by myself. I love singing covers, and I know a million songs. With singing covers, I just love turning people on to songs they've never heard. I try to dig a little deeper with my set list. Finding a deep Harry Nilsson or a deep Joni Mitchell or Ron Sexsmith (track). Whatever cover I decide I want to do or songs that my friends write, all these different people that I love their songwriting. I started writing more in 2020. My whole family was home. My husband was teaching. My kids were having school. I found a corner of my basement, built a little studio, and then started doing home recordings. Then I was like. "Yeah. it's time. let's do this. let's make a record." It felt so right. I hadn't the desire or those feeling, the way I had them in the last year. It's like, "Nora, just trust yourself! Let's go! It's OK that you're not The Decemberists or you're not Neko Case or you're not Kelly Hogan or you're not Andrew Bird, or all these people that you tour with." Maybe that was intimidating for me. Touring with all these bands that were so fucking amazing. I can't write a song like that [laughs]. I can only do what I can do. I think I just gave myself a break and let myself have the experience of that journey of creating a record.

GS: As you said, you've been far from sitting idle during the years between albums. In addition to raising your family, you've been performing with Neko Case, Mavis Staples, The Decemberists, and others, as well as performing as a guest vocalist on albums by other artists. Did you come from a large family and that is what makes you so good at playing well with others, or were you an only child who craves being around other people?

NO: I am the youngest of four, but we also adopted two of my cousins, so

there was six of us. My parents are



amazing. They were busy, so I had to entertain myself. I guess along the way I realized that singing harmony was really my iam. I do that best. I put myself in that position to be that person that's hired to sing harmony. I'm a good administrative assistant of a song. I'm a good rhythm guitar player or auxiliary whatever. A little mandolin, a little banjo, a little keyboard; whatever the song needs to lift it. I like that role. I don't love being in the middle of the stage and having to do all the talking. I think I'm a little more of an introvert, but I still want to perform, and I still want to do all these things. I think I also want to challenge myself and do some hard things, too. This is why I'm doing

GS: You mentioned The Flat Five, and during the albums' interim, you also performed shows and recorded two albums as one-fifth of that group. What did you like best about that experience?

NO: Because we're such a democracy. We all come to the band with a really special and necessary gift. We work really well together. It's this little special, sacred thing. We don't want to be famous. We don't really want to go on tour and tour our asses off because we're doing all these other things. The Flat Five is our sacred place where it's all about the music and we try to play as best we can, sing as pretty as we can. When I'm doing a gig with The Flat Five, I feel like I'm watching my favorite band. Even though I'm standing on stage right next to them. I'm like, "Holy shit, that's Kelly Hogan! Holy crap, that's Scott Ligon playing, he's my favorite musician in the whole wide world." The Flat Five just haven't made that our number one thing. Even though it is our favorite thing, it's not our number one job. We do all these other things. We had a zoom meeting last night because we really miss each

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
other. Kelly's been touring with Mavis (Staples). I've been touring with Neko, Scott and Casey (McDonough) are touring with NRBQ, and Alex (Hall) is touring with JD McPherson. We're all doing these really great things, but we're all like, "Damn, I miss you guys." When there's a pocket, when things slow down, that's when we'll book some shows, try to make some money, and then make a record, but I don't know when that's gonna happen.

GS: One of my favorite songs on "My Heart" is "Cambridge Cold." I went to Emerson College in Boston, and I really loved hearing you sing about Inman Square and the fabulous Central Square music venue The Middle East. Because you live in Evanston, I was wondering, is it just me, or does Cambridge feel like the Boston-area version of Evanston?

NO: I think that's a really good point. Yes, I think it does. I'd rather drive around Evanston than drive around Chicago, because it's just so much crazier, and I'd rather go do something in Cambridge than do something in Boston. So, yeah, I guess it's kind of similar. But that's a completely made-up story. I didn't move to Cambridge, so it's really just a story. But what is true about it is that when I was in (the band) The Blacks in the late '90s, we got to play at the Middle East upstairs then we got played the Middle East downstairs. I really did have that feeling like, "Oh yeah, we're doing this, baby! It's on, we've made it, we've arrived." I've never left Chicago. I've lived here my whole entire life, so it's almost like a little fantasy of this is probably what would happen if I moved away. I'd probably just go for a year and do some things and come back. I like that notion of moving out east.

GS: The "heart" at the center of the "My Heart" album sounds like it's been broken, especially on the title cut, "Sore," "Follow Me," and "Fare Thee Well." Can you please say something about the heartbreak there?

NO: I think I'm prone to writing break-up songs. I think I'm prone to listening to break-up songs. What's different, I feel, is I'm just a little more in touch with the heartbreak that I've had. It's not irrational anymore. It's almost like I respect it and cherish it, and it's because of my experiences that I am who I am today. It's all good things. It's not like a victim, like "Oh, you broke my heart." It's more noticing and observing my feelings and not letting that destroy



me. I don't know how to explain it. I feel like I've been through so many transformations over the last few years and digging deep spiritually and trying to have a lot more gratitude in my life than I've ever had before.

GS: My mind works in seeing patterns. Even if there's just two things, that's a pattern. For example, you performed a cover of Stevie Nicks' "That's Alright" on 2004's "Til The Dawn," and you cover Margo Guryan's "It's Alright Now" on "My Heart." Am I reading too much into that or am I on the (al)right track? NO: [Laughs] everything's going to be all right! I just love a healthy break-up song. Margo's is a little creepier. She's really saying, "it's all right, we're done." Stevie Nicks is saying, "It's OK, we're done, you go on and have a good life." I think when look back on the craziness of my younger years and of my relationships and how there was just so much drama and everything was such a big fucking deal. I just like this idea of. "This isn't working out, and we're grownups, so let's respect each other and move on. I love a healthy break-up song.

GS: One of the nicest surprises on "My Heart" is the "Winwoof"


instrumental. What can you tell the readers about that song?

NO: I wanted an instrumental. I wanted to write an instrumental, but I didn't know what it was. I had this chord progression. In my mind, it's about this mystical creature, nature/ Mother Nature, invisible/visible creature like a wolf or a "winwoof." It's a madeup word. So, that's my story about the "winwoof." But the other story is I really meant to type Winwood (as in Steve) because it sounded like a Traffic song [big laugh], but I wrote Winwoof instead, and then I made up the story about the mystical creature. But I had this chord progression that I thought was sort of like Stevie Winwood, kind of Traffic. I had Scott, Casey, and Alex in the studio, I said "I've got this chord progression. While I have you guys, let's record some basic tracks." The four of us just played it in the studio live, and then I sat with it. I was like, "OK, this is my instrumental!" Then I added a harmonium. But it's one of those songs that I think I will revisit and add words to for another record. I'm introducing this concept with this instrumental that I think is going to be a bigger story later on.

GS: Your 1996 debut album

"Cerulean Blue" featured the song "Lipstick Lesbian," as well as the song "Tommy Cheddar," about your gay best friend Thomas Dunning. Additionally, you've worked with The Aluminum Group, which is led by gaybrothers John and Frank Navin. Would you mind saying a few words about what the queer folks in your life mean to you?

NO: Everything! Thomas and I have been friends forever. I'm just an advocate. I want to stand next to you guys all the time and be there however I can show up as an ally to my queer community. I was thinking about "Lipstick Lesbian." I wonder how that aged. I don't sing it anymore. It's autobiographical. I mean I consider myself... I don't know what I am. I don't really identify as hetero, but I don't really know what I am. Like somewhere on the hetero/queer plane. I am definitely on the spectrum of all the things. I like all sorts of people. I'm married (to a man) for 20 years. I'm really excited about this younger generation. My kids, it just rolls off their tongue. They don't get confused about pronouns. It doesn't matter. They get it. I'm just trying to latch onto my own kids and learn from them. I get excited about younger artists, non-binary queer women. I feel like when I was coming up, people were saying, "You can't do that." I don't feel like anybody's saying that to them. What would that feel like if I grew up and nobody said you can't do that? How would I be different? How many more records would I have made?

Mike began. "So, Holly, you are one of our few friends who've been married twice, I believe - so I don't need to tell you that marriage can have its 'rocky' aspects. In my job as a Christian pastor, I have counseled many married

couples who have run into... 'impassible roadblocks' in their marriages, so much so that the marriage did not survive.' He took a deep breath, then went on. "The fact is, Dave and I have hit just such a barrier." I had to interrupt. "Wait! I can't believe what I'm hearing! I thought you two were the perfect couple. What could possibly be so important that it could come between you, right at this moment when you're about to adopt!" I couldn't go on. My throat was choked with emotion. "NO!" Dave yelled out. "It's not us!

We're not the problem!" He jumped up and took a seat on the couch next to Mike, where he reached around to give him a supportive hug. "It's not Mike and I," he explained, "who need 'marriage counseling.' It's all us LGBs who need to smooth out some 'rough spots' and 'issues' with you Ts in the room. Let me tell you what's happening - which is no joke, I assure you!

"You know, Holly, that I am the unofficial faculty advisor of the LGBT kids at the high school. I have them in my class, where we pursue a curriculum as if they were Roman-era soldiers reading the immortal, ancient Roman and Greek historians, statesmen and philosophers. The students camp out in tents in the field behind the school, and every year we build a Roman siege weapon or war chariot. It's a course of study that

produces self-reliant, self-confident young men - and a few women who learn the importance of teamwork, loyalty and trustworthiness. My graduates are well prepared to succeed in life, no matter what job or profession they choose.

"But recently, things started to change. The new students I have wanted to induct as novice 'Legionnaires' have become less and less willing to accept the requirements of our camp. As you know, I strictly limit how much time they are allowed with their iPhones and internet. They have only a few minutes a day on social media, and we don't spend any time at all on video games. In my opinion, if anyone wants to live the life of a 'warrior,' then instead of some FPS game, I teach them how to use a Roman gladius, shield and war

"My students don't play at being



'social justice warriors,' where they might be tempted to spend their time posting snarky comments in an attempt to 'cancel' someone who used the wrong word. No. They learn how to aim a trebuchet and hit an enemy at 100 yards with a flaming projectile! My students learn to speak plainly, honestly and without fraudulent intent. I teach them that the mark of a man is his refusal to speak lies or empty bullshit. His integrity and self-respect depend on it." Dave fell silent, certain he had read out his own judgment. Mike picked up where Dave could not go on. "Anyway, yesterday Dave was talking to a couple of prospective new students for next year's incoming class of Legionnaires. One of the youngsters introduced himself, then went on to say 'and my pronouns are they/them.' Well, Dave told him he could be 'he/ him' if he's male, or 'she/her' if she's female or transgender, but he couldn't accept any person who claims to be 'they/them' in the class. "So, this morning we found out that student went to the school

administration and filed a complaint against Dave for 'Sex Discrimination.' It's some 'gender warrior' who wants to start a war between the LGBs and the Ts, and Dave is caught in the

middle!
