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GRAB JULIO



Julio Torres makes it easy to love "Problemista":

It should come as no surprise that gay writer and actor Julio Torres' film directorial debut "Problemista" (A24) would not only be quirky and original but also deeply moving, while subtly making a political statement. After all. Torres is the same person behind some of the most unforgettable SNL sketches of the last 10 years, including "Wells for Boys" (which is a favorite of Stephen Colbert's). Additionally, his HBO projects, the special "My Favorite Shapes" and the series "Los Espookys" have garnered Torres raves and a sizeable audience. And who can forget his brief but memorable performance as Jules in "Together Together." With "Problemista," in which he plays struggling toy designer Alejandro, alongside Tilda Swinton, RZA, James Scully, and Isabella Rossellini, among others, he has given viewers the most delightful movie of the season. I had the pleasure of speaking with Julio while he was in Miami Beach.

Gregg Shapiro: The release of

"Problemista" was delayed due to the SAG-AFTRA strike. What does it mean to you that your movie can finally reach its audience?

Julio Torres: It's huge! I didn't really mourn the push at all. Anyone who's made a movie knows how long it takes. To me, personally, it was neither here nor there when it was going to come out, so long as it came out one day. I'm happy that the time is now and that it gets to be not compromised or not subverting any greater effort. Yeah, I'm happy.

GS: "Problemista" features narration and humorous commentary by Isabella Rosellini. What made her the right voice for that role?

JT: Think that it's because she is one of those voices that just echoes in my head and has been in my head for so long. I think the same is true of so many queer people. "And now a warning," from "Death Becomes Her," or "Blue Velvet."

GS: "Marcel the Shell."JT: Yes, "Marcel the Shell," very

recently.

GS: And the one where she voices the hamster.

JT: Oh, yes! Stephen Dunn's "Closet Monster." Yes, she voices a hamster in that, you're right.

GS: She has a great voice.

JT: Yes, she has a fantastic voice. It just felt like a voice that was commanding, yet fairytale-like, that provokes respect and awe at the same time.

GS: Tilda Swinton is alternately hilarious and terrifying as Elizabeth. Was that part written with her in mind, if not, what was involved in casting her for that part?

JT: I did not have anyone in mind when I was writing it. I love writing for people that I know, but I didn't know anyone personally that could play her. I didn't know Tilda. Sometimes I would think of an actress, and then I would be like, "Well, I don't know these people. Why would they ever be in this?" I




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didn't want to paint myself into a corner. No. I didn't write with her in mind even though I was such a colossal fan of hers for so long. Then the script got to her and she was familiar with "Los Espookys" and the "Му Favorite Shapes" special on

she was excited to work with me on something. It was just such a dream come true.

GS: Alejandro has this beautiful and supportive relationship with his mother Dolores (Catalina Saavedra). Do or did you have something similar with your mother?

JT: I do, yeah! It's very based on my relationship with my mother. It's a bit of a thank you card to her.

GS: Has she seen the movie, and if so, what does she think of it?

JT: Yes! She doesn't speak English, but she's a very visually driven person. She really loved it!

GS: A couple of things that stood out to me are Alejandro's cowlick and his distinctive gait. Please say something about those characteristics.

JT: The hair is something that my hair does every now and then.

GS: Lucky you!

JT: [Laughs] That I have that luxury [laughs]? It's also something that my father's hair does a lot. I felt like I was paying tribute to that. It also communicates that he's not on top of it. Then his walk just came about as soon as I put on the backpack. I like to think of him as a little explorer, like a little alien explorer collecting data.

GS: Please tell the readers about your decision to have Craigslist personified as a character, played by Larry Owens in "Problemista."

JT: The incredible Larry Owens. That was a crucial decision that really opened the door to the rest of the movie. At first, I was writing or attempting to write a sort of a barebones, slice-of-life version of this movie. I was just so bored by it. I was so disinterested in it, and then suddenly I was like, "What if Craigslist was a person?" That unlocked the tone and style of the movie. It was one of the first pieces that came to me.

GS: "Problemista" is timely in the way that it is also an immigration story.

JT: People keep referring to it as timely, but I feel like this is a subject that's always happening because it's never fixed. The problem gets a different face. People say it's timely, but I say when hasn't it been timely in recent history? I feel like the anguish of feeling trapped in a system that has your fate in its hands, a system that has no face and makes no sense, it's something that feels very relatable to people. It's something that I think that people now experience regardless of whether they're immigrants or not. I've had people connect with it because they dealing with an

insurance nightmare or bureaucracy or they're in a crazy amount of debt and they're trying to find their way out of that. Immigration happens to be the card that I was dealt, but I think we all share this common frustration for these systems that we are constantly told to just keep our heads down, work really hard, and to overcome them. Even though this story is partially about someone who does that, it's also, I think, a story about someone who questions that well.

GS: I think the queer community can connect to it, too because our lives feel increasingly tenous, especially with Alito and Thomas on the Supreme Court, who want to take away our rights.

JT: Yes, that feeling like you're building a house of cards.

GS: Your boyfriend James Scully plays Bingham, a character who is sort of Alejandro's nemesis.

JT: It's interesting because, yes, I agree with you, but I feel like some people misread it and see it as like a crush or something.

GS: I didn't see it that way at all. What was it like to work with James onscreen?

JT: It wasn't written for him. It was already written by the time I met him. I love working in community. All the people in the movie are either really

old friends or new friends. I think that that is just the type of director that I am. So it really felt very organic and very joyful. My parents have been working together their whole professional lives. They are very much the kind of couple who have blueprints in bed.

GS: So, work never stops? JT: Work never stops, and I think that creating is a love language for me. Extending that to people that I love is is sort of a no-brainer

GS: The final act of the movie takes place 322 years in the future. How did you decide on that specific number?

JT: I think that's one of those numbers where it's like, "Julio, just give us a number!" And I just texted the number. I think because it feels arbitrary.

GS: But also specific -- 3-2-2. *JT:* Yes, and it's enough time for it to be extremely disorienting, but not enough time to assume that humanity is completely gone



[laughs]. We're still out there somewhere or another. But (for the scene) I purposely found a space that had no windows.

GS: Thank you for not killing us off.

JT: [Laughs]

GS: Have you started thinking about or working on your next creative project?

JT: Oh, my God, I have started daydreaming of getting the time to work on the next project. I do have a couple of seeds of ideas that I hope to get to.



Absolute "Beginners": An interview with gay filmmaker Goran Stolevski

The year 2023 was an exceptional one for gay filmmakers. Ira Sachs' "Passengers" and Andrew Haigh's "All Of Us Strangers" were wellreceived by audiences and critics alike and could also be found on numerous end-of-the-year "best of" lists. With "Housekeeping for Beginners" (Focus), gay filmmaker Goran Stolevski didn't keep us waiting long for the follow-up to his brilliant "Of An Age," which opened domestically in early 2023. In the same way Stolevski made us laugh and cry (sometimes simultaneously) in "Of An Age," he achieves the same emotional tug-of-war in "Housekeeping for Beginners." Suada (Alina Serban), a mother of two daughters - Vanesa (Mia Mustafi) and Mia (Dzada Selim) - by different, absent fathers, is in endstage pancreatic cancer. Her partner Dita (Anamaria Marinca), the more responsible one in the relationship is suddenly faced with the task of raising a teenager and a kindergartener. Add to that the fact that Dita's house has become something of a crash pad for outcasts, as well as her gay male housemate Toni (Vladimir Tintor), and his younger lover Ali (Samson Selim), and you can feel the powder keg of her life getting ready to blow. "Housekeeping for Beginners" is an amazing achievement, and it's all due to Stolevski's talents as a writer/ director. Goran was kind enough to make time for an interview before the film's release.

Gregg Shapiro: What was the inspiration for your "Housekeeping for Beginners" screenplay? Goran Stolevski: The first moment the idea came to me is when I saw a photograph a friend had posted online from his life, from when he first moved to Melbourne with his boyfriend in the 1970s. They moved

into a house with eight gay women. It was just a random snapshot from their day-to-day life at the time. I remember seeing it and going, "I love this energy, this context." A kind of cocoon of queerness. I wanted to live within it, essentially, come up with a story that takes me there. I wanted it to be present tense. That story doesn't quite make sense in Australia anymore. But most of the world isn't like Australia or like America or like the developed west. As much as Macedonia might seem exotic onscreen, in this context this is closer to what day-to-day life feels like for queer people in most of the world. I feel like a lot of these stories don't get documented.

GS: One of the things that stands out about "Housekeeping for Beginners" is the way that dialogue and the absence of dialogue have equal weight. For example, early in the movie, there is a dinner table scene in which multiple characters discuss a variety of socio-political topics. Later, following the scene in which Suada, who has pancreatic cancer, tells her daughters Mia and Vanesa to call her lover Dita



assume), emotions and responses are communicated without dialogue.

GS: It's also in my older work, and I realized that it didn't happen by design. It just happened organically in "You Won't Be Alone" and especially in "Of An Age." Dialogue is very important to me. I grew up on a lot of '30s and '40s Hollywood screwball comedies. The dialogue used to be so snappy and perfect. I think that's difficult to find these days. I think it's important to aim for the highest that you possibly can. I do love dialogue. But what I realized in making these films is that quite often, the most important lines of dialogue are entirely unspoken. They happen in the eyes. The actors and characters speak to each other silently; I look for those moments. Sometimes they happen in a way that's unexpected. I often encourage my actors to improvise or rephrase things in a way that feels comfortable for them, feels real for them. I'm not a stickler about these things. Also, when you say improvisation, most people think of dialogue. But improvisation can just



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be a glance or a gesture or someone taking someone's hand and looking at it. Those moments, to me, contain a whole story or put a frame around it that feels very whole and profound. I'm always looking for them. Sometimes an entire scene of dialogue that I love ends up deleted [laughs] because something's happened along the way that is so much more elegant and eloquent and silent that gives me the emotional detail that I'm looking for which makes the dialogue redundant. I'm grateful when I find them.

GS: As the screenwriter, is there a special significance to Suada having two daughters, as opposed to a daughter and a son, or two sons?

GS: Not theoretically. It's quite common that I do end up writing more female characters than male ones in my work. I feel like if you took out my brain cells and analyzed them somehow scientifically in the future, most of them would match that of a girl [laughs]. Even when I was little. I remember in fourth grade, my class of 36 (children) had to be stopped because there was a crisis. Goran's been hanging out with girls for an hour. Everyone had to stop and make sense of this. Why is it happening? It has to stop! It's not an objective, analytical thing. I just connect with girls and women a lot more than I appear to on the outside [laughs]. The only creative work I trust is the stuff that comes instinctively. Not the stuff where I'm trying to make a statement.

GS: Following Suada's death, her widow Dita, who does welfare work, is talking to a co-worker who expresses her condolences for the death of Dita's "cousin," because she obviously can't be out at work. Is that what you were referring to earlier, when you talked about the rest of the world, and how difficult it is to be out in many other places?

GS: Yes. Even if there were legal rights in place to protect queer people in these countries, it barely makes a difference when the legal and social systems don't function. You can have anti-discrimination policies, but discrimination will still exist. You need to hope for a



policeman or a judge to somehow be the kind of person who follows rules rather follows their own prejudices. Most of them will follow the prejudices, and the bribes [laughs]. It's not like that makes Macedonia chaotic or strange to most of the world. That is, genuinely, most of the world. I saw a list where the world's 190 countries got ranked based on GDP, and Macedonia was dead set in the middle. It was like at number 90. This is the average in the world, it's not the exception. In order to function in a workplace and not be seen as something dirty, especially if you're a welfare worker and you have to be around children, she cannot be openly gay anywhere, but especially at work. Even in making this film, one of the most complicated things that we had to be very careful with, even during auditions and finding locations, was how do you introduce the idea that you're making a film that has homosexuals and children in it. Because those two things are not allowed to be around each other. Again, this is not an exception to the rule, this is most of the world. That scene is a reflection of daily, normal

GS: You mentioned old movies, and I was thinking about how actor and comedian W.C. Fields was known for his dislike of children, and he had a famous quote about never working with children. So, what was the experience of working with Dzada Selim, who played Mia, like for

vou?

GS: The little girl, the five-year-old. I remember we set up a quick shoot of what turned out to be the opening scene of the film, in the end, just as practice, with a crew, to get used to my methods of working on set, for like an hour, before we started shooting the film properly. The three people on-screen in that scene had never been on set before, and I wanted to introduce them gradually, with no sense of pressure. We had to do things in a correct way. It was about us adjusting to their comfort, and also for me to try to figure out how the hell does one direct a fiveyear-old. The lesson was that one doesn't direct her, she gets to direct you, and you should be grateful and shut up [laughs]. Especially because Dzada speaks two languages fluently, and a little bit of English on top of that. And she's five! She's not a kid from a privileged background, so this is a brain that has caught on to so much. The other thing is, you don't want to manipulate a child and don't get a chance to with Dzada. She's in charge. She's too smart. She's on to you at every point. Every single day we had to create this environment on-set where she was going to enjoy whatever she was doing. There aren't actually child labor laws in Macedonia, which is problematic on many levels. Luckily. Dzada comes with her own child labors which are she'll give you six minutes and then she's going to go play with her dolls. And then her double takes over [laughs]. The way she approached it was like role-



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playing, and then she was commenting on things that were going on. Every day felt wonderful, but then the next day we were like, how are we going to get through this? Because every day had to be different.

GS: Throughout "Housekeeping for Beginners," I kept finding myself drawn to Ali, Dita, and Vanesa, who come across as the most sympathetic characters. I know you created all of them, but would you agree with the three I named, that they're sort of the heart of the movie?

GS: Ultimately, at its core, it's about a mom, a dad, and a child. Dita is dad, Ali is mom, and Vanesa is the child. That was apparent to me at script level, but also in the shooting of it. A lot of this story is my brain split between two women, and that's Dita and Vanesa, quite frankly. There are a lot of emotional notes from my own life that are transposed in it, although it's not an autobiographical film. There's a reason that the final image of the film is Vanesa in the end. That part wasn't written, that sequence, but it was in the prepping of it that I was like, this is the key to my story. This is where my heart lies. I'm especially drawn to people who are complicated, and even a little bit abrasive. I don't like idealized, traditionally loveable characters. The ones that make sense to me, that I connect to, are people like Vanesa. Then, Ali, you can't help but love, even me. Dita is the rest of my brain, transposed through (actor) Anamaria Marinca, who usually gets to play me onscreen, quite often [laughs].

GS: What do you think the denizens of Shutka would think of the way it is portrayed in "Housekeeping for Beginners"? GS: Obviously, they need to answer that more than I do. But I think they're happy with it because there's a range of people and experiences. I teared up in Venice (at the Venice International Film Festival in 2023). When we first enter Shutka itself, onscreen, a lot of the actors in the

film live there, and they were there,

watching the film. The look and the gasps that came from them when they saw it was just so profoundly moving. Shutka's been depicted in little documentaries and other films within the region, before. A lot of the time it's very exoticized and it doesn't feel like real life. Whereas I wanted it to feel like what everyday life feels like. And in a lot of the locations we shot in, we were vaguely controlling traffic, but it's impossible to do in that place. It's just real life going on around it. It's a

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gift to me, as a filmmaker, that I get to capture this, and that I had actors who were happy to work in this kind of way that isn't very controlled, that is like an unfolding situation in real-time. I hope the reactions continue to be as they've been so far.

GS: "Housekeeping for Beginners" is your third film after "You Are Not Alone" and "Of An Age," both of which are certified fresh on Rotten Tomatoes, while "Housekeeping for Beginners" is currently at 100% on the site. What does that kind of response mean to you?

GS: To me, a critic is a viewer, first and foremost. Ideally, not always, looking at your work very closely.

That means that someone is coming at your story so openly that the depths of them are available to you when they're watching it. It's someone you would hope loves cinema in the same way that I do. I wanted to be a movie critic before becoming a filmmaker [laughs]. I was a film nerd, first. I discovered movies through reading reviews. A friend of mine sent me a link that one of my favorite critics just put "Housekeeping for Beginners" in his top 10. To me, top 10s mean so

much more to me than the Oscars [laughs]. The Oscars are also important to me. I don't love that sense of being reduced to a number. I think that's really confronting and sometimes can be misleading, as well. That's how life is today. I don't think it's limited to film criticism or movies in general. It's still early days, there's not that many reviews, so I don't want to get too carried away. I hope it continues for this film. Ultimately, you want people to find your film. Films like this don't exist without critics championing them. I don't have the budget of "Barbie" [laughs] to advertise myself. Without critics and festivals, I don't get to make films.

GS: Have you started working on or thinking about your next film project?

GS: The next two films are a little bit more expensive, so they're trickier to finance. Not a

lot more, but slightly. I'm told to be optimistic, but I don't believe anything until I'm on set [laughs]. I'm told to expect to be shooting in the middle of this year. I don't want to talk about the details of those until I know they're going to be something that's real. I'm also writing something at the moment; and talking to an actor that I love who's very generous and expressed interest in working with me. That's kind of what's keeping my brain occupied. I have the kind of brain that starts eating away at itself unless it's got something bigger to lose itself in. Right now, that screenplay is serving that purpose until I get the budget to shoot

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
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JONNY MCGOVERN IS GAY AF As the host of Hey Qween! and his dishy new podcast show

We spoke with Jonny McGovern from his home in LA.

Larry Olsen: What is like to be gay AF in Hollywood today? Jonny McGovern: There's never been a better time to be gay AF!

L.O: Gay comedians are hot right now! There's Fortune Feimster, Matteo Lane, Tig Notaro, Bob the Drag Queen... the list goes on and

JM: Yes, it's great. I think apps like TikTok have really helped make this possible. The take a lot of the gatekeeping away. LO: Were you always gay AF? JM: I may have tried to hide it in my younger years, but when I stopped trying to be what society told me was proper and started fully expressing my true self is when I started to make a name for myself.

LO: What inspired you to launch your new podcast, Jonny McGovern is Gay AF?

JM: I started podcasting in 2006 and my podcast audience has been my

most devoted audience. I have people that have been riding with me for almost twenty years and that's really special.

LO: Gay Pimpin' was a real pioneer in LGBTQ podcasting! JM: We were the first gay show to crack the top 10 of iTunes podcasts.

LO:How is Jonny McGovern is Gay AF different from Gay Pimpin '?

JM: Spiritually, they are both from the same place.. Format wise, they are different. Gay Pimpin' was a snapshot of my life at the time with a very large group of friends on the mic with me. Gay AF is more intimate. It's created to be like you, as the listener, are sitting down with me one on one to gossip, throw shade, kiki about which OnlyFans accounts are good and which are not worth our coins. We break down the stories of the day and deep dive into DL gay celebrity scandals and blind items.

LO: Where do you find the topics? JM: I keep a list of everything that I see that stands out as "of homosexual interest" on social media, in magazines, movies, TV, and music. From diva rap battles like Nicki vs. Megan to the gay couple airport meltdown to Diddy's alleged gay sex parties; no topic is off limits!

LO: How did your podcast shows prepare you for Hey Qween!?

JM: I was working in nightlife while recording The Gay Pimpin' shows and I spent a lot of time with drag queens and ballroom legends. It was a natural evolution to make Hey Qween! a place where queens share their journeys.

LO: Congratulations on the show moving to Wow Presents Plus!



Land of Lincoln: Your Visit to **Historic Springfield, Illinois**

The central Illinois town of Springfield is not only the state capitol, but also the home of Abraham Lincoln, one of America's greatest presidents. Lincoln's legacy is everywhere including the National Park Service run village just south of downtown. The downtown area is very walkable and full of signs describing details about the history and role the 16th President played in the city.

WHAT TO DO

Mr. Lincoln's neighborhood (aka Lincoln Home National Historic Site) is a National Park Service run tribute to the late President. The pedestrian only area highlights the famous homes of Mr. Lincoln and others. NPS also runs a film on the history of President Lincoln. You will find it at 426 S. 7th Avenue. There is no admission charge. Try and schedule a free tour if you can. Some fun facts about Lincoln and the Lincoln Home in Springfield from the National Park

Service brochure:

- Abraham Lincoln was born February 12, 1809. He died April 15,
- Abraham Lincoln was 6 feet, 4 inches tall.
- The first time Abraham Lincoln ran for public office, he lost. He finished eighth of thirteen candidates.
- Before becoming president, Abraham Lincoln held the following political offices: Seat in the Illinois State House of Representatives (1834, 1836, 1838, and 1840) and Seat in the U.S. House of Representatives (1846)
- Lincoln was to participate in a duel with James Shields on September 22, 1842, until it was called off at the last minute by friends on both sides.
- · Lincoln did not receive the nickname "Rail Splitter" until the Illinois Republican Convention held in Decatur on May 9-10, 1860.

The Lincoln Home


- •The Lincoln Home was built in 1839 for Reverend Charles Dresser, who later married Abraham and Mary Lincoln, then a few years later, sold them the house. It was a one-and-ahalf cottage at the time. The Lincolns paid \$1500 for the house. Other details:
- The Lincoln Home has almost burned down two times since its construction in 1839. The first fire occurred over the Christmas holiday of 1854/1855. This fire may have encouraged the Lincolns to add the full second floor. The second fire was the result of a lightning strike, which burned the roof near the north chimney.
- The first telephone was installed in the Lincoln Home between 1878 and 1879.
 - · Electricity was first used to light the home in 1899.

GETTING THERE

Springfield is served by rail from both Chicago and St. Louis as well as a train that goes south to Texas on the Texas Eagle which features a dome car. The trains in Illinois now operate at 100 mph + and service is frequent. The station is right downtown. Book your trip at www.amtrak.com.

Springfield is just 2-3 hours south of Chicago and just ninety miles north of St. Louis.

Flying is an option right into Springfield or you can fly to St. Louis and drive up.

WHERE TO STAY

I stayed at the Carpenter Street Hotel (525 N. 6th Street) Inn just north of downtown. It's basic and affordable and walkable to the attractions. They even offered me a lower rate than the one I booked at when I checked in - unheard of in the industry. It's near a nice locally owned grocery store, County Market (210 E. Carpenter), which has food to go and a great salad bar. Work out at the nearby new YMCA that sells day passes until 4 p.m. Check your bill, though. They charged me three nights instead of two and also charged the incorrect rate the second night. (Yes, I got it corrected.) Also, they charge the full amount at check in (not at check out like most hotels).

Other options are available but check the Trip Advisor reviews of them before booking. Especially the Wyndham (the white circular high rise downtown) as well as the property across the street which both get dubious reviews. The only other hotel I recommend downtown is the State House Inn. There are other hotels east of downtown along the freeway. I have stayed at the Crowne Point but get a room not facing the freeway (I-55).

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Disinherited from an Estate Plan

The following are five factors that I've seen that lead to people being disinherited from a relative's or friend's estate plan. Knowing these factors will hopefully help ensure that you will avoid being disinherited:

1) Never Call or Visit. This is far and away the most significant factor that leads to disinheritance. It should be so obvious that it goes without saying. Unfortunately it's not. I've seen countless scenarios where children or other relatives expect that they can go years without visiting a relative, or months without calling a parent, and still expect to be provided for in their estate plan.

2) Threaten Not To Visit. Many relatives subtly threaten or pressure other relatives in various ways, including by extremely subtle insinuations that they're "too busy to visit" unless XYZ occurs. The problem arises in two scenarios: first, where subtle threats are successful and they embolden the threatener until the parent reaches a breaking point and reacts by

disinheriting the threatener; or two, where an elderly relative's physical and emotional capacities for patience have degenerated due to natural aging processes, and therefore he's much more easily "ticked off" than before, and reacts by disinheriting the threatener.

3) Be Judgmental About The Relative's Money. As a relative ages, some unsavory people start to see dollar signs behind everything the relative does with his money. For example, if an elderly parent in his late 80s buys a new car, a child may think: "what a waste; he doesn't need a new car because he'll probably pass away in a few years." Keep something important in mind: it's your relative's money and he can do whatever he darn well pleases with it up until the moment he's dead.

There's no need for children to make remarks about how things are "too expensive" or ask "do you really need that." Now, I'm not talking about scenarios where a parent has fallen under the undue influence of another unethical person, or where a parent has lost the mental capacity to make prudent decisions with his

money (in those cases relatives should intervene). My point is that many acts of disinheritance could be avoided if children and other relatives showed the same deference to elderly relatives (who are still of sound mind) with regards to finances as they did when the person was younger.


4) Argue About Minor Things. Who cares what color mom painted her family room? Who cares if dad decided to give nephew Jimmy an extra \$20 for gas money when he came to visit because Jimmy recently lost his job? Are any of these really life-altering events worth triggering a conflict with a relative about? Many times it's wiser to just let the small things go

rather than trigger an argument about them with a relative. Almost every argument about minor things arises as a result of someone speaking angrily in the heat of the moment, whereas if the person paused for a moment, took a deep breath, and thoughtfully reflected for several seconds, he would realize the wisdom of holding his tongue.

5) Prematurely Clean Out Your Parent's House. I'm talking here about scenarios where a parent is declining and will likely pass in the next year or two, and a child tries to get a "iump start" on making the estate administration process easier by removing items from the parent's house. Usually, it's not so much the removal of the items per se that leads to the anger; rather, it's the signal that the child is acting presumptively, or that he sees his parent's passing as a "imminent" reality (which it may in fact be, but the message being communicated to the parent by the child is one of disrespect).

We caught up with Joey Diamond at his Miami home to learn more

Skip Sheffield:How did you, Jace M and Toy Armada come together to re-make "Waiting for Tonight"? JD: After the success of "Tearing up my Heart", we thought it might be fun to do another nineties classic. We looked for something with an uptempo Latin vibe that still had that nostalgic feel to it.

SS:What did you think the first time you heard Jace M and Toy Armada's production of the song? JD: I'm convinced that Jace and Toy are actually warlocks and that every song they create is embedded with a spell that makes listeners crave chocolate pudding.

SS:What is a typical day for you? JD: Typically, I'm hitting the studio in

the morning for about five hours. Then, in the afternoon, I start my second job which is producing subscription-based video content. nightstand?


JD: It's been a hot minute since I've had the time to open a book for enjoyment but the last one was Dr. Michael Bennett's F*uck Feelings.

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
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

"How to Be Old" by Lyn Slater c.2024, Plume\$28.00 272 pages



There's an alternative, but it's not always a good one.

You can grow old or... well, you could die. Other choices: remain grumpy in your chair, or look out the window and see what's outside. You can have joy or regrets. Gather your years or deny them, keep the gray or dye your hair, live or die. You can read these great books on aging, and ignore what's inside or carpe diem.

The year before she entered her sixties, Lyn Slater says she "couldn't find anything to wear." Nothing "inspired" her, which seemed to be a metaphor: what she put on her body "always helped me tell stories about myself."


She was excited to enter a fresh new decade of life, though, despite being inundated with reminders of her age, which only "served to provoke me." She decided to return to school, to take classes for fashion design, to create a new wardrobe and a new story, and in

On her first day of classes, Slater noticed that she was "the oldest person in the room" but nobody cared; they were more interested in what she wore. As time progressed and she learned that her experiences mattered, someone mentioned that she should have a blog. Slater began to dream. Soon, she began to blog.

"How to Be Old" is a delight that mixes a passion for fashion with glee for a second career and love at a later age. Readers will be well-served by heeding Slater's advice: "It's one thing to think about doing something; it's another to actually do it."

"Nothing Ever Just Disappears: Seven Hidden Queer Histories" by Diarmuid Hester c.2024, Pegasus Books \$29.95 358 pages



Go to your spot.

Where that is comes to mind immediately: a palatial home with soaring windows, or a humble cabin in a glen, a ramshackle treehouse, a window seat, a coffeehouse table, or just a bed with a special blanket. It's the place where your mind unspools and creativity surges, where you relax, process, and think. It's the spot where, as in the new book "Nothing Ever Just Disappears" by Diarmuid Hester, you belong.

Clinging "to a spit of land on the south-east coast of England" is Prospect Cottage, where artist and filmmaker Derek Jarman lived until he died of AIDS in 1994. It's a simple four-room place, but it was important to him. Not long ago, Hester visited Prospect Cottage to "examine the importance of queer places in the history of arts and culture."

So many "queer spaces" are disappearing. Still, we can talk about those that aren't.

In his classic book, Maurice, writer E.M. Forster imagined the lives of two men who loved one another but could never be together, and their romantic meeting near a second-floor window. The novel, when finished, "proved too radical even for Forster himself"; he didn't "allow" its publication until after he was dead.

"Patriarchal power," says Hester, largely controlled who was able to occupy certain spots in London at the turn of the last century. Still, "queer suffragettes" there managed to leave their mark: women like Vera Holme.

chauffeur to suffragette leader Emmeline Pankhurst; writer Virginia Woolf; newspaperwoman Edith Craig, and others who "made enormous contributions to the cause."


Josephine Baker grew up in poverty, learning to dance to keep warm, but she had Paris, the city that "made her into a star..." Artist and "transgender icon" Claude Cahun loved Jersey, the place where she worked to "show just how much gender is masquerade." Writer James Baldwin felt most at home in a small town in France. B-filmmaker Jack Smith embraced New York – and vice versa. And on a personal journey, Hester mourns his friend, artist Kevin Killian, who lived and died in his beloved San Francisco.

Juxtaposing place and person, "Nothing Ever Just Disappears" features an interesting way of presenting the idea that both are intertwined deeper than it may seem at first glance. The point is made with grace and lyrical prose, in a storyteller's manner that offers backstory and history as author Diarmuid Hester bemoans the loss of "queer spaces." This is really a lovely, meaningful book - though readers may argue the points made as they pass through the places included here. Landscapes change with history all the time; don't modern "queer spaces" count?

That's a fair question to ask, one that could bring these "hidden" histories full-circle: we often preserve important monuments from history. In memorializing the actions of the queer artists who've worked for the future, the places that inspired them are worth enshrining, too.

Reading this book may be the most relaxing, soothing thing you'll do this month. Try "Nothing Ever Just Disappears" because it really hits the spot.
