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

"So Glad": An interview with Maurice Vellekoop

LGBTQ graphic (as in illustrated) memoirs are nothing new. But it took Alison Bechdel's awardwinning 2006 book "Fun Home," to bring the genre to mainstream audiences, thereby generating mass public appeal and appreciation. Since then, books such as Maia Kobabe's "Gender Queer" and Alice Oseman's graphic novel "Heartstopper" have brought increased attention to both nonfiction and fiction LGBTQ works. Maurice Vellekoop's marvelous graphic memoir "I'm So Glad We Had This Time Together" (Pantheon, 2024), out in February, is a perfect addition to the genre. A powerfully rendered personal story of growing up in a religiously conservative home in Canada, being the artistic one in a straitlaced family, finding necessary creative outlets for expression and, eventually, self-acceptance. Maurice was generous enough to make time for an interview in advance of the publication of his book.

Gregg Shapiro: Maurice, I first became aware of your work with your fabulous 1997 homoerotic primer, "Maurice Vellekoop's ABC Book," which you wrote about in the "Deep Magic" chapter of your new graphic memoir "I'm So Glad We Had This Time Together." Please say a few words about the "ABC Book" for the readers. MV: The "ABC Book" pictures a series of homoerotic encounters between various gay stereotypes, arranged alphabetically with very simple rhyming text. For example, "E is for Executives reaching their goals, F is for Firemen sliding down poles." It's a naughty riff on Little Golden Books but for an adult audience. It was inspired by the subversive work of both Edward Gorey and the great homoerotic artist Tom of Finland, who is such an inspiration. Tom's world, much as I love it, is relentlessly macho. I wanted my playful vision of gay sex to be more inclusive, so, in addition to all the bikers and cops, I drew

some hairdressers and interior decorators having hot sex too!

GS: In the memoir, you also wrote about the early influence of Charles Schulz and Walt Disney on your imagination and your work. Were there graphic novelists, such as Alison Bechdel or Marjane Satrapi, who also influenced you and how you approached "I'm So Glad We Had This Time Together"? MV: In my career as a magazine illustrator, I've drawn inspiration from a wide variety of sources. One artist I love is Arthur Getz, who did "New Yorker" covers from the 1940s to the 1970s. His sense of light and mood is something I'm always striving to emulate. In the world of comics, yes, definitely Bechdel; less so Satrapi, much as I revere her. Legendary Canadian comics artist

Seth is a big influence. I love his book, "It's a Good Life if You Don't Weaken." I borrowed the page design and layout of "I'm So Glad We Had This Time Together" from it.

GS: In the "Bewitched" chapter you wrote about wanting a Barbie doll when you were a boy. You also wrote in the book about your love of movies. Have you seen the Greta Gerwig "Barbie" movie, and if so, what did you think of it? *MV*: I enjoyed "Barbie" very much! Sorry, I can't really add much further to the discourse.


GS: TV also played a role in your formative years. Do you know if Carol Burnett is aware of your drawings of her and that she's in your book?

MV: Good guestion! I'll have to get the publisher to send her a copy. I met her very briefly in New York in the 1990s. Bob Mackie, who famously designed every single costume for her weekly variety show, was having a retrospective at FIT, so I knew Carol would be there for the opening night. At the entrance I spotted her, and, blushing like a 12-year-old, handed her a copy of my book "Vellevision," pointing out there was a drawing of her on the cover. She flashed that dazzling smile, said thanks, handed the book to her assistant, and went in

GS: You had a conservative religious upbringing, which of course has an impact when you realize that you are gay. While writing the book, were you consciously writing to a reader who also had a similar experience, and if so, what do you hope they will get out of reading your book?

W: I was not necessarily writing for that specific audience, though I certainly thought about it. When I read, it's to discover stories that don't necessarily reflect my own experience. I grew up in an unusual, hermetic world of devout Protestant Dutch immigrants and I thought my book could, in part, be a glimpse into that world. Having said all that, if my book can offer solace or help someone struggling through a similar circumstance, that would be amazing!

GS: In the "Thistletown" chapter, you wrote about how you and your sister Ingrid came out to each other. When you think about



that experience today, having a queer sibling with whom to share the coming out experience, how does it make you feel?

MV: It meant the world to me to have an ally I could confide in safely at fourteen. Ingrid and I were very tight in my teens and 20s, and her artistic talent was a constant inspiration. I feel very blessed to have her in my life. And that passage is one of my favorites in the book, especially when the waitress says, "What can I get you girls?"

GS: Like a lot of gay teens, you found a safe haven in your high school's theater department. Are

you still in touch with any friends from that time, and did any others also come out?

MV: No, I'm not in touch with friends from high school. But I recently reconnected with an art school buddy who I always wondered about. He recently came out – in his late 50s – and is happily partnered. It's never too late!

GS: In the "Vissi D'Arte" chapter, there is a drawing of you reading "A Boy's Own Story." Does Ed White know he's in your book? *MV*: [Laughs] I will have to send him a copy too! I am a big fan of Edmund White, but at the period referred to in the book, the late eighties, he seemed to represent a trend toward a very heavy, bleak, and cerebral gay literature that was not exactly fun to read.

GS: What do you think your parents, who are both deceased, would think of "I'm So Glad We Had This Time Together"?

MV: What my dad would have thought is anyone's guess. He was such an unusual, unpredictable creature. I'm sure he would have been proud of the accomplishment, whatever his feelings about his own portrayal. My mother was really dreading the book. She was a very private person, and the book represents a huge invasion of that privacy. Also, though she was quite literary, all the books she loved were written long ago, and she just would not understand the level of candor that modern readers expect from a memoir. Despite her dread, she was unfailingly supportive of the project, always ready to answer my questions, even when what I was asking was quite intimate.

GS: You wrote openly about your struggle with depression, often depicting two imaginary beings representing a kind of good and evil duo. You were fortunate to find Maggie, the right therapist for you. Regarding the book's title, would it be fair to say that some of the most productive "time together" was actually what you spent with therapist Maggie? **MV:** The title can be read a number of ways, some of them ironic, so that's an interesting take. I never thought about it in quite that way, but now that you raise it, yes, absolutely. I was so fortunate to have found someone so wise, funny, pragmatic, and kind. Nowadays, therapy is so much more accepted than it was 25 years ago. But if there are readers who are curious but skeptical, I hope my book illustrates how therapy can work to produce profound change.

GS: One of the things that I loved about the book was the visual history of your hair throughout the book. In the "God's Temples" chapter, you even mention that the hair on your head darkened when you turned 13. Please say something about the part, pardon the pun, your hair has played in your life. MV: | was lucky to have inherited my hairdresser mother's thick. luxuriant hair (in her case dark brown, in mine. whiteblond in childhood. later a duller gold, now mostly silver). There was a long period in the 1990s when I had a sort of 1970s shag. I looked a bit like the



singer Beck, and I used to get a lot of puzzled stares from people wondering, "Is it him?". However, cool as I thought I looked, this look did not go over well in the gay bars of Toronto, where a rigid conformity prevailed. Eventually, I cut it off and have had a kind of Tintin-esque coif ever since.

GS: Earlier I mentioned Bechdel and Satrapi, whose graphic memoirs were turned into a Broadway musical and a movie, respectively. What would it mean to you if "I'm So Glad We Had This Time Together" was adapted for another medium?

MV: It would be amazing if somehow Disney decided it was time to do an animated film for adults, based on my memoir. Especially if they could recreate the loose, sketchy style of "101 Dalmatians" and "Jungle Book," my favorite period.

GS: Have you started working on or thinking about your next book project?

MV: Yes! My book agent and I are pitching a children's book written and illustrated by me. I'm also working on some new erotic drawings, which may end up as a book. For lots of reasons, as a young man, I didn't think I was attractive, and I spent many years in celibacy. Now, when I look at old pictures of myself, I see a pretty, rosy-cheeked, full-lipped twink. So, I'm drawing that character getting all the wild sex he so desperately wanted but couldn't allow himself to have. I can't decide whether the project is terribly sad or crazily empowering, maybe it's a bit of both!

Consider a winter getaway to Fort Lauderdale and Wilton Manors (The Island City which is surrounded by Fort Lauderdale, Florida). The weather is usually perfect: highs in the low 80s and rain free. There is so much to do and if you stay right in Wilton Manors, you will not need a car.

WHAT TO DO

Besides hanging out at Sebastian Beach, there is lots of other stuff to do.

Hike the boardwalk and enjoy the red mangrove swamp in Colohatchee Park Wilton Manors. I took the electric shuttle there for just \$2 known as the Circuit Rideshare service. Download the app and book your ride. It's like a UBER but you share a ride using a cute multipassenger vehicle. The drivers work for tips so be sure and give them one. Details at ridecircuit.com/ fortlauderdale.

Join the Frontrunners for a walk or run. They meet Sundays at 5 p.m. at the Pride Center in Equality Park in Wilton Manors (and also Wednesdays in Holiday Park and Saturday mornings). Details at FRWFL.org.

Pick up some sexy underwear at

the Pride Factory clothing store (2282 Wilton Drive, Wilton Manors).

See the shark exhibit at the Frost Science Museum.

Walk along the Riverwalk in downtown Ft. Lauderdale.

The new Seminole Hardrock Hotel and Casino in nearby Hollywood features live sports betting and games such as craps and roulette. It features restaurants and a guitar shaped hotel.

The Wilton Manors Library has shared computers and is perfect for teleworkers working out of their Wilton Manors office.

Download the Seek App and get to know the flora and fauna. Green iguanas are a startling site as are the colorful ducks which walk around the neighborhoods. The various kinds of palms are interesting. With a subtropical climate, you will find flowers not seen elsewhere in the U.S.

Take the Brightline Train to Miami. The super-fast first gets you there in just 30 minutes. You can even buy a snack onboard. The train also goes north to Orlando Airport. There is nothing else like it in the U.S.

NIGHTLIFE

Most of the bars are close to each other on Wilton Drive in Wilton Manors. Hunters is my first stop. There is something going on every night. (Yes, the same owner as the one in Palm Springs.)

The LIT was just voted the best bar for lesbians. You will find them at 2440 Wilton Drive.

You will find the leather crowd at the Eagle in Wilton Manors.

Georgie's Alibi Monkey Bar (of P-town fame) at 2232 is a lot of fun.

Johnson's has dancers and a happy hour from 5 to 8 p.m.

The new NoManors Bar is a lot of fun.

There must be 15 bars within steps of each other on both sides of Wilton Manors Drive. Check them out while in town.

WHERE AND WHAT TO EAT

Enjoy a burger at Rosie's Bar and Grill (2449 Wilton Drive) on Wilton Drive. The popular hangout is necessary. Pub on the Drive also has great food and a brunch on Saturdays and Sundays. You will find them at 2271 Wilton Manor Drive.

Since I travel by myself, I prefer getting food to go at grocery stores.

The new Sprouts Market is another option. They too have made to order sandwiches and other items.

WHERE TO STAY

The new Wilton River Suites is right on the river and walkable to the bars in Wilton Manors. Check out a bike or kayak during your stay. You get your own apartment, some of which have two bathrooms. They also feature an onsite gym and pool Book your room


at wiltonsuites.com.



Six best LGBTQ+ albums 2023

When it comes time to compile a "best of" list for the year, it's a relatively simple process. I ask myself what albums I kept returning to time and time again. Beginning with Brandy Clark's eponymous fourth album (which got the most spins of all) and concluding with Man On Man's sensational second album "Provincetown," it was a very queer year. While I did everything in my power to limit the list to five, I had to make an exception so you, dear reader, can learn about the great LGBTQ+ music put out in 2023.

Brandy Clark



It was only a matter of time before two of the biggest queer names in Americana/country crossover collaborated, but we're glad that Brandy Clark and Brandi Carlile did. Clark's eponymous Warner Records album was produced by Grammy-winner Carlile who plays on all but one of the 11 tracks. While Carlile's presence is felt, the album is pure Clark. From her celebrated turn of phrase and distinctive sense of humor and perspective to her easily recognizable vocal style and delivery, the album is all hers. Unforgettable tunes include "Tell Her You Don't Love Her" (on which she's joined by Lucius), the gorgeous duet with Carlile on "Dear Insecurity," "Best Ones," "Ain't Enough Rocks" (featuring Derek Trucks), "Northwest," "Take Mine," and "She Smoked in the House."

Jake Shears



Jake Shears kept us waiting five years for "Last Man Dancing" (Mute), the follow-up to his 2018 solo debut. An entirely different animal from its predecessor, the music is joyful, youthful, exhilarating, and forwardthinking. And, yes, dancing is required. "Too Much Music" is both retro and of the moment, while "Do The Television," co-written by Shears, and Scissor Sister bandmates Scott Hoffman (aka Babydaddy) and Ana Lynch (Ana Matronic) is mesmerizing. Kylie Minoque duets with Shears on the irresistible "Voices" and we get a good measure of Big Freedia on "Doses." Shears makes use of the old-school continuous mix groove from "8 Ball" through "Devil Came Down The Dance Floor," giving the listener the feeling of being at their own private dance party or club.

Sufjan Stevens



The signs were there all along when it comes to **Sufjan Stevens**' official October 2023 coming out. What straight man could possibly write a

song about serial killer John Wayne Gacy and his victims, and make it as gorgeous and chill-inducing as 'John Wayne Gacy, Jr." (from 2005's "Illinois")? Would a straight man have been able to create a song as sensitive as "Mystery of Love," Stevens' Oscar-nominated tune from the gay film "Call Me By Your Name?" His 2023 masterwork "Javelin" (Asthmatic Kitty), featuring the dedication to his late partner Evans Richardson (who died in April), feels less like a surprise, and more like a confirmation. The music is everything we've come to expect from Stevens, and more. From the alternately exquisite and jarring opener "Goodbye Evergreen," to the lush choral vocals on "A Running Start" and the potential hit single pop of "Will Anybody Ever Love Me?," Stevens continues to merge queerness and faith.

Meshell Ndegeocello



If you've been listening to and following queer musician **Meshell Ndegeocello**'s compelling music career, from her early '90s hit single "If That's Your Boyfriend (He Wasn't Last Night)," the political statement of "Leviticus: Faggot," and the breathtaking "Bitter" album, through her vast and varied 21st century sonic explorations, you know that her output is anything but predictable or dull. "The Omnichord Real Book" (Blue Note), Ndegeocello's first album of all original tunes since 2014's "Comet, Come To Me," continues her longstanding tradition of being musically daring. The roster of guest musicians, including Joan As Police Woman, Jason Moran, Jeff Parker, and Josh Johnson, is mind-blowing. The sound throughout is equal parts timeless and forward-thinking, soulful and soul-stirring.

Anohni and the Johnsons



Anohni has long been a transformational artist. From performing "Cripple and the Starfish" on 1996's various artists

compilation "God Shave The Queen" to leading Antony and the Johnsons in the early years of the 21st century to going solo on 2016's "Hopelessness," Anohni has always remained their distinctive creative vision. Now, coming full circle as Anohni and the Johnsons, this has proven true once again on the stunning "My Back Was A Bridge For You To Cross" (Secretly Canadian). Beginning with "It Must Change" (a song with an environmental message on par with Marvin Gaye's "What's Going On"), Anohni makes a statement to which we should listen. The R&B vibe on "Can't," "It's My Fault" (featuring the lines, "It's my fault/The way I broke the earth"), and "Why Am I Alive Now?," also make these among Anohni's most accessible songs. Even the jarring "Go Ahead," with its Yoko Ono-style arrangement and delivery, doesn't feel out of place here.

Man on Man



When gueer musical duo Man On Man – Roddy Bottum and Joey Holman, whose partnership is both creative and romantic - released its eponymous debut album in 2021, it was as if someone opened a gallon drum of poppers, and we were all experiencing the same thrilling head rush. Man On Man effortlesslv avoids the dreaded sophomore slump with the incredible "Provincetown" (Polyvinyl). Not shying away for a moment from its sexy subject matter, Man On Man is in peak condition on songs including "Take It From Me," "Gloryhole," "Piggy," "Showgirls," "I Feel Good," and "Kids."

Indigiqueer Artist Roger Kuhn Discovers His True Colors

"I always knew I was different from the other kids my age," says musician Roger Kuhn. In addition to standing out as bi-racial and bicultural - his father was of German and Russian descent and his mother is a tribal Poarch Creek woman -Roger says he never felt quite settled in his skin. "I didn't feel like a boy, nor did I feel like a girl. I grew up loving He-Man, Thundercats, Barbie, and She-Ra. I used to pretend I was Madonna and David Bowie at the same time."

It wasn't until his mid-twenties when Roger discovered what it meant to be Two-Spirit. Coined by native tribal Dr. Myra Laramee in 1990, Two-Spirit is used to signify male, female, and intersexed individuals who combine activities of both gender traits. In most tribes, they are considered neither men nor women; they occupy a distinct, alternative gender status.

Roger describes his gender and sexuality as circular and not on a fixed binarv. "It's like peering through a kaleidoscope and seeing multiples shapes, colors, expressions, and beauty," he explains. He sings about it in his new single, "Kaleidoscope," a song rooted in classic house and progressive EDM that champions finding inner strength and celebrating liberation, and his new book, Somacultural Liberation, out this month. "For me, freedom is living my truth and pursuing my dreams," he continues.

It is why, after working as a psychotherapist for the past decade, Roger Kuhn decided to take time away from his practice to prioritize



his creative expression once again. He explains more from his home in Los Angeles.

Larry Olsen:Growing up in conservative North Dakota had to be difficult for you.

Roger Kuhn: If I wasn't being picked on for being bi-racial, I was being made fun of for my perceived gender and sexual orientation variance. I was always a target, and it was sad because feeling included is so important. Being treated with equality and equity is vital to one's wellbeing. One of the primary reasons I became a musician and author was to break free from the limitations that others placed on me my whole life. I discovered that through writing and song, I could share my truth.

L.O: What is your truth?

RK: That I am an Indigiqueer person. There are few examples of

Indigiqueer people in mainstream media. I've had to learn new ways to navigate systems that were put in place to silence and control Indigenous people.

L.O: Have you faced discrimination within the LGBTQ community?

RK: Countless times, both personally and collectively. Being Indigenous and LGBTQIA+ presents with unique complications. We face different issues and challenges that others in the community do not experience or understand. I have stood my ground with many Caucasian gay men who have tried to convince me they were as marginalized as Black, Indigenous, and People of Color LGBTQIA+ people are.

L.O:What exactly does it mean to be Two Spirit?

R.K: Two-Spirit is a term used by Indigenous people who have gender


and sexual orientation variance and a deep connection to their Native identity. I first learned the term in 2005 from another Two-Spirit person who upon meeting said to me, "oh you're like me, Two-Spirit". He then explained what it meant and I immediately resonated with the term. I identify more as Two-Spirit than I do as gay because being a Native American person is as important to me as my identity as a gay person. Two-Spirit allows me to not have to choose.

L.O: What pronouns do you prefer to use?

RK: I use he/him pronouns though I am also comfortable with they/them. If we are homies, she works too.

L.O: I'm curious to know how you feel about Demi Lovato switching her pronouns from they/them back to she/her after she grew tired of having to explain her gender identity.

RK: I believe it's important to recognize that some people come from a privileged place where they



L.O: Is "Kaleidoscope" intended to be a Two-Spirit anthem?

R.K: It's an anthem for all of us really. Kaleidoscope is about trusting our vulnerability and pursuing our inner most truth. For me, part of that was to embrace my

identity as a Poarch Creek Two-Spirit person and to advocate for other 2SLGBTQIA+ and all marginalized people.

L.O: In 2022, you were featured in the Levi's Pride campaign,

promoting awareness and acceptance within the Two-Spirit community. How did that come about? R.K: Six years ago, I made a sign that I carried with me in the San Francisco Pride Parade. It read: Decolonize Sexuality. It got a lot of attention and was featured in several media outlets. I carried the sign again in the next vear's parade and it caught the attention of Levi's. They reached out and invited me to partake in a photoshoot that they ended up using in their Pride campaign. The campaign ran in Target and Macv's stores in the US and appeared internationally on Levi's social media.

L.O: Where are you in your quest to find



happiness and satisfaction in your life?

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GRAB ROGER Landlord's Obligation to Return Security

Deposits

Q: I am planning to move out of my apartment during the spring. I expect to have a problem with my landlord in getting my security deposit refunded when I move. What is my landlord's responsibility under the law to return my security deposit? Can I use my security deposit as the last month's rent? Does my landlord have to pay me interest for the time he had my security deposit? A: Chicago's "Residential Tenant and Landlord Ordinance" applies to all residential, rental real estate located within the City of Chicago. The law establishes responsibilities for landlords not only in leasing apartments but in handling their tenant's security deposits (the law does not apply, however, to owners of buildings of six units or less and owner occupied).

If you rented your apartment, renewed your lease or paid a security deposit for your apartment after January 1, 1987, and your apartment is within the City of Chicago, then the ordinance governs your landlord's obligations to return your security deposit and renew your lease.


The ordinance requires landlords to hold all security deposits in a separate, interest bearing account in a federally insured bank or savings and loan located within the State of Illinois. The landlord must pay interest to his tenants. And the landlord is obligated, within 30 days of the end of each 12-month rental period, to pay any interest due to the tenant by cash or a credit against the rent.

When a landlord receives a security deposit from a new or existing tenant, he is obligated to give a receipt to the tenant showing the date received, the amount of the deposit and the name of the person receiving it. If the landlord fails to provide a receipt for the security deposit, the tenant has the right to make demand for the return of the security deposit and the landlord must return it.

The security deposit cannot be used for the last month's rent

although it is a very common practice. Under the law, the tenant must pay the last month's rent even though they plan to move at the end of the last month. When the apartment is vacated, the landlord has 45 days within which to return the security deposit to the tenant plus any interest.

Your landlord may deduct from the security deposit any unpaid rent and a reasonable amount necessary to repair any damage to the property. If the apartment is damaged and your landlord wants to deduct money from the security deposit to pay for the repairs, the landlord must. within 30 days after the tenant vacates the apartment, deliver or mail to the tenant an itemized statement of the damages



caused to the premises and the estimated or actual cost of repairing each item. If the items have been repaired, the landlord must attach copies of the paid receipts for the repairs or replacements. It's smart for all tenants to take photographs of their apartment showing that their apartment was left undamaged in case of a dispute.

If the landlord or the landlord's agent (management company) fails to comply with the city ordinance or refuses to return the security deposit, the tenant can take the landlord to court and recover an amount equal to two times the security deposit plus interest with court costs and reasonable attorney's fees.

Cook County residents can use Cook County's Pro Se Court to file lawsuits without having to hire an attorney. Filing a suit in Pro Se Court is relatively easy. The Pro Se Court's staff helps individuals who want to sue – they are called plaintiffs – to fill out the appropriate forms in Room 602 of the Richard J. Daley Center.

Screen Queen: Meanspirited school spirit

The trend of adapting films into stage musicals and then movie musicals has produced hits such as "Hairspray" and misses including "The Producers." "**Mean Girls**" (Paramount), falls somewhere in between, although it leans closer to a miss.

Fans of the original 2004 "Mean Girls" movie, based on Rosalind Wiseman's 2002 book "Queen Bees & Wannabes," will be pleased to know that, for the most part, the musical remains true to its source. The ageless Tina Fey, who wrote the screenplays for both, returns as math teacher Ms. Norbury, as does Tim Meadows as Principal Duvall.

There are notable minor changes including making Ms. Heron (Jenna Fischer), the mother of lead character Cady (Angourie Rice), a single parent. The most significant changes include a considerable increase in BIPOC and LGBTQ+ characters, both major and minor, as well as the inescapable presence of social media and smartphones in the lives of high school students.

The bottom line is that

comparisons are inevitable, and Rice is no Lindsav Lohan. Christopher Briney is no Jonathan Bennett, and Busy Philipps is no Amy Poehler. However, Renéé Rapp (who performed in the musical on Broadway) and Jaquel Spivey do succeed in taking complete ownership of their roles as queen bee Regina and sassy queen Damian, respectively. Bebe Wood as Gretchen and Auli'i Cravalho as Janis come close to making us forget the original performers (Lacey Chabert and Lizzy Caplan) but fall short.

Speaking of Lindsay Lohan, her appearance as the Mathletes challenge moderator is sure to elicit the same audience reaction as when Whoopi Goldberg appeared as the midwife in "The Color Purple" movie musical.

The following is a series of





questions (not to be confused with a pop quiz) that deserve to be answered.

Why are the songs, written by Nell Benjamin and Jeff Richmond (husband of Tina Fey), utterly forgettable? Seriously, see if you find yourself humming even one of

them after the credits roll.

Why is the choreography so clunky, uninspired, and derivative (hello, "La La Land")?

Why did it take two (!) directors – Samantha Jayne and Arturo Perez, Jr. – to come up with this?

Why are the scenes with the most well-deserved laughs, all featuring Rapp, saved for the last 30 minutes of the movie?

The tradition of the movie musical isn't exactly in jeopardy, but it doesn't look promising. The biggest concern? That Benjamin and Richmond, who also co-wrote the stage musical version of "Legally Blonde," are at work on a movie adaptation of that one.

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


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GRAB A BOOK By Terri Sch

"Blood Sisters" by Vanessa Lilliec.2023, Berkley \$27.00 384 pages



It's the truth. Scout's honor. Pinky swear. Spit on your palms or prick your fingers, and shake hands. As a child, you had many ways to show that you intended to keep a promise when you made it and your word was your bond, but you've grown up. Today, you cross your heart but, as in the new novel "Blood Sisters" by Vanessa Lillie, you hope no one has to die.

She wasn't looking for skeletal remains.

For Bureau of Indian Affairs archaeologist Syd Walker, such a find was very unusual but not unknown. Odd things happen during geological surveys on tribal lands everywhere. Still, the gruesome recovery in Rhode Island wasn't top on Syd's mind.

She'd gotten a call that her sister, Emma Lou, was missing in Oklahoma. Again.

Fifteen years before, as Syd, Emma Lou, and Luna, who they'd considered a sister, were chilling in Luna's family's trailer, a group of men broke in. Wearing masks, the "devils" killed Luna and her parents, and the small town of Picher, was never the same.

Neither were Emma Lou or Syd. As a member of the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma, Syd was well aware of the problems near her hometown, the issues Native Americans had there with the BIA, and her own ancestors' efforts to survive on land that was given and then snatched back. She also knew the fact that she had a wife at home in Rhode Island set her apart since she'd left. And drugs – too many people on tribal allotments were getting drugs too easily.

But someone wanted Syd to come home: a female skull was found in the crook of a tree with her old work badge in its mouth. Despite knowing that Syd had fled Oklahoma on purpose, her new boss at the BIA pulled strings to arrange the trip and assigned her the case.

Years ago, Syd had promised to 38 GRAB Magazine Ia protect Luna and Emma Lou.

One of them was already dead. The other was missing.

Was the skull a threat – or a warning?

Here is the best advice you're going to get when you grab "Blood Sisters": pay close attention to the minutiae. Without being a spoiler, little things mean a lot.

Unless you watch carefully, you'll be cruising along at 200 miles an hour in a screaming run through pages and pages of barely-bearable excitement when suddenly, your brain will make that scratchy sound like a stopped record album. It's there where author Vanessa Lillie drops three tons of TNT, right towards the almost-end of her story and whoa, Nelly. If you're not paying attention, you may have to read the chapter multiple times to cut your "What the....?" down to a manageable level.

Yeah, this is that kind of book, the kind that's written with authenticity, an insider's feel, and heightened tension that'll keep you awake. The kind that you think you know how it'll end and you're wrong. For mystery lovers or thriller fans, "Blood Sisters" is the kind of book you should scout out.

The catalogs should start arriving soon.

If you're a gardener, that's a siren song for you. What will you put in your pots and plots this spring? What colors will you have, what crops will you harvest? It never gets old: put a seed no bigger than a breadcrumb into some dirt and it becomes dinner in just weeks. All it needs, as in the new memoir "The Risk It Takes to Bloom" by Raquel Willis, is a little time to grow.

The last time Raquel Willis remembers being completely safe and loved without strings attached was at age five, at a talent show. Shortly afterwards, some elders began telling

Willis to speak with "a particular brand of clear," to move differently, to act differently. Willis was a Black boy then, and that was how her father worked against his son's "softness."

Willis didn't know the truth about herself then, but other boys did. So, eventually, did the girls, as a grade school Willis "gravitated... toward" them. Young Willis prayed for God to "just make me a girl" but the bullying that had already begun only got worse.

She changed schools and things were no better; meanwhile, her father tried "even harder to correct who I was becoming." Friends and online friends were encouraging and supportive, offering her courage to come out to her mother, who thought it was "a phase." Her father was angry, then accepting. Other family members took Willis' news in stride.

It was going to be okay. More than okay, in fact, because Willis was introduced to drag, and she started to feel more comfortable in women's clothing than in men's attire. To Willis, the drag troupe had begun feeling like family. She settled into life as a gay drag performer, because that was the "language" she had.

And then one day, while talking on the phone with an on-again off-again boyfriend, something important hit Willis, hard.

"I think I'm a woman," she told him. "I'm a woman.... I am."

Sometimes, it takes awhile to understand the person you really are. Half a book, in this case, because "The Risk It Takes to Bloom" is quite wordy: author Raquel Willis tells her story in excruciating detail, and it can get rather long.

And yet, the length allows for clues that readers can follow, to truly see the woman, the activist and writer, who penned this book. But is that enough to attract readers? What sets this book apart from other, similar books by star-powered Black trans women?

The answer lies in the approachability of its author.

Willis tells her tale with a more anchoring feel, more down-to-earth, like she could have lived up the street from you or sat in the last row of your high school Algebra class. You could've known her. You could know someone like her. Or Willis could be you.

Indeed, this book might hold plainspoken inspiration for anyone who needs it. If that's you, get "The Risk It Takes to Bloom," find a chair, and plant yourself.
